First Sunday of Advent

Jer 33:14-16 | 1 Thes 3:12-4:2 | Lk 21:25-28,34-36

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

As the days grow shorter and darker, I am especially ready for Advent wreaths and nativity sets; sparkling lights and singing angels. More than ever, I eagerly anticipate the joyful celebration of Christ's birth. But today's readings for the first Sunday of Advent point us to the end of time, when Jesus returns in glory. Wait a minute, what? I don't want to think about the dismay and fright that Jesus foretells in the Gospel, I want to think about shepherds and holy nights. We really can't do one without the other, however, and the underlying message of the readings is one of hope and reassurance: Our God keeps his promises. He is faithful to the covenants he makes. He loves us so much; he offers us new beginnings. Our God became one of us, died to save us, and will give us the strength to be ready to greet him when he comes again. "Stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand," Jesus says. Pray that our preparation for Christ's birth will make us all the more ready for his return.


GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

We are a society and culture that focuses a lot on the outward signs of preparation, and there is a lot of pressure to make it all perfect. Pinterest boards, social media groups, magazine photos, clothing catalogs: all show perfectly dressed people with perfectly adorable dogs standing in front of exquisitely perfect Christmas trees, on perfectly unblemished snow. But perfection on the exterior is not the Christian goal. Our interior preparation – how we make ourselves ready for Christ now, and at the end of time – is the focus of Advent. It is an opportunity for repentance, and a joyful new beginning in our relationship with God. It is a time to recommit ourselves to the covenant he made with us, and the psalm and the second reading offer assistance in doing so. Make time each day to dive in and explore what Scripture reveals about "conducting yourselves to please God."

PRAY Pray the psalm from the first Sunday of Advent each morning. Ask God to open your heart to ways you can be more just. He will teach you, guide you, and strengthen your heart so that you can stand upright to face whatever challenges come your way.

Your ways, O LORD, make known to me; teach me your paths, Guide me in your truth and teach me, for you are God my savior, and for you I wait all the day.

ADVENT

LIVING IN CHRIST'S LIGHT

In the northern hemisphere, Advent begins during that dark period of the solar year in which the days grow shorter and the nights longer. In the midst of this darkness the Church proclaims the approach of God's light: "The true light, which enlightens every one, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him" (John 1:9-10).

During the last half of December, when the Roman pagans celebrated the feast of the Unconquered Sun, the Church now gathers to proclaim that the divine Son has indeed come into the world and "In him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it" (John 1:4-5).

In Advent we are invited to discover anew God's presence with us, which like light illuminates ourselves and our lives, and then to share that light with others. In our world's darkness, in which many "do

not see the light of the gospel,...God who said, 'Let light shine out of darkness,' has shone in our hearts to bring to light the knowledge of the glory of God on the face of Jesus Christ" (2 Corinthians 4:4, 6).

For this reason Paul reminds us that "you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light, for light produces every kind of goodness, right relations and truth...Everything exposed by the light becomes visible" (Ephesians 5:8-9, 13).

But we not only see everything anew in God's light, but we must now live in that light. Our challenge to be bearers of God's light is what Jesus explains to us his followers. "You are the light of the world. A city set on a mountain cannot be hidden. Nor do they light a lamp and then put it under a bushel basket; it is set on a lampstand, where it gives light to all in the house. Just so, your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father (Matthew 5:14-16).



From Darkness to Light

As we prepare to celebrate the divine incarnation of Christ at Christmas, we anticipate how God's goodness will give us light, the light of the messiah that dawns in the birth of Christ at Bethlehem and will shine in its fullness at his coming again as king and judge. So each day, through our reading and reflection on the Scripture readings, our prayer of intimate conversation with God and our actions in imitation of Jesus, let us journey through the darkness of suffering to the experience of new life in Christ as we draw closer and closer to the One who calls us to intimacy and also wants to dwell within us. "I am coming soon. Come, Lord, Jesus! Come!" (Revelation 22:20)

During Advent, lights are part of several familiar practices in our homes. Each night as we pray with our Advent wreath, we light candles to illuminate the darkness. Beginning with one candle the first week, each week we light one more candle and can notice that the darkness is gradually receding, reminding us that through Advent we are getting closer and closer to encountering the Light of Christ at Christmas.

Lights are also commonly used to decorate our household Christmas tree and are especially beautiful when viewed in the darkness, giving off a glow that can help us recall the promise of the coming of Jesus, the light of the world.

Many homes, businesses, churches and municipalities also put up light displays to celebrate Christmas. During Advent, take a drive through your neighborhood or city at night to view the Christmas lights and reflect on how when many lights are glowing the darkness of night can be transformed—which imitates the power of God's light in Christ to illuminate our lives.



Reflecting on the Christmas Nativity Display

The custom of erecting Christmas crib or crèche to represent the mystery of the nativity is generally attributed to St. Francis of Assisi (1181–1226), who in 1223 obtained from Pope Honorius III permission to use a crib and figures of the Christ child, Mary, Joseph and others.

Pope Francis has reminded us that "the Nativity display is a catechesis about the Christmas story" and encourages us "to pause to contemplate the scene, and wonder at the marvelous way in which God wanted to come into the world be reborn in us. Let us ask for the grace of wonder before this mystery—a reality so tender, so beautiful, so close to our hearts—that the Lord may give us the grace of wonder to encounter him, to draw closer to him, to draw closer to us all. If the pandemic has forced us to be more distant, Jesus, in the Nativity scene, reminds us that the way of human tenderness is to be close to each other. Let us follow this path."

During Advent, make a mini-pilgrimage with members of your household or friends to visit several churches to view their different Nativity displays. As you drive between churches, share your impressions and thoughts by asking:

- What most fascinates me about the nativity display?
- How might I identify with the thoughts of each of the figures in the display?
- What does the Nativity display most make me wonder about in the Christmas story?
