



The Epiphany - Sunday, January 7th

The image of the three kings following the star to Bethlehem can remind us of our own journey in life, and the stars that God has placed before us to show us the way. Here are some words of Pope Benedict on his encyclical on Hope that can help us discern and try to follow our star to Bethlehem.

"With a hymn composed in the eighth or ninth century, thus for over a thousand years, the Church has greeted Mary, the Mother of God, as "Star of the

Sea": Ave maris stella. Human life is a journey. Towards what destination? How do we find the way? Life is like a voyage on the sea of history, often dark and stormy, a voyage in which we watch for the stars that indicate the route. The true stars of our life are the people who have lived good lives. They are lights of hope. Certainly, Jesus Christ is the true light, the sun that has risen above all the shadows of history. But to reach him we also need lights close by—people who shine with his light and so guide us along our way. Who more than Mary could be a star of hope for us? With her "yes" she opened the door of our world to God himself; she became the living Ark of the Covenant, in whom God took flesh, became one of us, and pitched his tent among us (cf. Jn 1:14)." (Benedict XIV, Spei Salvi, n.49)

As we try to recognize how Mary and the saintly people in our life are those closer stars for us, let us also consider that Jesus may want us to be stars that reflect his light for the people around us.

The Baptism of the Lord - Monday, January 8th

The Baptism of the Lord marks the conclusion of the Christmas Season and the beginning of Ordinary Time. It's a feast of transition from Jesus' hidden life to that of His public ministry. Like Epiphany, the Baptism of the Lord announces Jesus' divinity to all of His first followers and to the disciples of St. John the Baptist.

First of all, it needs to be pointed out that Jesus did not need the baptism of John. John was baptizing as a call to and sign of interior repentance. Jesus had no need to repent. But, nonetheless, He comes to John. John resists at first but Jesus insists.



Lord, I believe that You are the Son of the Eternal Father and the Savior of the World.

I believe that You have brought about a new era of grace and truth
and that I am called to follow You wherever You lead.

As we begin this liturgical season of Ordinary Time,
may it be a time of extraordinary grace in which I daily heed Your voice.

Jesus, I trust in You.
