

## PARISH LIFE

Jeremiah 20:10-13 Psalm 69:8-10, 14, 17, 33-35 Romans 5:12-15

MEDITATION: MATTHEW 10:26-33

You are worth more than many sparrows. (Matthew 10:31)

In today's Gospel, Jesus speaks to the twelve apostles as they prepare to go out and preach the good news. He's urging them to take courage and to trust in their heavenly Father's care. His words would help them as they began their missionary expedition but would also help them for the rest of their lives. Although they might face suffering or rejection, they could draw strength from remembering that they are "worth more than many sparrows" (Matthew 10:31).

The disciples probably had to cling to these words often as they went forth to witness. Not everyone accepted their preaching, and they couldn't work miracles as consistently as Jesus had (Matthew 17:16–20). But it didn't matter because their worth came not from what they did but rather from who they were: children of God. They could rely on their Father's care for them no matter what. They could trust that his love wasn't based on their success or accomplishments. It was based on the fact that he had created them in his image and likeness. He loved them, eternally, simply because he is love.

Jesus speaks these words to you today: You are worth more than many sparrows. The same Father in heaven who cared for those disciples cares for you. He sees your every joy and every difficulty and loves you through all of them. He even loves you when you stumble! He rejoices when you witness to his goodness and delights when you care for your family. He values you when you are confined to bed and all you can do is offer him your pain. He sees it all. He loves you, not because of what you do, but because of who you are.

You are more than the sum of your successes and failures. You are a beloved child of your Father in heaven—you are worth more than many sparrows.

"I trust in you, Jesus, because you care for me." The Word Among Us

Salmo 69 (68), 8-10. 14. 17. 33-35 Romanos 5, 12-15 Mateo 10, 26-33 - MEDITACIÓN: JEREMÍAS 20, 10-13 Mis perseguidores caerán por tierra y no podrán conmigo. (Jeremías 20, 11)

El profeta Jeremías no había tenido una buena semana. Fue arrestado, golpeado y encarcelado. Luego, habiendo sido liberado, pronunció un oráculo de destrucción en contra de Jerusalén y ofreció una oración llena de resentimiento acusando al Señor de haberlo "engañado" (Jeremías 20, 7). Y como si fuera poco, oró para pedir la oportunidad de ver la destrucción de sus enemigos, jy disfrutarla (20, 12)! La lectura de hoy no es exactamente la clase de oración que Jesús tenía en mente cuando dijo: "Amen a sus enemigos, y oren por quienes los persiguen" (Mateo 5, 44). Tan solo pensemos en las palabras de misericordia de Jesús en la cruz para ver cómo es que él realmente quiere que su pueblo responda a la persecución y la enemistad. Resulta consolador saber que aun un gran profeta como Jeremías tenía días malos. Nos da algo de perspectiva sobre nuestra propia vida. ¿Quién entre nosotros no ha deseado vengarse de alguien que le ha hecho daño? Sabemos que está mal, pero a veces es difícil resistirnos al resentimiento y la venganza. La verdad es que el cambio requiere tiempo y esfuerzo. Tenemos que seguir examinando nuestros pensamientos, nuestros motivos y guardando silencio hasta que desarrollemos las virtudes que reflejen el amor perfecto e incondicional de Jesús. También debemos seguir esforzándonos por mantenernos cerca del Señor para que su amor continúe formando nuestro corazón. Pero, recuerda: ¡No estás solo! Tú eres parte de una Iglesia llena de santos, tanto famosos como desconocidos, que demuestran que ese cambio es posible. También tienes amigos a quienes puedes pedir apoyo cuando lo necesites. Y lo que es más importante, tienes al Espíritu Santo, que te recuerda el amor de Jesús y te da su gracia. Jeremías tuvo muchos más días buenos que malos, porque nunca se dio por vencido; tampoco nosotros debemos darnos por vencidos. "Señor, te pido que me enseñes a amar a todos, aun a aquellas personas que hacen mi vida difícil."

# 1 ST PHOTOS OF POPE FRANCIS SINCE HIS OPERATION



On the morning of June 15, 2023, Pope Francis visited patients in the Pediatric Oncology and Child Neurosurgery Department of the Gemelli Polyclinic Hospital, announced the Vatican Press Office, which shared photos of the meeting.

These are the first images of the Pontiff since his operation on June 7 for an intestinal hernia with a risk of occlusion. The department of Pediatric Oncology and Child Neurosurgery is located on the 10th floor of the hospital, which is the same floor where the apartments of the pontiff are located. Pope Francis visited young patients, their families, and the medical staff in a wheelchair. The children welcomed him with drawings.

Pope Francis could be discharged soon: Yesterday, June 14, the Gemelli medical team announced plans to let him leave the hospital "in the next few days."

According to the Italian daily Il Fatto Quotidiano, Cardinal Giovanni Battista Re, dean of the College of Cardinals, announced in an e-mail to the cardinals that the Pope could return to the Vatican today or tomorrow, June 16.





## Saint Prosper of Aquitaine

Are human beings saved by grace or by works? Must we seek God, or does God come after us? Are some predestined to damnation or are all free to embrace salvation? Such questions that still divide Christians today embroiled St. Prosper of Aquitaine in lifelong controversies on the issue of grace versus freedom of the will.

We first meet Prosper Tiro around 425 as a participant in the Semi-Pelagian controversy that rocked the church in southern France. Semi-Pelagians minimized the role of grace in the first steps of becoming a Christian. John Cassian and others vigorously opposed Augustine's strict views that special grace was required for salvation and thus many were predestined to damnation. Prosper, a monk and lay theologian, championed Augustine. And in 428, a letter from Prosper prompted Augustine to write a major book on predestination.

In 431, Prosper went to Rome and obtained a letter from Pope Celestine I that affirmed Augustine and his views, and urged the French bishops to quell the dispute peacefully. But it raged on. For several more years Prosper wrote extensively, defending and popularizing Augustine's teaching.

In his book The Call to All Nations, Prosper seems to have mellowed somewhat, allowing that God mercifully made the grace of salvation available to all human beings. In the following excerpt Prosper describes the interplay of grace and free will:

When the word of God enters the ears through the ministry of preachers, the action of the divine power fuses with the sound of the human voice. The soul passes from one will to another will. Although the will that is driven out lingers on for a while, the newborn will claims for itself all that is better in human beings. Thus the law of sin and the law of God do not dwell in the same way and together in the same person. Then the tempter tries to ambush a person through external things, but the mind strong with God's help prevails. For there are occasions for struggle, and these greatly benefit the faithful. Their weakness is buffeted so that their holiness may not yield to pride. All good things, especially those conducive to eternal life, are obtained, increased and preserved through God's favor.

Prosper spent the last part of his life in Rome where he served as secretary to Pope St. Leo the Great. During that time he wrote the Chronicle, a universal history from Adam's fall to the Vandal's conquest of Rome in 455. He died in Rome around 465

#### MASS READINGS 12TH SUNDAY ORDINARY TIME YEAR A

- **First Reading** <u>Jeremiah</u> 20:10–13: The prophet expresses his frustration and anguish over the opposition he faces for delivering God's message. Despite the hardships, Jeremiah reaffirms his trust in God and acknowledges that God is with him, giving him strength and protecting him from his enemies.
- Responsorial Psalm Psalm 69: Call upon the Lord in faith, seeking His loving response. Endure insults and shame, trusting in His boundless kindness and mercy. Rejoice, for the Lord hears the cries of the poor and oppressed, and let all creation join in praise.
- Second Reading Romans 5:12–15: Sin and death entered the world through one man, Adam, but through the one act of righteousness by Jesus Christ, grace and eternal life are made available to all who believe. Through Adam's transgression, humanity was condemned, but through Christ's sacrificial death and resurrection, God's gift of forgiveness and justification abounds, offering reconciliation and abundant life to those who receive it.
- disciples to fearlessly proclaim His teachings, assuring them that whatever is hidden will be revealed and their actions will be brought to light. He emphasizes that they should not fear those who can harm the body, but rather fear God who holds ultimate authority over both body and soul, and promises that those who acknowledge Him before others will be acknowledged by Him in return.

# THEMES FOR THE 12TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR A

The readings for the 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A are a call to trust in God. Although our circumstances can be unsettling or frightening, God is always caring for us. The first reading Jeremiah trusts in the Lord even though he is being plotted against. The psalm expresses hope that God will hear our prayers in times of distress. The second reading reminds us that Jesus rescued us even though we are sinners. And in the gospel, Jesus tells us "Fear no one" and that we are loved and cared for by God.

- Perseverance in the face of opposition: The first reading from Jeremiah portrays the challenges and opposition that the prophet faced in fulfilling his calling. Despite the persecution, Jeremiah remained steadfast in his faith and trust in God. This theme encourages believers to persevere in their faith, even when confronted with adversity or opposition.
- Trust in God's faithfulness: Jeremiah exemplifies unwavering trust in God's faithfulness and protection, recognizing God as a "dread warrior." This emphasizes reliance on God's strength during difficulties. The Gospel stresses trust in God's providential care, assuring disciples of His awareness and urging trust in His guidance, care, and protection.

- Redemption and salvation: The second reading for the 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A delves into the concept of redemption and salvation. It discusses how sin entered the world through Adam, leading to death and separation from God. However, through the gift of Jesus Christ, redemption is offered, and believers can be reconciled with God. This theme emphasizes the transformative power of Christ's sacrifice and the opportunity for new life and salvation.
- Fear and courage: The Gospel reading from Matthew addresses fear and
  courage in the context of proclaiming the message of Christ. Jesus

. Every time you see a picture of Jesus remember that God is caring about you right now! Thank Him for His love and try to share His love and care with those around you!


