EIGHTH GRADE SOCIAL STUDIES: AMERICAN HISTORY

Social studies are the integrated study of the social sciences and the humanities to promote civic competence. The primary purpose of social studies is to help young people develop the ability to make informed and reasoned decisions for the public good as citizens of a diverse, democratic society in an interdependent world. (National Council for Social Studies)

Grading:

Weighted values are assigned as follows-

First and third quarters: Class Work (can include participation) = 30%, Daily Homework= 10%, Quizzes= 20%, Tests/Projects= 40%

Second and fourth quarters: Class Work (can include participation) = 25%, Daily Homework= 10%, Quizzes= 20%, Tests/Projects= 35%, Final= 10%

Absences:

Class work and homework that are missed because of an absence may be turned in no later than 3 school days after the student returns to school. Long-term projects may still be due on the date assigned, if reasonable. If not, an extension of no more than 3 days may be given. Absence work is recorded as a "1" in the grade book. If not completed within the allotted time, the grade becomes a "o".
