


St. Pio of Pietrelcina ("Padre Pio")

Although he would have celebrated his 133 birthday this year, St. Pio is actually a modern Saint in the history of the Catholic Church. He is the first priest on record to carry the Holy Wounds of the Lord in his hands, feet, and side. St. Pio was famous for his Mass, where one might find him levitating (like that of fellow Franciscan Friar, St. Joseph of Cupertino) as well as a confessor, where scores of people were amazed at his ability to know their personal sins and struggles and advise them. So in demand was St. Pio's time in the confessional that a ticketing program was created to ensure fairness to pilgrims who visited the friary. After 58 years of suffering with the Holy Wounds, St. Pio died on September 23, 1968.



Did you know? In order to help provide for the priestly education of his son, St. Pio's father came to the United States *twice* to find work. This was not an easy task for a Italian immigrant whose dialect was difficult to understand in parts of Italy. BOTH times he came to NEW YORK! It is very, very likely that Mr. Grazio Forgione, St. Pio's father, attended Mass at one of our churches!

Did you know? St. Pio recommended the Rosary to everyone and said countless Rosaries throughout the day. He kept a Rosary with him at all times and called it "The Weapon." St. Pio was always fighting Satan—often he would not elaborate on the many ways this happened, however we do know that he was physically assaulted by the enemy many times. If St. Pio says the Rosary is a weapon, we can believe him.



Did you know? St. Pio's name at Baptism was Francesco Forgione. He was named after St. Francis of Assisi.

Did you know? St. Pio carried the *Invisible Wounds* of the Lord for eight years, beginning on September 7, 1910. He could feel the Wounds, but they were not visible to anyone. St. Pio has said that he considers September 7th to be the day his Holy Wounds began. This is less than one month after he was Ordained to the Priesthood on August 10, 1910.

St. Pio received the *Visible Wounds* of the Lord on September 20, 1918. He carried these Wounds for an additional fifty years, until September 20, 1968.

Did you know? St. Pio offered Mass earlier than anyone else in the world. He saw this as his "first fruits" offering to God—the very first hours of his day. Preparation for his 5am Mass began with prayer around 3am. After Mass, St. Pio would take 15 minutes or so to make his thanksgiving in the sacristy before going to greet the people and begin hearing confessions.

Did you know? Care for those suffering with medical conditions were of deep concern to St. Pio. He had a dream of opening a hospital in San Giovanni Rotundo, and this was realized on May 5, 1956, when the *Casa Sollievo della Sofferenza* ("Home for Relief of Suffering") was opened. Today it is respected as one of the most advanced scientific research hospitals in Europe.

NOTE: In order to raise funds for the hospital, the Holy Father Pius XII gave St. Pio a dispensation from his vow of poverty as a Capuchin Friar.

Did you know? Like St. Theresa of Avila, **St. Pio received the Transverbation**, that is, a Holy Wound in his side. This Wound reflects the Wound the Lord received on Calvary shortly after His death, when a spear was thrust into His side, piercing His heart, in order to prove that He was, in fact, deceased. St. Pio's accounting of his Transverbation is similar to that of St. Theresa of Avila and took place on August 5, 1918. He experienced terrible, fiery pain in his heart for three days.

Did you know? St. Pio's recreational time came in the late afternoon, when he would often enjoy a beer. During World War II, American GIs would visit (the army jeep could climb the rough mountain terrain where the friary was situated). St. Pio enjoyed visiting with the Americans and also liked American beer! The American soldiers helped to bring St. Pio's story to America.

Did you know? St. Pio wore specially-made shoes that took he pressure off the Holy Wounds in his feet.

covers all aspects of Catholic teaching: revelation, scripture, theology, sacraments, and commandments. We also welcome those who seek to deepen their knowledge of the faith.


Classes start on Wednesday, September 30th.
