FATHER TOM'S TIDBITS



Dear Friends.

On this Sunday and the next two Sundays, we break from reading the Gospel of Matthew to read from John's Gospel. The Gospel of John is the only Gospel not assigned to a particular liturgical year. Instead, readings from John's Gospel are interspersed throughout our three-year liturgical cycle.

In today's Gospel, the dialogue between Jesus and a woman from Samaria is among the most lengthy found in Scripture. The most startling aspect of the conversation is that it happens at all. Jesus, an observant Jew of that time, was expected to avoid conversation with women in public. The animosity between the Jews and the Samaritans

should have prevented the conversation as well. The woman herself alludes to the break from tradition: "How can you, a Jew, ask me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?" Yet Jesus not only converses with the woman, he also asks to share her drinking vessel, an action that makes him unclean according to Jewish law.

The initial conversation between Jesus and the woman is better understood if we consider the importance of water, especially in the climate of Israel. At first, the woman understands Jesus' promise of "living water" in a literal sense: "Sir, give me this water, so that I may not be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water." With no running water, the daily trip to the well by the women of the community was of paramount importance. The women of the town would have traveled to the well in the early morning, but this woman came to the well at noon, the hottest time of the day. The timing of her visit is a clear sign that she is an outcast within the Samaritan community. We learn in her conversation with Jesus that she is an outcast because of her "many husbands."

Behind the conversation lies the animosity and rivalry between the Jews and the Samaritans. Samaritans shared Jewish ancestry, but Samaritans had intermarried with foreigners when they lived under the rule of the Assyrians. Samaritan religion included worship of Yahweh, but was also influenced by the worship of other gods. When the Jews refused Samaritan help in the building of the Temple at Jerusalem, the Samaritans eventually built a temple for themselves at Mt. Gerizim. Like the Jews, the Samaritans believed that a Messiah would come.

The high point of the conversation is when Jesus reveals himself to her as the Messiah. His answer to the Samaritan woman's questions about worship is meant to predict a time when worshiping in truth and spirit will become the way to worship.

After the conversation, the Samaritan woman becomes a disciple. Even though she is an outcast and not a Jew, she returns to her town to lead others to Jesus and to wonder whether she has found the Messiah. The Samaritan townspeople return with her to meet Jesus for themselves, and many are said to come to believe in him.

The significance of the encounter between Jesus and the Samaritan woman has many levels. The first is personal: The woman is herself converted to belief in Jesus as Messiah because he knows her sin but speaks with her just the same. The second is social: Having come to know Jesus as the Messiah, the Samaritan woman becomes an evangelist to her own people.

The third level of the story is educational: Jesus uses his encounter with the Samaritan woman to teach his disciples that God's mercy is without limit. The disciples return from their shopping quite confused to find Jesus talking with a Samaritan, and a woman at that! But the conversion of the Samaritan townspeople is a foretaste of the kind of open community that will be created among those who believe that Jesus is the Messiah.

Pro Labore Dei, a Catholic sponsored organization, serving the poor in the Robbins area, is in dire need of sandwiches for distribution to the poor next Saturday, March, 21st. We have agreed to make the 200 plus sandwiches that Pro Labore Dei needs. So, we are in need of volunteers who would be willing to help us in making these sandwiches. We will be making them next Saturday morning, March 21st, starting at 9AM in the parish life center. Any help you can give us would be greatly appreciated. Just come to the parish center at 9AM!

I want to thank everyone for your patience and understanding as we instituted the directives from the archdiocese concerning the Corona Virus/COVID-19 this past weekend. They will be in place until further notice.

This weekend we welcome the Cardinal Joseph Bernardin School Athletic Program, who will be joining us for the 10AM Mass today. Thank you for joining us in prayer.

This Tuesday, March 17th, is Election Day. We, here at St. Stephen's, will be the new voting location for seven local precincts In our immediate area. The polling places will be in our Parish Life Center and the polls will be open from 6AM until 7PM. I encourage everyone to remember to vote!!

Archidiecezja Chicago



W dalszym ciągu z niepokojem monitorujemy pytanie dotyczące rozprzestrzeniania się Coronavirus/COVID-19. Ze względów ostrożności następujące wytyczne, opracowane przez Komitet ds. Kultu Bożego USCCB, mają zostać natychmiast wdrożone we wszystkich parafiach Archidiecezji Chicago.

Wszyscy kapłani, diakoni, ministranci oraz nadzwyczajni safarze Komunii Świętej, musza umyc ręce przed Msza św. oraz stosować antybakteryjny roztwór na bazie alkoholu przed i po rozdaniu Komunii

Świętej.

Wszyscy proszeni są o powstrzymanie się od kontaktu fizycznego podczas Znaku Pokoju (uwaga: Znak Pokoju można wymienić bez kontaktu fizycznego)

Powstrzymaj się od rozdawania Komunii Świętej wiernym z kielicha.

Biorąc pod uwagę częstotliwość bezpośredniego kontaktu ze śliną podczas rozdawania Komunii Świętej "na język", każda osoba powinna dołożyć wszelkich starań, aby w tym czasie przyjąć Komunię Świętą ze czcią w otwartych rękach.

Powstrzymaj się od trzymania się za ręce podczas Modlitwy Pańskiej.

Powstrzymaj się od używania kropielnicy z woda święcona.

Jeśli jesteś chory lub doświadczasz objawów choroby, nie jesteś zobowiązany do uczęszczania we Mszy św., a nawet z miłosierdzia i roztropności, nie powinieneś w niej uczestniczyć w trosce o innych wiernych. Kościół pozwala opuścić Mszę z poważnych powodów, takich jak choroba.

Te środki ostrożności i procedury będą obowiązywać do odwołania.

SPOTKANIE Z SAMARYTANKĄ

W trzecią niedziele Wielkiego Postu liturgia kościoła stawia nam przed oczami niezwykłe spotkanie Jezusa z Samarytanką. Jest to dla nas okazja aby się zastanowić nad naszym spotkaniem z drugim człowiekiem. Jak ono wygląda? Czy jest okazją do twórczej rozmowy? Czy może w naszym postępowaniu unikamy niektórych ludzi.

Trzeba się cieszyć, że w naszych czasach, mimo zamknięcia się rodzin przy własnym telewizorze i z własnymi sprawami, jeszcze jakieś kontakty międzyludzkie istnieją. Ludzie spotykają się z okazji różnych uroczystości rodzinnych, takich jak imieniny, chrzty, śluby, pogrzeby. Znane są spotkania organizowane przez władze samorządowe czy państwowe...

Cieszą kontakty dzieci mieszkających dalej od rodziny ze swoimi rodzicami czy rodzeństwem. Godne podziwu jest spotykanie się członków rodzin na wieczerzy wigilijnej przed Bożym Narodzeniem. Niektórzy przemierzają wtedy setki kilometrów, by tylko zobaczyć się z najbliższymi, by spożyć razem kolację i złożyć sobie życzenia. Są to dobre kontakty.

Warto wspomnieć o kontaktach z chorymi, przebywającymi w domach czy szpitalach. Dobrze, że nie utrudniają tych wizyt dyrekcje placówek medycznych, nie stwarzają – jak to było kiedyś – wygórowanych ograniczeń. Człowiek chory nawet lepiej poddaje się leczeniu, gdy ma świadomość, że ktoś o nim pamięta i go odwiedza.

Mówiąc o kontaktach z ludźmi, trzeba wspomnieć o kontaktach Jana Pawła II z Polakami oraz innymi narodami świata. Ile radości, ile podniesienia na duchu dały nam spotkania pielgrzymkowe z Ojcem Świętym. Przecież mogło być jak dawniej, kiedy to papieże niezbyt chętnie opuszczali Watykan. Jan Paweł II rozumiał dobrze wartość spotkania z bliźnimi. Pozostaje mieć nadzieję, że jego następcy będą nadal brali z niego przykład.

Dotychczas pokrótce wskazałem na niektóre tylko pozytywne przykłady kontaktów międzyludzkich. Niestety czasem pojawia się też niechęć do kontaktów, omijanie drugich. Problem ten nie jest nowy, jest znany już od wieków. Jego ślady znajdujemy w dzisiejszej Ewangelii:

Nadeszła tam kobieta z Samarii, aby zaczerpnąć wody. Jezus rzekł do niej: «Daj Mi pić». Jego uczniowie bowiem udali się przedtem do miasta dla zakupienia żywności. Na to rzekła do Niego Samarytanka: «Jakżeż Ty, będąc Żydem, prosisz mnie, Samarytankę, bym Ci dała się napić?». Żydzi bowiem nie utrzymuja stosunków z Samarytanami.

I tu Jezus przełamał niechęć Żydów do Samarytan. Żydzi ich omijali. Żaden Żyd nie wdałby się w rozmowę z kobietą pochodzenia samarytańskiego i nigdy nie prosiłby jej o wodę. Nie pozwoliłaby mu na to jego duma. Nic dziwnego, że nawet uczniowie Jezusa byli zdumieni, że rozmawia On z Samarytanką.

Takie uprzedzenia do drugich powtarzają się od wieków. Stąd omijanie ludzi. Dzieje się tak również w naszym życiu. Ile tego omijania się jest w naszych rodzinach. Znamy sytuacje, w których siostra omija siostrę, brat omija brata, nawet dzieci dorosłe omijają swoich rodziców z byle jakiego powodu.

A spójrzmy na uprzedzenia na tle religijnym. Wciąż daleko do sympatii międzywyznaniowej i ewangelicznego patrzenia na prawosławnych, ewangelików, baptystów, metodystów czy adwentystów. Z przykrością obserwuje się nasz stosunek do świadków Jehowy. Nie zgadzamy się z tym, co oni głoszą, ale nie można ich upokarzać. Jezus nie upokorzył Samarytanki, lecz życzliwie z nią rozmawiał. Interesująco skomentował tę sytuację egzegeta ks. prof. Stanisław Grzybek:

Samarytanka ani jej rodacy nie szukali Chrystusa. To On sam ich znalazł, to On sam się do nich przybliżył, to On obalił wszelkie bariery, jakie oddzielały Samarytan od Żydów, niwecząc tym samym dawne zwyczaje, uświęcone długowiekową tradycją. Dobrowolnie i świadomie podszedł do człowieka ze swoją łaską. Uczniowie Chrystusa dziwili się, kiedy wrócili z miasta, że Jezus rozmawia z niewiastą samarytańską. W ich pojęciu, jak i w pojęciu wszystkich Żydów, Samarytanie byli społecznością znienawidzoną, niegodną uwagi. Wydarzenie to utwierdza nas w przekonaniu, że dla Chrystusa nie jest ważna rasa, pochodzenie, język czy kolor skóry, ważne jest tylko to, że każdy człowiek potrzebuje zbawienia.

Tak, dla Chrystusa nie była ważna rasa, narodowość. A ile w nas uprzedzeń?

Przykład pozytywny. W jednym z polskich muzeów znajduje się wzruszająca rzeźba. Oto polska pielęgniarka w pozie klęczącej opatruje leżącego na ziemi niemieckiego żołnierza, który został ranny w walce z partyzantami AK. Dla niej nie była ważna narodowość i to, że może przed chwilą z jego rąk zginął lub został ranny polski partyzant. To był żołnierz potrzebujący pomocy (rzeźba w Muzeum Regionalnym Braci Chmielarskich w Krzepicach).

Korzystając z dzisiejszej Ewangelii, uczmy się nie omijać drugich i zwalczać wszelkie uprzedzenia. Niech Wielki Post będzie czasem naszego powrotu do tej Chrystusowej postawy. Może i On czeka na nas przy jakiejś studni? Może taką studnią będą dobrze przeżyte rekolekcje wielkopostne? Może taką studnią będzie sakrament pokuty?

To będzie najlepsze przygotowanie się do przeżycia Triduum Paschalnego i Wielkanocy.

LENTEN REGULATIONS

As we enter into the Season of Lent, we want to remind you of our Lenten regulations:

 Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics, 14 years old and older, on Ash Wednesday and all

Fridays of Lent.

 Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age and not yet 59. Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted, if necessary, to maintain strength according to one's needs. but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

The Season of Lent is a preparation for the celebration of Easter. By the threefold discipline of fasting, almsgiving, and prayer, the Church observes Lent from Ash Wednesday until the evening of Holy Thursday. All of the faithful should undertake serious practice of these three traditions.

LENTEN RECONCILIATION SERVICE

As part of our Lenten journey we invite you to join us for a special time of prayer reconciliation and healing. Individual confessions will he heard. Come by yourself, come as a family, or invite a friend who has not experienced the sacrament

Reconciliation in some time. Join us as we experience the gracious mercy of God's love! The sacrament of penance is an experience of the gift of God's boundless mercy.

Everyone is invited and encouraged to attend our Lenten Parish Reconciliation Service on Tuesday, March 31st, at 7:30PM. Several additional priests will be available to hear private confessions and help us prepare our hearts for the passion, death and Resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

Since we will have additional priests available, we encourage everyone to avail themselves of this opportunity to share in the Sacrament of Reconciliation at this time and not wait until the last Saturday, April 4th, that confessions will be heard.

Our Baptismal Preparation Class for the month of March will take place next Thursday, March 26th at 7PM.

We remind all parents planning on having their child/children baptized that

they must attend a Baptismal Preparation Class prior to their child's baptism.

ARCHDIOCESE OF CHICAGO



We continue to monitor with concern the questions that are arising about the spread of Coronavirus/COVID-19. As a matter of prudence, the following guidelines, based on guidance from the USCCB Committee on Divine Worship, are to be implemented in all parishes within the Archdiocese of Chicago effective immediately.

All Priests, Deacons, Altar Servers and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion must wash their hands before Mass begins and use an alcohol based anti-bacterial solution before and after distributing Holy Communion.

During all Masses and liturgies:

- Everyone is asked to refrain from physical contact during the Sign of Peace (note: the Sign of Peace can be exchanged without physical contact)
- Refrain from distribution of Holy Communion to the faithful via the chalice.
- Given the frequency of direct contact with saliva in the distribution of Holy Communion on the tongue, we are asking everyone to receive Holy Communion reverently in open hands for the time being.
- Refrain from holding hands during the Lord's Prayer.
- Refrain from using Holy Water fonts.

If you are sick or are experiencing symptoms of sickness, you are not obliged to attend Mass, and even that out of charity you ought not to attend. The Church allows for you to miss Mass for serious reasons like illness.

These precautions and procedures will be in place until further notice.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS

The traditional Lenten practice of remembering and praying upon the last steps of Christ to His crucifixion, the Stations of the Cross, will be held every Friday during Lent at 6:30PM.



The Stations of the Cross will be preceded by Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament beginning at 5:30PM. Everyone is welcome to join us for the Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament and the Stations of the Cross.

The Stations of the Cross in Polish will be held every Friday during Lent at 7:30PM and on Tuesdays at 8:30AM in the chapel, in English.

OPERATION RICE BOWL

During Lent our Parish is participating in CRS Rice Bowl, a faith-in-action program that invites us to encounter the needs of the world with the hope of the Resurrection.



"CRS has changed my life—and the life of my family," says Gaudencia, Yvone's aunt. "Before, I could tell Yvone wasn't healthy. But now, she's active." Gaudencia is proud of what she's learned from the CRS program about healthy eating habits. She has taught her family to vary what they eat and include vegetables with every meal.

Yvone's grandfather, Eliakim, suffers from diabetes. The improved diet has helped make him healthier. "What I have learned is really good, and I have seen positive changes in my health," says Eliakim. "I have benefited a lot from Gaudencia's participation with CRS."

Eliakim also thinks the improved diet gives his grandchildren more energy for school and play. If the family is ever short an ingredient or has extra food, they borrow from and share with neighbors in the spirit of

community. It's that spirit—and good nutrition—that gives Yvone, her family and friends, a strong foundation from which to pursue their dreams and live a healthier life.

The same is true for Maria Ana and her fellow students in Honduras. It is hard to study and concentrate in school if you are hungry. That's why CRS provides daily lunches and snacks at Maria Ana's school. Using ingredients from CRS—like rice, beans and milk—and vegetables donated by local families, the students' mothers volunteer at the school to make lunch and a snack for the students. MARIA ANA FROM HONDUR Students will often bring containers to school with them, and save much of their lunch to take home and share with their families.



"With the food that CRS is providing, we are able to get what we need to do our best at school—and at home," Maria Ana says.



For Trinh in Vietnam, meals at home are one of her favorite things. "It is a time that is joyful," she says. "It makes me feel warm in my heart."

Trinh's favorite foods are vegetables. But just like Yvone and Maria Ana, Trinh's family works to ensure that she and her siblings have well-balanced, nutritious meals. Because fish and meat are not always available, Trinh's family sometimes leaves the house at night and wades in the deep water nearby to catch snails for food. Trinh loves to eat snails—a good source of protein and extra income. "They are chewy and crunchy," she says.

PRAYING THE LAST WORDS OF CHRIST

It is significant that Jesus prayed from the cross. Here he was, experiencing the worst torture a human being can endure, and through it all – he prayed. The prayers of Christ from the cross serve as an excellent model for our praying during this Season of Lent.

"Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they do."

Jesus of Nazareth is looking down from the cross just after he was crucified between two criminals. He sees the soldiers who have mocked, scourged, and tortured him, and who have just nailed him to the cross. But is Jesus not also thinking of his Apostles and companions who have deserted him? Right up to his final hours on earth, Jesus preaches forgiveness.

Are you holding bitterness and resentment in your heart? Who has wronged you? Are you struggling to forgive? If you can't bring yourself to forgive them, ask God to do the forgiving for you. Forgiveness is for our own benefit.

Almighty God, to whom your crucified Son prayed for the forgiveness of those who did not know what they were doing, grant that we, too, may be included in that prayer. Whether we sin out of ignorance or intention, be merciful to us and grant us your acceptance and peace: in the name of Jesus Christ, our suffering Savior. Amen.

"Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

Now it is not just the religious leaders or the soldiers that mock Jesus, but even one of the criminals. But the criminal on the right speaks up for Jesus, explaining the two criminals are receiving their just due, whereas "this man has done nothing wrong." Then, turning to Jesus, he asks, "Jesus, remember me when you come in your kingdom." What wonderful faith this repentant sinner has in Jesus. This expression offers us hope for salvation, for if we turn our hearts and prayers to Him and accept his forgiveness, we will also be with Jesus Christ at the end of our lives.

We pray for those who are suffering from their own decisions. Rather than judge them, love them. Remember we all need grace, and our past mistakes do not necessarily dictate our future. Focus on the life beyond this life, and how God's love draws us to where we need to be. Trust those who are wandering to God's care.

Lord Jesus Christ, you promised to the repentant thief the joy of paradise, enable us by the Holy Spirit to repent and to receive your grace in this world and in the world to come. Amen.

"Jesus said to his mother: "Woman, this is your son." Then he said to the disciple: "This is your mother."

Jesus and Mary are together again. What sorrow must fill Mary's heart, to see her Son mocked, tortured, and crucified. The good son that He is, Jesus is concerned about taking care of his mother.

Are you so consumed with your own pain that you are neglecting those closest you? What do your dearest loved ones need from you? Do you know how they're doing? Pray for them. Love them deeply. Show them your concern.

O Blessed Savior, who in your hour of greatest suffering expressed compassion for your mother and made arrangements for her care, grant that we who seek to follow your example may show our concern for the needs of others, reaching out to provide for those who suffer in our human family. Hear this our prayer for your mercy's sake. Amen.

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

One is struck by the anguished tone of this expression. This cry is from the painful heart of the human Jesus who must

feel deserted by His Father and the Holy Spirit, not to mention his earthly companions the Apostles. Jesus feels separated from his Father. He is now all alone, and he must face death by himself.

Jesus completely lives the human experience as we do, and by doing so, frees us from the clutches of sin.

Where and when do you feel rejected and forsaken? Remind yourself that we are never alone. In the darkest valley, God is with us.

O Lord, I call for help by day, and in the night. Listen to my prayer. My soul is troubled. Lord, do not hide your face from me.

"I thirst."

Jesus is now in shock. The wounds inflicted upon him in the scourging, the crowning with thorns, losing blood on the three-hour walk through the city of Jerusalem to Golgotha, and the nailing upon the cross are now taking their toll.

This passage implies there is more than just physical thirst. Jesus also thirsts in a spiritual sense. He thirsts for love. He thirsts for the love of his Father, who has left him unaided during this dreadful hour when He must fulfill his mission all alone. And he thirsts for the love and salvation of his people, the human race.

O blessed Savior, whose lips were dry and whose throat was parched, grant us the water of life that we who thirst after righteousness may find it quenched by your love and mercy, leading us to bring this same relief to others. Amen.

When Jesus had received the wine, he said, "It is finished."

These words are Jesus' recognition that his suffering is over and his task is completed. Jesus is obedient to the Father and gives his love for mankind by redeeming us with His death on the Cross. The phrase "It is finished" carries a sense of accomplishment. When Jesus died, He "handed over" the Spirit. Jesus remained in control to the end, and it is He who handed over his Spirit.

What needs finishing in your life? What have you begun, but not completed? What is God's calling for you — his unique mission? Are you following it? If not, what stands in the way?

O Lord Jesus Christ, who finished the work that you were sent to do, enable us by your Holy Spirit to be faithful to our call. Grant us strength to bear our crosses and endure our sufferings, even unto death. Enable us to live and love so faithfully that we also become good news to the world, joining your witness, O Christ, in whose name we pray. Amen.

"Father, into your hands I commend my spirit."

Jesus was obedient to His Father to the end, and his final words before his death on the Cross was a prayer to His Father. His own mission and that of His Father on the Cross: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but have eternal life."

What do you need to release into God's hands? Have you been trying to control outcomes and other people? Let them go. Release them into the hands of your loving Father. Are you concerned about your future? Your past? Are you confused about your present situation? Are you struggling emotionally? Spiritually? Relationally? Physically? Surrender all to God.

Father, into whose hands your Son Jesus Christ commended his spirit, grant that we, too, following his example, may in all of life and at the moment of our death entrust our lives into your faithful hands of love. In the name of Jesus who gave his life for us all. Amen.

LENTEN TAIZÉ PRAYER SERVICE

On Thursday March 26th, our music ministry will lead a Taizé prayer service in church at 7PM. The service features candlelight, periods of shared silence, short songs ("Jesus, Remember Me" is a



familiar song from the Taizé community), petitions and scripture. It's a great addition to our Lenten prayer life.

The Taizé Community is an ecumenical Christian monastic fraternity in Taizé, Saône-et-Loire, Burgundy, France. It is composed of more than one hundred brothers, from Catholic and Protestant traditions, who originate from about thirty countries across the world. It was founded in 1940 by Brother Roger Schütz, a Reformed Protestant.

Taizé has become one of the world's most important sites of Christian pilgrimage. Through the community's ecumenical outlook, they are encouraged to live in the spirit of kindness, simplicity and reconciliation. Owing to the founder's commitment, since its inception the community has evolved into an important site for Catholic–Lutheran ecumenism. A Catholic, Brother Alois, succeeded as prior after his predecessor's death in 2005.

The community, though Western European in origin, has sought to include people and traditions worldwide. They have sought to demonstrate this in the music and prayers, where songs are sung in many languages, and have included chants and icons from the Eastern Orthodox tradition. The music emphasizes simple phrases, usually lines from Psalms or other pieces of Scripture, repeated and sometimes also sung in canon. Earlier Taizé community music was conceived and composed by Jacques Berthier. Later, Joseph Gelineau became a major contributor to the music.

Ecumenical services based on this model are held in many churches throughout the world.

YOUR TAX RETURN TELLS YOU HOW GENEROUS YOU REALLY ARE

Before you file your tax return away for the year, you might want to take a minute to determine what

percentage you are giving away. Jesus told us, "Much will be required of the person entrusted with much, and still more will be demanded of the person entrusted with more." (Luke 12:48)

Your tax return tells you not only how much income God has entrusted to you last year, but also what portion you gave away. Simply take your total charitable contribution and divide by your total gross income. Move the decimal point over two places. This is the percentage you gave away last year. Are you pleased with that number? If not, make plans now to improve your giving in 2020.

Example: Total income is \$42,653. Charitable contributions are \$1,250. \$1,250 divided by \$42,653 equals .0293. Move the decimal and see that the percent that was given to charity was 2.9%.
