From Fr. Dan, Administrator

Dear Friends,

Seven new priests were recently ordained for the Archdiocese of Boston. Over the last 13 years we have been ordaining an average of 6.15 priests per year. While this is well under the number we will need to stop the decline in priest numbers, the fact that we have seven instead of six this year is hopeful. Please pray for and encourage vocations to the diocesan priesthood and encourage all to seek to find what vocation (path of life) Jesus is calling them to.

What does Evangelization mean? All the recent Popes, following the teaching of Jesus, have made it a central priority. But what does it mean?

Evangelization is not Proselytizing.

Proselytizing is pressuring folks into the practice of our wonderful faith. Pope Francis is against it. We are to share the good news and invite – not brow beat others.

Star Wars and Evangelization. The new movie came out this past week and enthusiasts will be sharing with others how much they liked it and inviting them to check it out. When we do the same thing with regard to Jesus, that is evangelization. For example when we rave about the spiritual depth of Fr. John's Christ-centered homilies, or the excellence of

the music ministries, and then invite others to check it out - that is evangelization.

Pew hospitality and evangelization. When folks are new, coming into church can be a little scary. When they see open seats on the center aisle because folks have moved in and/or when folks smile at them or gladly move over, it really helps them. These little acts of hospitality can be the extra grain that tilts the scale towards someone coming back next week. Thank you for helping bring our beloved friends back home.

Saying "Jesus" is evangelization. Sharing that following Jesus gives us the central purpose of our life. Naming him as our role model. Sharing that our faith has gotten us through hard times. Mentioning we enjoy our relationship with Jesus. That is evangelization.

Sports – Celt's have a great future! No shame in losing in seven games to LeBron. (My kingdom for some of those 3 point shots to have gone in!) We will be awesome when healthy next year. The Sox own the best record in baseball. My goddaughter and niece, Mary, won Brookline High Female Athlete of the year!

AEDs at Both Churches

An AED -- Automated external defibrillator for heart emergencies is located in the central foyer of both churches. What should one do if someone is in need of medical attention that may be heart related? (1) Call 911 immediately. (2) Call out for medical personnel in the congregation -- we have loads of them – and follow their instructions. (3) Notify the priest. (4) If called for, use the AED – it is self-explanatory. Though a non-medical person can use it, please defer to any medical personnel as to its use. (5) Send someone to the doors of the church to keep an eye out for the Ambulance or Fire Dept. so that they can be guided directly to the person in need. (6) Pray to God for the health of the person.

Explaining the Mass

Have you ever wanted to know more about the Mass? Curious about the meaning and significance of different sections or prayers in the liturgy? On June 9th and 10th at all Masses in the Collaborative we will be explaining the Mass throughout the liturgy

New & Ongoing in Our Community

Care for Creation

May 24 was the third anniversary of Pope Francis' encyclical Laudato Sí: On Care for Our Common Home. On the day before, a coalition of Massachusetts religious leaders and scientists held a press conference hosted by Cardinal Sean O'Malley at the archdiocesan center in Braintree. They were releasing a "Faith and Science Joint Appeal for Climate Action," which they had worked on together over the previous several months. Fr. Dan Riley, our Collaborative Administrator, is one of over 600 faith and science leaders who signed the appeal. Since Father Dan was on retreat, two parishioners from our Justice and Peace Committee attended the press conference. The appeal stated in part:

"Motivated by the climate crisis, we come together as people of scientific competence and people of faith because continued inaction is both scientifically irrational and morally indefensible. All of us—religion, science, business, labor, government, education, civic organizations, communities, and individuals—must do our utmost to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and to protect our communities from the catastrophic impacts of climate change. We especially call upon our political representatives to address the climate crisis with the boldness and urgency it requires, with substantive and immediate action. . . . There is still time to take action,

and that time is now." If you want to learn more about how you can act, come to hear Fran Ludwig, Boston Chair of the Global Catholic Climate Movement, on Sunday, June 3rd, at 4:00pm in the Sacred Heart lower church, who will speak on "Care for Our Common Home: What It Means and What You Can Do."





The Mass for Millennials: The Responsorial Psalm



Wedged between the First Reading and Second Reading at Sunday Mass (or between the First Reading and Gospel at daily Mass) is a small reading known as the Responsorial Psalm. For example, you might hear:

The Lord hears the cry of the poor.

I will bless the Lord at all times; his praise shall be ever in my mouth. Taste and see how good the Lord is; Blessed the man who takes refuge in him.

The Lord hears the cry of the poor.

The LORD confronts the evildoers,
To destroy remembrance of them from the earth.
When the just cry out, the LORD hears them,
And from all their distress he rescues them.

The Lord hears the cry of the poor.

The Lord is close to the brokenhearted; And those who are crushed in spirit he saves. Many are the troubles of the just man, But out of them all the LORD delivers him.

The Lord hears the cry of the poor.

Few would argue the beauty, power, and import of these words for the life of the Church today. Yet rarely, if ever, will a homily turn to the Psalter or expound the Responsorial Psalm of the day. We churchgoers are likely to hear preaching on religious themes, social or cultural issues, or the daily readings and Gospel—but never a homily on the Psalm. In fact, beyond the brief recitation of the Psalm at Mass, ordinary Christians' engagement with this book is minimal.

But this was not always the case, as the great Patristic exegetes and preachers of the early Church—Gregory of Nyssa, Augustine of Hippo, Basil of Caesarea—all wrote entire treatises and delivered passionate homilies expounding the Psalter, going so far as to situate it at the heart of the Church's prayer and selfunderstanding. These Patristic authors spoke of the Psalter's unparalleled advantages for prayer, the cultivation of virtue, catechesis, and evangelization. They even call the Book of Psalms a garden in which one can find the whole of Scripture recapitulated and set to music, with "added marvels all its own": that is, the unique ability of the psalms to affect and move their reader in a distinct way. One would not dare "to utter the words of the patriarchs as his own...or "to imitate and to say Moses' own words," Athanasius writes in his Epistle to Marcellinus (*Ep. Marc.* 11, p. 109). But the Psalter "not only enjoins, but invites and expresses, repentance, endurance and thanksgiving, so that each man adopts its language as his

Athanasius refers to the Psalter as a kind of mirror, through which their reader can contemplate his or her own soul and measure it against the true Form, while Basil of Caesarea adopts the imagery of a pharmaceutical, referring to the Psalms as medicine for the wounded soul: "The old wounds of souls it cures completely," he writes, "and to the recently wounded it brings speedy improvement; the diseased it treats, and the unharmed it preserves" (Basil of Caesarea, *Exegetic Homilies*: 153). The act of singing and setting the Psalter to music, for Basil, is like a coating of honey: the proverbial "spoonful of sugar" that helps the medicine "go down."

In these metaphors, both authors are attempting to capture something of the Psalter's healing and formative character. The recitation of the psalms, they argue, heal and re-form the soul according to the image of Christ prophesied throughout and made present within the Psalter. But in addition to these functions the Psalter is unparalleled in its ability to facilitate the cultivation of virtue and as a source for catechesis and evangelization, pointing to the unchangeable "Goodness itself toward which all things look" (Basil, 158).

One of the greatest appreciators of the Psalms' centrality in the life of the Church—lay and cleric alike—is Thomas Merton, whose small track on praying the Psalms was especially formative in the incorporation of the Psalter into my own prayer (Merton, Praying the Psalms, 1956). For Merton, the Church loves the Psalms because of all of the reasons listed above but also because in the Psalms "we drink divine praise at its pure and stainless source, in all its primitive sincerity and perfection". Through the Psalms we discover the Lord to whom we are speaking, and we discover ourselves as well. The Psalms are the words of God Himself, who desires to hear them from us, but perhaps even more shockingly the Psalms are "the very expression of [the Church's deepest inner life". As Merton puts it, "The words and thoughts of the Psalms spring not only from the unsearchable depths of God, but also from the inmost heart of the Church, and there are no songs which better express her soul, her desires, her longing, her sorrows and her joys".

It is all too easy to skim over or zone out during this short, at times perplexing, part of the Mass. But pay attention to the words of the Psalm each day: you will begin to notice that they run the gamut of human emotions, expressing the inexpressible feelings of sorrow, hunger, joy, desire, even despair and loneliness. But more importantly, in sincerely joining your own experiences, emotions, and praise to the praise uttered by the Psalms, you will be drawn into the whole Mystery of Christ. You will encounter the Church's own experience of divine things, as Merton reminds us (9). You will begin to know God as you ought, and in singing "the wedding hymn" of the Church you will enter into the Church's own mystical union with the Incarnate Word.
