Baptism: Parents are to call Bertha at x221 or email office@stelizabethdallas.org to schedule an appointment to arrange for the Baptismal class. Both parents and godparents are required to take the class. These classes are held in our parish on the 2nd Saturday of each month at 2:00 PM in the Grahmann Center. Upon completion, a certificate is issued which remains valid for a three year period. After the class is completed, then a baptismal time will be scheduled.

Fourth Sunday of Lent

From the Desk of the Parochial Vicar



Illumined by Christ to walk in newness of life.

The Gospel passage for us this Sunday is drawn from the second discourse of the seven 'I AM's in the Gospel of John that portray the salvific divine identity of Jesus Christ. In John 8,12 Christ says "I am the light of the world" and consequently whoever becomes his disciple will be freed from the slavery of sin and therefore will have the light of life. An affirmation that the

Pharisees refuse to accept by questioning the divine identity of Jesus. In the passage that we read today of Christ's restoring the sight to the man born blind, St. John wants us to appreciate better the processes of a new birth in Christ through baptism for those who believe in him. The blind man was sent to go and bath at the water of Siloam after the healing touch on his eyes.

Being blind or walking in darkness in the scripture symbolizes living in sin. The Incarnation as well as the Paschal mystery emphasizes this contrast between light and darkness. By his Incarnation, Christ came to dispel darkness in the world. In the Paschal

mystery, he sealed the victory of this light over the darkness of sin and every baptized person is called to walk, illumined by the paschal light.

The society in which we live today unfortunately is not totally immune from the influence of the darkness of the evil one. It is therefore only those who by God's grace, believe in Christ and His Gospel, will be capable of living a holy life, a life pleasing to God, a life that gives true meaning and happiness, a life that is free and true. From being purified in water of baptism and illumined by Christ, the Christian becomes a true disciple capable of overcoming the power of sin. He or she becomes an instrument of the light of Christ. We received this grace in baptism; being saved from sin to life in God, and called to live in every kind of goodness, righteousness and truth (Eph 5.8).

Let us open our hearts to Christ asking him to heal us of our spiritual blindness that make us wrongly place our values on things of this world alone: the unfettered selfishness in us at the expense of our neighbor's need; those unjust desires for things of this world at the expense of the salvation of our souls; the rancour, hatred and prejudice towards our neighbors and above all the subtle tendency in us that make us not put priority in building a strong loving relationship with God.

May your light O Lord, dispel the darkness in our souls and make us see and believe in the wonderful works of your salvation. Amen!

Catechism of the Catholic Church

Christ's Whole Life is Mystery

515 The Gospels were written by men who were among the first to have the faith and wanted to share it with others. Having known in faith who Jesus is, they could see and make others see the traces of his mystery in all his earthly life. From the swaddling clothes of his birth to the vinegar of his Passion and the shroud of his Resurrection, everything in Jesus' life was a sign of his mystery. His deeds, miracles and words all revealed that "in him the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily." His humanity appeared as "sacrament", that is, the sign

and instrument, of his divinity and of the salvation he brings: what was visible in his earthly life leads to the invisible mystery of his divine sonship and redemptive mission.

561 "The whole of Christ's life was a continual teaching: his silences, his miracles, his gestures, his prayer, his love for people, his special affection for the little and the poor, his acceptance of the total sacrifice on the Cross for the redemption of the world, and his Resurrection are the actualization of his word and the fulfilment of Revelation" John Paul II, CT 9).




