The Safe Environment compliance training and renewal training is a condition of employment and for volunteer ministry in our Archdiocese. All clergy, employees, contracted school personnel, volunteers, members of groups, movements, and organizations over the age of 18, who work, volunteer or participate in any capacity are required to complete the Archdiocesan Safe Environment Training and a criminal background check before they may begin employment or volunteer activities. Mandatory renewal training must be completed every five years and a new background check submitted before the five-year expiration of prior training.



PARISH LIFE

Be watchful! Be alert! (Mark 13:33)

Today we begin our Advent journey and prepare for Jesus' coming at Christmas. So you'd expect today's Gospel to refer to his birth. But Jesus isn't talking about Christmas when he says, "Be watchful! Be alert!" (Mark 13:33). He's urging his disciples to be vigilant as they wait for his return. We might wonder, Why are we hearing about the Second Coming? Isn't Advent about Jesus' first coming? Well, yes. But as St. Bernard of Clairvaux once said, we can ponder three "comings" of the Lord during Advent.

First, there's Jesus' coming as a baby in Bethlehem. So we can enter into the Jewish people's longing for the Messiah. Next, there's his Second Coming in glory at the end of time. We can be watchful as we ready our hearts for Jesus' return. Finally, we can experience a third coming of Jesus—his coming into our hearts right now. In fact, it is this coming of Christ that undergirds all that we do during this holy season. Jesus comes to us every day. He isn't passive; he doesn't wait for us to climb some mountain to find him. He is the initiator. He actively pursues us and seeks us out. That's why he became a man; that's why he promised to be with us always (Matthew 28:20). And that's why he seeks to come into our lives this Advent.

Jesus comes to remind us to pause in our busy lives. He comes to inspire us to pray or read his word. He reminds us that he is with us, even when we feel alone. He stirs our conscience so that we want to turn away from sin and toward his mercy. He comes to us in a friend or stranger in need of kindness. Jesus is constantly seeking ways to come to us. And the more alert we are to his coming now, the more ready we will be when he comes again.

So be alert! The Lord who loves you is walking beside you. Will you notice him?

Velen y estén preparados. (Marcos 13, 33)

Hoy iniciamos nuestro camino de Adviento y nos preparamos para la venida de Jesús en Navidad. Así que podrías esperar que el Evangelio de hoy se refiriera a su nacimiento. Pero Jesús no está hablando sobre la Navidad cuando dice: "Velen y estén preparados" (Marcos 13, 33). El Señor está exhortando a sus discípulos a estar vigilantes mientras esperan su regreso. Podríamos preguntarnos: ¿Por qué estamos oyendo sobre la Segunda Venida? ¿No se trata el Adviento de la primera venida de Jesús? Bueno, sí. Pero como una vez dijo San Bernardo de Claraval, podemos meditar en tres "venidas" del Señor durante el Adviento.

Primero, la venida de Jesús como un bebé en Belén. Así podemos adentrarnos en el anhelo del pueblo judío por el Mesías. Luego, su Segunda Venida en gloria al final de los tiempos. Podemos estar vigilantes al preparar nuestro corazón para el regreso de Jesús. Finalmente, podemos experimentar una tercera venida: Su venida a nuestro corazón en este mismo momento.

Jesús viene a nosotros todos los días. El Señor no es pasivo; él no espera que nosotros escalemos alguna montaña para encontrarlo. Jesús es el que inicia, él nos busca activamente y nos encuentra. Esa es la razón por la cual se hizo hombre; esa es la razón por la cual prometió estar con nosotros siempre (Mateo 28, 20). Y esa es la razón por la cual busca venir a nuestra vida en este tiempo de Adviento.

Jesús viene para recordarnos que debemos hacer una pausa en nuestra ajetreada vida. Viene para inspirarnos a rezar o a leer su Palabra. El Señor nos recuerda que él está con nosotros, aun cuando nos sentimos solos. Jesús conmueve nuestra consciencia de manera que nos alejemos del pecado y nos acerquemos a su misericordia. Viene a nosotros por medio de un amigo o un extraño que necesita bondad. Jesús constantemente está buscando formas de acercarse a nosotros. Y cuanto más alertas estemos ahora a su venida, más preparados estaremos cuando regrese.

IMMACULATE CONCEPTION

Why do we celebrate the Immaculate Conception?

We celebrate the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, a Holy Day of Obligation, on December 8.

In 1854, Pope Pius IX declared the dogma of the Immaculate Conception:

The Most Holy Virgin Mary was, in the very first moment of her conception, by a unique gift of grace and privilege of Almighty God and in view of the merits of Jesus Christ the Redeemer of mankind, preserved free from all stain of original sin." (Ineffabilis Deus, Apostolic Constitution of Pope Pius IX on the Immaculate Conception)

Why do we celebrate the Immaculate Conception? (Continued)

Thus, the Church teaches that the Blessed Mother was redeemed by Her Son, just as we are, but by a Divine anticipation of the merits of the Word-made-flesh. Like Eve before her, she was not subject to the Fall and thus to the prince of this world. However, unlike Eve, she would never surrender that freedom which God's grace provided her.

What is the difference between the Immaculate Conception and the Virgin Birth?

The Immaculate Conception indicates that Our Lady was preserved from the penalty of original sin from the moment of her conception. The Virgin Birth means that Jesus was conceived and born, not of man, but by the Holy Spirit.

How do we know Mary was Immaculately Conceived?

The Church teaches us that Mary was immaculately conceived. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states,

To become the mother of the Savior, Mary "was enriched by God with gifts appropriate to such a role." The angel Gabriel at the moment of the annunciation salutes her as "full of grace." In fact, in order for Mary to be able to give the free assent of her faith to the announcement of her vocation, it was necessary that she be wholly borne by God's grace.


Through the centuries the Church has become ever more aware that Mary, "full of grace" through God, was redeemed from the moment of her conception. That is what the dogma of the Immaculate Conception confesses, as Pope Pius IX proclaimed in 1854: "The most Blessed Virgin Mary was, from the first moment of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege of almighty God and by virtue of the merits of Jesus Christ, Savior of the human race, preserved immune from all stain of original sin." (CCC 490-491). EWTN

She too was saved by Christ, but in an extraordinary way, because God wanted that from the moment of conception the mother of his Son was not touched by the misery of sin.



Catholics can receive a plenary indulgence by praying before a Nativity scene

Earlier this year, on the feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the faithful gathered at the Basilica of St. Francis in Assisi, Italy, to honor the beloved Italian saint and celebrate the <u>800th anniversary</u> of the approval of the Rule of St. Francis (1223) and the creation of the Nativity scene in Greccio.

As part of the celebration of this Franciscan Centenary, the <u>Conference of the Franciscan Family</u> asked Pope Francis for the approval of this plenary indulgence.

The conference wrote: "In order to promote the spiritual renewal of the faithful and increase the life of grace, we ask that the faithful receive a plenary indulgence under the usual conditions from 8 December 2023, the solemnity of Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, to 2 February 2024, feast of the Presentation in the Temple of Our Lord Jesus Christ, by visiting the churches run by Franciscan families throughout the world and stopping in prayer in front of the Nativity scenes set up there." The Apostolic Penitentiary welcomed the request, allowing the faithful to receive this indulgence under the usual conditions. Those who are sick or unable to participate physically can obtain the indulgence by offering their sufferings up to the Lord or by

What is a plenary indulgence?

"carrying out practices of piety."

A plenary indulgence is a grace granted by the Catholic Church through the merits of Jesus Christ, Mary, and all the saints to remove the temporal punishment due to sin. The indulgence cleanses a person of all temporal punishment due to sin. However, it must always be accompanied by a full detachment from sin.

Conditions to receive a plenary indulgence in all cases:

- 1. Detachment from all sin, even venial.
- 2. Sacramental confession, holy Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the pope. Sacramental confession and receiving the Eucharist can happen up to about 20 days before or after the act performed to receive a plenary indulgence.

It is appropriate that Communion and the prayer take place on the same day that the work is completed. One sacramental confession is sufficient for several plenary indulgences. However for each plenary indulgence one wishes to receive, a separate reception of the Eucharist and a separate prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father are required.

Prepare an Advent wreath: three purple candles, one pink candle, and some evergreens. Place all on a tray or large plate. The candles can symbolize hope, faith, joy, and love or peace. Light the first purple candle and pray to God about the things you hope for.

Make a nativity scene with household materials. Paint paper tubes to make the Holy Family. Use bits of fabric to make clothes. Use a shoebox to make the barn and a small box for the manger Wait for Christmas Day to put Jesus in the manger.

The Christmas story begins with one small family set to change the world. On yellow strips of paper, write ways that your family can help bring light and hope to your community during Advent. Keep the papers in a jar. As you complete these actions, place them in the nativity scene you made to act as hav

Feast of Saint Nicholas Listen to a story about the legendary gift giver. Make or buy a

small, thoughtful gift for someone you know.

THUR 7

Mary and Joseph were traveling far from their home when Jesus was born. Try sleeping in a different place in your house tonight. Swap beds with a sibling or sleep in a sleeping bag on the floor. Thank God for the comforts of your home.

FRI

Feast of the Immaculate Conception

Honor Mary, Mother of God by praying the Hail Mary today. Mary is Jesus' mother. Take special care of your mother or a mother figure in your life today.

SAT

Feast of Saint Juan Diego

Juan Diego lived in Mexico, and Mary appeared to him. Eat a Mexican meal today and pray the Hail Mary before your meal in honor of Saint Juan Diego's devotion to Marv.



Advent is Here! Tesus is coming!


Advent is here! It's time to begin breparing for the coming of Jesus at Christmas.
