Summer reading is very important! Students who love to read will see success in school. This begins at home where students are encouraged to read, their parents set an example of reading in front of them, and their parents read aloud to them. Becoming a good reader takes practice. Offer your children quiet times and good places to enjoy reading. Read aloud to them on a regular basis: students whose parents do so perform better on standardized test, have larger vocabularies, and find more success in all subjects.

- Visit your local public library often. Join their summer reading club and earn prizes. They
 have everything from story times, magicians, and animal visitors for the younger. They will
 also have Lego days and STEM programming.
- 2. Bluebonnet books. The Bluebonnet program is a program in Texas for rising 3rd-6th graders that St. Mark takes part. The public library will have the books available, and all of our students will be given a bookmark with all the titles so they can keep track of what they read over the summer.
