

My Dearest Jesus,


I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament.

## I am the Good Shepherd!

The shepherd calls his own sheep by name. (John 10:3)

Good Shepherd Sunday often brings bucolic scenes to mind. Picture a well-groomed shepherd, crook in hand, seated peacefully in lush, green pastures, surrounded by docile sheep. It's beautiful, isn't it?

But such an image falls short on two counts. First, shepherd and flock are often dirty and decidedly *not* peaceful. Second, Jesus called himself a "shepherd" as a rebuke to the Jewish leaders who had just rejected him and cast out a man he had cured of blindness. A true shepherd, Jesus told them, knows his sheep well and leads them with care. And Jesus, the *good* shepherd, goes so far that he "lays down his life for the sheep" (John 10:11).

We can read Jesus' words here as a course correction for his opponents, but we can learn something for ourselves as well. For we are all shepherds for God's people in one way or another. We are all called to care for his people by following in Jesus' footsteps. Our "flock" may include our children, our parents, or our catechism class. We may be quiet shepherds welcoming a new family at church or mentoring a coworker. But no matter who is in our flock, we need to remember that the sheep belong to Jesus and not to us. He treasures each one of them and wants us to reflect his own love and self-sacrifice.

So ask yourself, "How well do I know my sheep? Do I know the names of my coworkers or fellow parishioners? Do I know the challenges my loved ones are facing?" Sometimes we are so busy with our own affairs that we overlook the hurt, weariness, or fear in someone right next to us. But following Jesus' example, we can set aside our concerns, "call them by name," and listen to their needs. Perhaps we can even lead them to a place of peace. That's one small way to be a shepherd for God's sheep.

"Jesus, help me to lay down my life for your sheep today."

## ¡Yo soy el buen pastor!

El pastor llama a su propia oveja por su nombre. (Juan 10:3)

El Domingo del Buen Pastor a menudo trae escenas bucólicas a la mente. Imagínate a un pastor bien arreglado, ladrón en mano, sentado pacíficamente en exuberantes pastos verdes, rodeado de ovejas dóciles. Es hermoso, ¿no?

Pero tal imagen se queda corta en dos cargos. En primer lugar, el pastor y el rebaño a menudo están sucios y decididamente no son pacíficos. Segundo, Jesús se llamó a sí mismo un "pastor" como una reprimenda a los líderes judíos que acababan de rechazarlo y expulsó a un hombre que había curado de la ceguera. Un verdadero pastor, les dijo Jesús, conoce bien a sus ovejas y las guía con cuidado. Y Jesús, el buen pastor, va tan lejos que "da su vida por las ovejas" (Juan 10:11).

Podemos leer las palabras de Jesús aquí como una corrección de curso para sus oponentes, pero también podemos aprender algo por nosotros mismos. Porque todos somos pastores del pueblo de Dios de una manera u otra. Todos estamos llamados a cuidar de su pueblo siguiendo los pasos de Jesús. Nuestro "rebaño" puede incluir a nuestros hijos, nuestros padres o nuestra clase de catecismo. Podemos ser pastores tranquilos dando la bienvenida a una nueva familia en la iglesia o asesorando a un compañero de trabajo. Pero no importa quién esté en nuestro rebaño, debemos recordar que las ovejas pertenecen a Jesús y no a nosotros. Atesora a cada uno de ellos y quiere que reflejemos su propio amor y sacrificio.

Así que pregúntate: "¿Qué tan bien conozco a mis ovejas? ¿Conozco los nombres de mis compañeros de trabajo o de mis compañeros de feligres? ¿Sé los desafíos que enfrentan mis seres queridos?" A veces estamos tan ocupados con nuestros propios asuntos que pasamos por alto el daño, el cansancio o el miedo en alguien a nuestro lado. Pero siguiendo el ejemplo de Jesús, podemos dejar de lado nuestras preocupaciones, "llámalas por su nombre" y escuchar sus necesidades. Tal vez podamos llevarlos a un lugar de paz. Esa es una pequeña manera de ser un pastor de las ovejas de Dios.

"Jesús, ayúdame a dar mi vida por tus ovejas hoy."

Jesus, the Good Shepherd, call out to us when we are straying from the course you've set, lead us when we are lost. Even when we stand at the gate unwilling to enter, we pray that you will patiently wait for us to follow. Amen.

#### St. Joseph the Worker, Feast Day May 1

To foster deep devotion to Saint Joseph among Catholics, and in response to the "May Day" celebrations for workers sponsored by Communists, Pope Pius XII instituted the feast of Saint Joseph the Worker in 1955. This feast extends the long relationship between Joseph and the cause of workers in both Catholic faith and devotion. Beginning in the Book of Genesis, the dignity of human work has long been celebrated as a participation in the creative work of God. By work, humankind both fulfills the command found in Genesis to care for the earth (Gn 2:15) and to be productive in their labors. Saint Joseph, the carpenter and foster father of Jesus, is but one example of the holiness of human labor.



Jesus, too, was a carpenter. He learned the trade from Saint Joseph and spent his early adult years working side-by-side in Joseph's carpentry shop before leaving to pursue his ministry as preacher and healer. In his encyclical *Laborem Exercens*, Pope John Paul II stated: "the Church considers it her task always to call attention to the dignity and rights of those who work, to condemn situations in which that dignity and those rights are violated, and to help to guide [social] changes so as to ensure authentic progress by man and society."

Saint Joseph is held up as a model of such work. Pius XII emphasized this when he said, "The spirit flows to you and to all men from the heart of the God-man, Savior of the world, but certainly, no worker was ever more completely and profoundly penetrated by it than the foster father of Jesus, who lived with Him in closest intimacy and community of family life and work."





To capture the devotion to Saint Joseph within the Catholic liturgy, in 1870, Pope Pius IX declared Saint Joseph the patron of the universal Church. In 1955, Pope Pius XII added the feast of Saint Joseph the Worker. This silent saint, who was given the noble task of caring and watching over the Virgin Mary and Jesus, now cares for and watches over the Church and models for all the dignity of human work.

Students have online assignments that have already been assigned and will continue with this online program. #### High School: (9th - 12th)

Blanco and Johnson City High School Teens can join RICH (Resting in Christ's Hands). We utilize the Life Teen Program. Life Teen is an environment in which high school youth can come into a relationship with God through spiritual, educational, emotional and social experiences. Our Youth Ministry follows the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USSCB) guidelines for comprehensive youth ministry

programs. Our classes are held every Sunday at St. Ferdinand Parish Hall. We start the evening at 5:30 pm with a light meal and move into the lesson and discussion for the evening.

Blanco and Johnson City Middle School Students can join EDGE Youth Ministry. EDGE is a part of the Life Teen middle school youth ministry. We meet once a month on the  $4^{th}$  Sunday of each month, from 1:00 pm – 3:00 pm.
