

Do you suppose the authors of the four Gospels were aware of today's first reading from the second book of Kings? Of course they were. The prophet Elisha fed a hundred men with twenty barley loaves in order to prove God's power. This same miracle, now multiplied by more people fed by fewer loaves, is attributed to Jesus in all four Gospels. In today's passage from John we even have the detail that the loaves were barley, reminding every pious Jew of that miracle that Elisha worked. Yet Jesus went into hiding when they wanted to make him king. It is the passage from Paul's Letter to the Ephesians that gives us the reason for this. The power of Jesus comes from God. It is not meant merely to feed us, or to provide one group with a king. There is one Lord, one faith, one God and Father of all who works through Jesus Christ and through us all. Copyright © J. S. UN SEÑOR, UNA FE

En el pasaje de hoy, tomado de Juan, incluso tenemos el detalle de que los panes eran de cebada, recordando a cada judío devoto de aquel milagro que hizo Eliseo. Sin embargo, Jesús se escondió cuando querían hacerlo rey. Es el pasaje de la Carta de Pablo a los Efesios que nos explica por qué. El poder de Jesús viene de Dios. No es simplemente para darnos de comer, o para proporcionarle un rey a un grupo. Hay un solo Señor, una sola fe, un solo Dios y Padre de todos quien obra por medio de Jesucristo y por todos nosotros. 2 Kgs 4:42-44 | Eph 4:1-6 | Jn 6:1-15

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I once saw Tony Melendez, a musician born without arms, play his guitar for the pope – with his feet – and I knew I had witnessed something exceptional, something extraordinary. We may be feeling the same way about some of the Olympic performances taking place right now. But however amazed Tony Melendez or an Olympic medal performance might make us feel, it is hard to imagine what it must have been like to experience Jesus taking a few barley loaves and fish, blessing them, and somehow feeding more than 5,000 people. How Great Thou Art, indeed! Participating in this miracle was life-changing for those who realized what Jesus had done. They were convinced, on the spot, that Jesus was a prophet, and were ready to carry him away as a king. But Jesus did not come to be an earthly king, he came to give his life for us, that we might have life with him in abundance.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

One boy gives up his lunch and Jesus feeds thousands – and there were twelve wicker baskets with fragments left over! Think of how God can multiply our gifts. Perhaps there are times we fail to share what we have, thinking it is too small to make a difference; thinking that what we bring to feed others can't possibly be worth anything. Sure, what usually happens with us isn't on a scale like today's Gospel passage, and our offering may not be "Olympic" in nature. But in sharing our gifts as Jesus calls us to – to love our neighbor and to do "small things with great love" as St. Teresa of Calcutta is purported to have said – there is no such thing as a gift or talent too small. Ask the Holy Spirit for fortitude as you strive to share your gifts.

ACTION Perhaps it's time to contact someone who has been on your mind lately. A seemingly small gesture of concern may be just the support they need right now. With the help of the Holy Spirit, perhaps you may be a source of affirmation for them, providing a catalyst that helps them discern their path more clearly.



GOSPEL REFLECTION FOR SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Through most of Lectionary Cycle B, our Sunday Gospel readings are taken from the Gospel of Mark. Over the past two Sundays, we heard how Jesus sent his disciples to share in his mission. If we were to continue reading Mark's Gospel, we would next hear his report of how Jesus feeds the crowds in the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes. Our Lectionary, however, leaves Mark's Gospel for the next several weeks and instead presents this event from the Gospel of John. In John's Gospel, Jesus' multiplication of the loaves and the fishes is presented as a sign of his authority and divinity. Jesus interprets the meaning and significance of this miracle as a sharing of his Body and Blood. This chapter is sometimes called the "Bread of Life Discourse."

In many important ways, John's Gospel uses the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes to teach about the Eucharist. Like the Last Supper, this miracle is said to have occurred near the time of the Jewish feast of Passover. (In John's Gospel three Passovers are identified.) Jesus' language is like the language he used at the Last Supper as reported in the Synoptic Gospels. John's description of this event also anticipates the Messianic banquet of heaven, as the crowd reclines, and all hungers are satisfied with abundance. This connection is further amplified by the response of the crowd, who wants to make Jesus a king. John is teaching us that each time we celebrate the Eucharist, we are anticipating the eternal banquet of heaven.

Recall that John's Gospel tells the story of the Last Supper differently than the Synoptic Gospels. Instead of describing the meal and Jesus' actions with the bread and cup, John describes how Jesus washed his disciples' feet. We hear this Gospel when we remember the Last Supper on Holy Thursday. This recollection of Jesus' action at the Last Supper complements the institution narrative of the Synoptic Gospels and Paul's Letters that we hear repeated at each Mass.

In both stories about the Eucharist—the washing of the disciples' feet and the multiplication of the loaves and the fishes—the Gospel of John teaches us that the Eucharist is an action. Our word Eucharist is taken from the Greek language and describes an action: "to give thanks." In the Eucharist we are fed by Jesus himself, and we are sent to serve others.

John's Gospel notes the detail that the bread blessed and shared with the crowd are barley loaves. This is the food of the poor. It reminds us that God feeds and nourishes us, fulfilling our physical needs as well as our spiritual ones. In the Eucharist, we are sent to serve the poorest among us.

The story of the multiplication of the loaves and the fishes recalls a particular aspect of the Mass. In this miracle, Jesus transforms a young boy's offering of five barley loaves and two fish. In the offertory at Mass, we present the fruits of our labors, represented by bread and wine. These gifts, given to us first by God as grain and fruit, are returned to God in our offering of thanksgiving. God in turn transforms our gifts, making this bread and wine the very Body and Blood of Jesus. We also offer ourselves in this exchange, and we, too, are transformed by the Eucharist.

REFLEXIÓN DEL EVANGELIO PARA EL DECIMOSÉPTIMO DOMINGO DEL TIEMPO ORDINARIO

Durante la mayor parte del ciclo del leccionario B, nuestras lecturas dominicales del Evangelio se toman del Evangelio de Marcos. Durante los dos últimos domingos, escuchamos cómo Jesús envió a sus discípulos a compartir su misión. Si continuáramos leyendo el Evangelio de Marcos, a continuación, escucharíamos su informe de cómo Jesús alimenta a las multitudes en el milagro de la multiplicación de los panes y los peces. Nuestro Leccionario, sin embargo, deja el Evangelio de Marcos para las próximas semanas y en su lugar presenta este evento del Evangelio de Juan. En el Evangelio de Juan, la multiplicación de los panes y los peces por Jesús se presenta como un signo de su autoridad y divinidad. Jesús interpreta el significado y la importancia de este milagro como compartir su Cuerpo y su Sangre. Este capítulo a veces se denomina el "Discurso del pan de vida".

De muchas formas importantes, el Evangelio de Juan usa el milagro de la multiplicación de los panes y los peces para enseñar sobre la Eucaristía. Al igual que la Última Cena, se dice que este milagro ocurrió cerca de la época de la fiesta judía de la Pascua. (En el Evangelio de Juan, se identifican tres Pascuas). El lenguaje de Jesús es similar al lenguaje que usó en la Última Cena, como se informa en los Evangelios sinópticos. La descripción de Juan de este evento también anticipa el banquete mesiánico del cielo, cuando la multitud se reclina y todos los apetitos se satisfacen con abundancia. Esta conexión se amplifica aún más por la respuesta de la multitud, que quiere hacer de Jesús un rey. Por lo tanto, Juan nos está enseñando que cada vez que celebramos la Eucaristía, anticipamos el banquete eterno del cielo.

Recuerde que el evangelio de Juan cuenta la historia de la Última Cena de manera diferente a los evangelios sinópticos. En lugar de describir la comida y las acciones de Jesús con el pan y la copa, Juan describe cómo Jesús lavó los pies de sus discípulos. Escuchamos este Evangelio cuando recordamos la Última Cena del Jueves Santo. Este recuerdo de la acción de Jesús en la Última Cena complementa la narrativa institucional de los evangelios sinópticos y las cartas de Pablo que escuchamos repetidas en cada misa.

En ambas historias sobre la Eucaristía —el lavamiento de los pies de los discípulos y la multiplicación de los panes y los peces— el Evangelio de Juan nos enseña que la Eucaristía es una acción. Nuestra palabra Eucaristía está tomada del idioma griego y describe una acción: "dar gracias". En la Eucaristía, Jesús mismo nos alimenta y nos envía a servir a los demás.

El Evangelio de Juan señala el detalle de que el pan bendecido y compartido con la multitud son panes de cebada. Esta es la comida de los pobres. Nos recuerda que Dios nos alimenta y nutre, satisfaciendo nuestras necesidades físicas y espirituales. Así, en la Eucaristía, somos enviados a servir a los más pobres entre nosotros.

La historia de la multiplicación de los panes y los peces recuerda un aspecto particular de la Misa. En este milagro, Jesús transforma la ofrenda de un niño de cinco panes de cebada y dos pescados. En el ofertorio de la Misa presentamos los frutos de nuestro trabajo, representados por el pan y el vino. Estos dones, que Dios nos dio primero como grano y fruto, se devuelven a Dios en nuestra ofrenda de acción de gracias. Dios, a su vez, transforma nuestros dones, haciendo de este pan y vino el mismo Cuerpo y Sangre de Jesús. Nosotros también nos ofrecemos en este intercambio, y también nosotros somos transformados por la Eucaristía.

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
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
