

Do you have a special intention or a petition?

If so, St. Agnes has several ways to work with you. Options include:

- 1. Arrange a Mass at St. Agnes. You choose the time & date from our regularly scheduled Masses. (Please note this does not include Sunday Masses.) The Archdiocese determines the donation amount for each Mass, currently at \$15. Stop by the rectory to sign up! Your arranged Mass will be printed in the bulletin.
- 2. Arrange a Mass with the Missions. St. Agnes supports our Missionary priests by passing along your intention & donation (\$10) for a Mass that they will say for you. This is an excellent way to support our priests abroad while honoring your intention.
- 3. Offer the bread & wine for our Masses at St. Agnes. Your donation (\$50) will provide the bread & wine that will be consecrated at our Masses for your chosen week. This is a very beautiful way to remember your petition. Your donation will be printed in the bulletin.
- 4. Make a donation for the sanctuary lamp. As you know, this lamp reminds us of the Living Presence of Our Lord in the tabernacle. It must always be lit when He is present. Your donation (\$50) will provide continuous candlelight for a chosen week and will be printed in the bulletin.
- 5. Light a tall (pillar) candle and place it within the church. You can purchase them at the bookstore or through the rectory for \$10/each. These candles burn for approximately 7 days. Light your candle and leave it with the plastic casing. The sacristan will put it into an appropriate glass sleeve.
- 6. Light a small candle from one of the many stations in the church. Help yourself! Please remember to leave a donation of \$1 in the nearby receptacle.

Masses and donations for the bread & wine or sanctuary lamp are cash only, arranged through the rectory. Candles are cash only. Thank you.

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) posts daily Mass readings online at <u>usccb.org</u>; you can also have them e-mailed to you. Sign up at their website! <u>USCCB.org</u> —>Bible—> Today's Reading. Scroll down to the bottom the daily reading and sign up for the e-mail. The mailing will arrive at about 6:10am EST every morning. If you would prefer to listen to the readings, you have that option on the menu to the left of "Today's Reading." Or, if you receive the mails, scroll to the bottom and click on "Listen to an audio of this reading." You'll also find an additional link, "Watch a video reflection."

The Church provides these resources in order to make it easier (no stress!) to follow the Mass or enrich your practice when you can't visit a church. These resources are FREE, so give them a try!

My sincere thanks for the prayers you are offering for our speedy recovery and for the get well wishes and words of encouragement you sent me. I appreciate them a lot. They help to keep my spirits buoyant. Please give me a little more time before I can respond to you personally as I am not allowed to sit at my computer.

By God's grace, all of us – Fr. Jose, Sr. Daisy, and I - are improving. I am also allowed to increase gradually the time for sitting, standing and walking but always listening to my body.

In the beginning I wondered how I would pass two months in bed. But, now I really do not know how time passes. I realize I can do a lot of things even when laid up. The day is full with counseling clients in person and on phone, praying, reading, talking to relatives and friends. Nothing can really defeat the human spirit! No doubts!

I have also become more convinced of another challenging truth - that spirituality is a way of being 24/7 and not just fulfilling some religious obligations or being engaged in some spiritual practices some time during the day. The latter are only occasions to fill the oil to keep the lamp of love within me burning continuously. True spirituality, for me, is experiencing the glow and warmth of that flame of love within always and allowing it to transform my thoughts, feelings, motivations, calculations, choices, responses, and behaviors according to the mind and heart of Jesus; "for God is love and he who lives in love lives in God and God lives in him." (1 Jn 4:16)

For me, the true test of the quality of our spiritual life is this: Do I continue to experience love, peace and joy in my depths even as I am challenged by the human givens - hurting words and indifferent looks of those with whom we rub our shoulders daily, let downs and betrayals by friends and family members, wayward life of those dear to us, pride and prejudice of those in authority, lack of sufficient financial and other resources, accidents, sicknesses and losses? The ocean looks troubled by the constant moving waves that crash on to the shores; but a few feet below it is calm and serene.

Buon voyage to us in our journey into the depths!

Pope Francis Marks 25 Years as a Bishop

Pope Francis celebrated Mass on Tuesday morning in the Pauline Chapel of the Apostolic Palace, together with the members of the College of Cardinals present in the city, in order to mark the 25th jubilee of his ordination to the episcopacy.

The Dean of the College of Cardinals offered greetings and best wishes to Pope Francis on the occasion, recalling the words of St. Paul the Apostle in his Second Letter to the Corinthians, "Make room for us in your hearts," Cardinal Sodano said. "Holy Father, you need not tell us to make room for you in our hearts," he continued, pledging him all the love and reverence due the Successor to Peter.

In remarks following the Readings of the Day, the first of which was taken from the Book of Genesis, recounting the episode in which Abraham and Lot part ways, Pope Francis focused on the three imperatives that God gives the Father of Faith: "Arise!" "Look out!" "Be hopeful!"

"When Abraham was called, he was more or less our age," Pope Francis said to the elder statesmen of the Church. "He was going to retire, to go into retirement for some rest – he started out at that age."

"An old man," the Pope continued, "with the weight of old age, old age that brings pain, illness – but [God said to him], as if he were a young man, 'Get up, go, go! As if he were a scout: go! Look and hope!"

The Holy Father went on to say that the message God gave to Abraham in that day, He also gives to each of those present in this day: to be on the way, about the journey; to look toward the ever-retreating horizon, and to hope without stint, despite it all.

"There are those, who do not love us, who say that we are the 'Gerontocracy' of the Church. This is mere mockery. Whoever says so knows not what he says. We are not tired old fools [It. *geronti*]: we are grandfathers. And if we do not feel this, we must ask the grace to feel that it is so. We are grandfathers, to whom our grandchildren look – grandparents who, with our experience, must share with those grandchildren a sense of what life is really about - grandparents not closed off in melancholy over our salad days, but open to give this [gift] of meaning, of sense. For us, then, this threefold imperative: 'Arise! Look outward! Hope!" is called 'dreaming'. We are grandfathers called to dream and to pass on our dream to today's youth: they need it, that they might take from our dreams the power to prophesy and carry on their work."

After the Mass, the Holy Father greeted the Cardinal -concelebrants one-by-one. He also greeted members of the household staff and the professional staff of the Secretariat for Communications, who had done the live Vatican Radio commentary for the liturgy in several languages, including English.
