School has begun!

Our students are back to school! We are so excited that we can begin with in-person instruction. Our administration, teachers, and staff have been hard at work to prepare for this unique year. As you would have read in the school section of the bulletin, the pink spots in the parking lot are for our students. They have to gather outside first and maintain social distancing from each other before the process can begin to allow them into the school building. It has been a very trying time to have everything right. I ask for your prayers and patience for all those in our school as we strive to follow the proper protocols to ensure our students and all of staff remain healthy and safe. Just a reminder that daily Mass at St. Augustine will be at 8:30 AM during the academic school year.

Sanctus Bells and Incense at Holy Mass

Last weekend at St. Augustine and this weekend at Holy Family, our altar servers have received updated training, appropriate for this pandemic time. Instead of having four altar servers, we will have one server (unless they are of the same household or have made appropriate arrangements). There has been both a broadening and a lessening of duties. During training, they were given instruction on how to use the Sanctus bells and the incense. While I thought that would be incorporated somewhere down the line, the enthusiasm and willingness of these newly trained altar servers have encouraged me to move forward!

One of the beautiful things about the Divine Liturgy is how it is meant to lift our thoughts and minds to Heaven. It is meant to transport us to something beyond the temporal realm, where we are reminded of the eternal mysteries that never change but are mysteriously always new. To convey this mystery even more, if preferable to the priest, the Sanctus bells and/or incense will be used as servers are capable.

Bells for liturgical use can be seen in the Old Testament: on the vestments worn by the high priest (Exodus 28:33-35 & Sirach 45:9). They were worn because we are called to make a joyful noise to the Lord but also because it was believed that they could help against evil spirits. In Zechariah 14:20, we see it as a sign of adoration as "Holy to the Lord" were inscribed on the bells!

"The use of bells in the Church dates back to the fifth century, when Saint Paulinus, the Bishop of Nola, introduced them as a means to summon monks to worship. In the seventh century Pope Sabinianus approved the use of bells to call the faithful to the Mass. The Venerable Bede, an English saint of the eighth century, is credited with the introduction of bell ringing at Requiem Masses. By the ninth century the use of bells had spread to even the small parish churches of the western Roman Empire"

Incense is an expression of reverence and prayer. Psalm 141:2 (140:2 - Douay Rheims) states: "Let my prayer be directed as incense in thy sight." St. Paul reminds us in 2 Corinthians 2:15 that "we are the aroma of Christ to God." The use of incense is also seen in Revelation 5:8 in Heaven! Incense is the sacramental sign that engages many of our senses: we can see it, smell it, and even hear it! Did you also know that incense is used to kill viruses and bacteria? "In Biblical times, myrrh incense often in combination with frankincense — was burned in places of worship to help purify the air and prevent the spread of contagious diseases, including those caused by bacteria. One recent study found that burning myrrh and frankincense incense reduced airborne bacterial counts by 68%" (source: https://www.healthline.com/nutrition/ myrrh-oil#TOC_TITLE_HDR_2). Guess the wise men that visited the King knew what they were doing! We'll definitely do some research into acquiring myrrh and frankincense incense!

The way incense is used also has meaning. Three swings of the incense is used for Christ or a representation/ representative of Christ: this is why there will be three swings to the crucifix, the Paschal Candle, the priest, and the people of God! Two swings are given to things that point to the saints such as images, statues, and relics. One swing is offered around the altar (this is why the priest would be in motion as he incenses the altar).

COVID 19 NEWS

Archbishop Vigneron recently extended the dispensation from the obligation to attend Holy Mass through Monday, November 23rd. Our parishes, as did most in the Archdiocese, resumed the offering of public Mass with all safety measures in place. The dispensation is meant to protect those most vulnerable in the pandemic. Catholics who engage in other activities that would present a similar or greater risk of contamination (eating out at restaurants, traveling, non-essential shopping, widening one's circle of contacts, etc.) should consider returning to Sunday Mass. One should not use the dispensation as a convenient excuse to avoid Holy Mass on our Lord's Day. While during this time of dispensation it is not considered a mortal sin to miss Sunday Mass, we deprive ourselves of the immeasurable spiritual graces Our Lord desires for us when we actively participate in Holy Mass. The third commandment to keep holy the Lord's Day has not been dispensed with: therefore, every Catholic should seek to sanctify their Sundays with additional time for prayer and observing time for rest. At every offering of Holy Mass, please know that ALL safety precautions remain.

As you arrive for worship, please wear a mask and sanitize your hands as you enter the church. Current guidelines permit 50% of our occupancy capacity. To allow family groups to sit together while maintaining proper social distancing, those attending alone or with smaller groups are asked to be considerate in their seating choices.

Our region is currently in Phase 4 of the *Michigan Safe Start Plan*. In this phase, other non-liturgical gatherings are only allowed insofar as there are 10 or fewer participants. Masks and social distancing measures are still required. This restriction will be affecting many of the parish groups who typically resume activities as summer ends. All parish groups are asked to *please contact the parish office to confirm your group's arrangements prior to reconvening and how you will observe and adhere to the limit of 10 participants or fewer.*

Q. Is it a sin to get a tattoo? I was told that the Bible condemns tattoos.



A. There are some Christian communities that teach any tattoo is a sin. However, there are not nearly as many teaching this as there were 50 or 75 years ago. The verse in the Bible that is most often cited is Leviticus 19:28, which says, "You shall not make any cuttings in your flesh for the

dead, or any marks upon you your skin: I am the Lord." When you look at this verse in context, you will see that Moses is specifically dealing with pagan religious rituals as he proclaims God's Law." Verses 6-8 could be construed to forbid eating leftovers after the second day. Verse 27 forbids men to trim their sideburns or beard. Yet most of these same Christian communities never tried to apply these verses. You can't just pick and choose what you like and don't like out of Scripture.

Sacred Scripture must be viewed through the lens that the Catholic Church looks through. These questions must be answered: 1. Who is addressing whom? 2. What is the original language being used? 3. What was the intended message of the author? 4. What are the idioms of this language at that time in history? There are few of us today who are fluent in ancient Hebrew, Aramaic, Greek, and Latin in order to rightly answer these questions. The Church draws on 2,000 years of such people who have passed their knowledge down to us.

Anyone getting a tattoo today must honestly ask themselves, why am I getting this and what is the meaning of this design? Is this any kind of a satanic symbol, or expression of witchcraft, or some sort of idolatry or pagan symbol? If so, as Christians, we should drop the idea. The ice here is way to thin. Don't venture out onto it.

When we consider the context of Leviticus 19, we see that it is not forbidding all expressions of tattoos. Culturally and specifically here in the US, tattoos, over the last 25 years, have become more socially acceptable. A recent study by Pew Research claims roughly 40 percent of Millenials have tattoos. It's no longer just drunken sailors or outcasts of society with tattoos; moms, doctors, attorneys, entertainers, even pastors can be found with tattoos. The term "tramp stamp" is disappearing from our vocabulary.

God is much more concerned with the condition of our hearts than He is with our outside appearance. The Bible says in Revelation19:16 that Jesus has written on His thigh the words: "KING OF KINGS AND LORD OF LORDS."

The question still remains: Is it wrong for <u>ME</u> to get a tattoo? It comes down to personal conviction and we must never try to ignore God's dealing with us personally. But, neither should we try to push our personal convictions on others. Ultimately, the decision should be a prayerful one between you and God.


