# PARISH LIFE/AROUND OUR ARCHDIOCESE

## Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening. (1 Samuel 3:9)

Samuel lay sleeping when he first heard someone calling his name. He ran to his mentor, but Eli was not calling him. So Samuel returned to bed, only to hear the voice twice more. When Samuel appeared at Eli's bedside for the third time, the priest realized that it was the Lord he had heard. The God who loves to speak to his people was now calling Samuel. So he gave Samuel timeless advice: "Reply, 'Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening'" (1 Samuel 3:9).

This same God wants to speak to us! It's not hard to hear him, but like Samuel, we need to learn to listen. The good news is that God loves us and wants us to hear his voice. So let's take Eli's words to heart.

Speak, Lord. God wants you to know him. He's always speaking, always trying to reveal himself to you. You can believe that he has a message for you, so confidently express your desire to hear him. This means sitting before the Lord and fixing your heart on him alone. "Speak, Lord. I want to know you more."

Your servant. Everything we have comes from God. He is our Master, and we are his grateful and humble servants, eager to hear and obey his word. This means more than passively waiting for a message from the sky. It means offering yourself to the Lord with a willing heart, open to God's plans—even if they differ from your own. "I am your servant, Lord. I'm ready to do your will."

Is listening. It's not easy to hear God's voice when we're surrounded by noise. So to listen for the Lord, we will need to find a quiet place away from the clatter that can drown out the Lord's voice. We may need to silence our anxious thoughts and doubts, too. But with God's help, we can set aside those thoughts and listen for his voice instead. "Quiet my heart, Lord. I'm listening for you."

## Habla, Señor; tu siervo escucha. (1 Samuel 3, 10)

Samuel estaba acostado durmiendo cuando escuchó que alguien lo llamaba por su nombre. Corrió a donde su mentor, pero Elí no lo estaba llamando. Entonces Samuel regresó a la cama, solo para escuchar la voz dos veces más. Cuando Samuel apareció al lado de la cama de Elí por tercera vez, el sacerdote comprendió que la voz era la del Señor. Dios, que se deleita en hablarle a su pueblo, estaba llamando a Samuel. Así que le dio a Samuel un valioso consejo: "Responde: 'Habla, Señor; tu siervo te escucha'" (1 Samuel 3, 9).

¡Este mismo Dios quiere hablarnos a nosotros! No es tan difícil escucharlo, pero al igual que Samuel, necesitamos aprender a escuchar. La buena noticia es que Dios nos ama y quiere que escuchemos su voz. Así que apropiémonos de las palabras de Elí.

Habla, Señor. Dios desea que lo conozcas. Siempre está hablando, siempre está manifestándose en tu vida. Cree que él tiene un mensaje para ti y con confianza exprésale tu deseo de escucharlo. Esto significa sentarse delante del Señor y centrar tu corazón solamente en él. "Habla, Señor, quiero conocerte más."

Tu siervo. Todo lo que tenemos viene de Dios que es nuestro Señor, y nosotros somos sus siervos agradecidos y humildes, dispuestos a escuchar y obedecer su palabra. Esto significa más que simplemente esperar pasivamente un mensaje del cielo. Significa ofrecer tu vida al Señor con un corazón dispuesto, abierto a los planes de Dios aun cuando sean distintos a los tuyos. "Soy tu siervo, Señor. Estoy dispuesto a hacer tu voluntad."

Estoy escuchando. No es fácil escuchar la voz de Dios cuando estamos rodeados de ruido. De manera que para escuchar al Señor, necesitaremos encontrar un lugar tranquilo lejos del bullicio que puede ahogar la voz del Señor. También necesitamos silenciar el ruido provocado por la angustia y las dudas que se acumulan en nuestra mente. Pero con la ayuda de Dios, podemos dejar de lado estos pensamientos y en cambio escuchar su voz.

Pope's liturgical schedule includes canonization of Argentine Blessed The Prefecture of the Papal Household releases the schedule of Pope Francis' liturgical celebrations for January and February, which includes the canonization of Blessed Maria Antonia of Saint Joseph de Paz y Figueroa, born in what is now Argentina.

Pope Francis is set to canonize fellow Argentinian Blessed Maria Antonia of Saint Joseph de Paz y Figueroa in Saint Peter's Basilica on 11 February, the Sixth Sunday of Ordinary Time.

Blessed Maria Antonia of St. Joseph spent much of her life promoting retreats in the Ignatian tradition following the expulsion of the Jesuits from Spain in the second half of the 18th century. She was beatified by Pope Francis in August 2016.

The canonization of Blessed Maria Antonia is part of a busy schedule of liturgical events for the Pope over the next few weeks. January-February liturgies

On the Third Sunday of Ordinary Time, 21 January, the Holy Father will celebrate Holy Mass to commemorate the Sunday of the Word of God – an observance established by Pope Francis in 2019.

Later that week, on 25 January, Pope Francis will celebrate Second Vespers for the Solemnity of the Conversion of St Paul to mark the conclusion of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

This year's Week of Prayer invites Christians to reflect on the Biblical text, "You shall love the Lord your God... and your neighbour as yourself." (Luke 10:27).

On 2 February, Pope Francis will preside at Holy Mass in St. Peter's Basilica for the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord. The feast is also observed as the 28th World Day of Consecrated Life, and members of Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life will be present for the papal liturgy.

Finally, the Holy Father is scheduled to take part once again in the ceremonies for Ash Wednesday on the Aventine Hill in Rome.

He will continue the tradition, restored by Pope St. John XXIII, of marking the opening of the season of Lent in the Basilica of Santa Sabina.

The liturgy begins in the Church of Sant'Anselmo, where the local community gathers before the solemn penitential procession to the traditional station church of Santa Sabina, where Mass will be offered with the blessing and imposition of Ashes. Vatican News





#### Basiliek van het Heilig Bloed (Basilica of the Holy Blood)

The Basilica of the Holy Blood was elevated to the status of Basilica in 1923, due to the special veneration of the Holy Blood. It consists of an upper and a lower chapel. The lower chapel, dedicated to Saint Basil, is a rare example of Romanesque architecture in the coastal region. The soberly decorated chapel is roofed by stone rib-vaulting on heavy pillars. Above the entrance to the side aisle, you'll notice a remarkable half-relief depicting the Baptism of Christ (School of Tournai, 12th century).

The 'Steegheere' staircase, with reconstructed bluestone facade, in transitional style between late Gothic and early Renaissance, leads you to the upper chapel. The Relic of the Holy Blood, said to have been brought to Bruges by the crusaders, is kept here in the Chapel of the Holy Blood. The Chapel was built in the 15th century in the Gothic style, but is mainly important for its late-19th century neo-Gothic decoration.

The chapel also houses the museum of the Basilica, a kind of treasure chamber with numerous valuable works of art mainly related to the veneration of the relic of the Holy Blood. Among other things, several valuable works of art are kept here that are among the top pieces in Flanders, such as the Great Shrine of the Holy Blood manufactured by the silversmith Jan Crabbe in 1614. https://www.visitbruges.be

#### How the Blood of Jesus Christ ended up in Bruges

According to the Gospel of Matthew (27: 60), <u>Joseph of Arimathea</u> was the owner of a garden in which was a new tomb. After the crucifixion of Jesus, he asked Pontius Pilate to be allowed to place the body of Jesus in that unused tomb. After Joseph of Arimathea took Jesus from the cross, he washed Jesus bloody body with cloths and then wrapped Jesus' body in a shroud. Naturally, he did not just throw away the cloths soaked in Jesus' blood, but they were kept in Jerusalem like the other passion relics.

The fact that Thierry of Alsace (Count of Flanders from 1128 to 1168) transferred the Relic of the Holy Blood from Jerusalem to Bruges in 1150 is nowadays strongly doubted by most historians. According to them, this is a persistent legend, invented by the 14th century monk Johannes Iperius in his chronicle, the *Chronicon Sithiense S. Bertini*. After all, the monk was repeatedly exposed by later historians as a dreamer who sometimes violated history with his stories.

The oldest reliable sources about the relic date back to the 13th century. A number of those sources show how proud the residents of Bruges and the Bruges city council were of their relic and how much they are attached to it. But during the 12th century, as far as historians could ascertain, not a single resident of Bruges wrote a word about the relic's presence in Bruges. In none of the 12th century sources a connection is made between the relic on the one hand and Thierry of Alsace or the St. Basil's Chapel (the later Holy Blood Basilica) on the other hand, simply because there was no Holy Blood to be found in Bruges at the time.

Today, most historians tend to link the Relic of the Holy Blood to the fall and looting of Constantinople in 1204. It was shown that during that looting many valuable relics from Contantinople (Istanbul) were taken by crusaders to Western Europe. In addition, research also shows that the tube of the Holy Blood Relic was made around 1200 from rock crystal ... from Constantinople. How the blood of Jesus Christ ended up in Constantinople, we can only guess for the moment. Saint Helena of Constantinople (248–329), the mother of Emperor Constantine the Great, is said to have taken many passion relics (including the relics of the Holy Cross) from Jerusalem to Constantinople. Could the Blood of Jesus Christ have been among those relics too? Website:





## About 18 million Catholics belong to Eastern Churches

Within the Catholic Church, in addition to the Latin Church, there are Eastern Churches in full communion with the Pope, who preserve their own ancient traditions and rites in more than 200 ecclesiastical circumscriptions throughout the world. Today, some of them are persecuted, particularly in the Middle East.



#### The full text of the pope's prayer intention is below:

Let us pray that the Spirit help us recognize the gift of different charisms within the Christian community, and to discover the richness of different ritual traditions in the heart of the Catholic Church. Pope Francis – JANUARY 2024

There is no need to fear the diversity of charisms in the Church. Rather, living this diversity should make us rejoice!

Diversity and unity were already very much present in the first Christian communities. The tension had to be resolved on a higher level.

But there's more. To move forward on the journey of faith, we also need ecumenical dialogue with our brothers and sisters of other confessions and Christian communities.

This is not something confusing or disturbing, but is a gift God gives to the Christian community so it might grow as one body, the Body of Christ.

Let's think, for example, of the Eastern Churches. They have their own traditions, their own characteristic liturgical rites...yet they maintain the unity of the faith. They strengthen it, not divide it. If we are guided by the Holy Spirit, abundance, variety, diversity, never cause conflict. The Holy Spirit reminds us first and foremost that we are children loved by God — everyone equal in God's love, and everyone different.

Let us pray that the Spirit help us recognize the gift of different charisms within the Christian communities, and to discover the richness of different ritual traditions within the Catholic Church.





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# Canon 1262 - Fundraising Appeals

On November 13, 2002, the members of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops legitimately approved complementary legislation for the implementation of canon 1262 of the Code of Canon Law for the dioceses of the United States. The action was granted *recognitio* by the Congregation for Bishops in accord with article 82 of the Apostolic Constitution *Pastor Bonus* and issued by Decree N. 778/2005 of the Congregation for Bishops signed by His Eminence Giovanni Battista Cardinal Re, Prefect, and His Excellency Most Reverend Francesco Monterisi, Secretary, and dated May 2, 2007.

Wherefore, and in accord with the prescripts of canon 1262, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops decrees that the following norms shall govern fundraising appeals to the faithful for Church support:

- 1. Fundraising appeals are to be truthful and forthright, theologically sound, and should strive to motivate the faithful to a greater love of God and neighbor.
- 2. Fundraising efforts are to be for defined needs.
- 3. The relationship of trust between donor and fundraiser requires
- a. funds collected be used for their intended purposes;
- b. funds collected are not absorbed by excessive fundraising costs.
- Donors are to be informed regarding the use of donated funds and assured that any restrictions on the use of the funds by the donor will be honored.

#### Competent Ecclesiastical Authority

- 5. Institutes of consecrated life and societies of apostolic life require approval of the respective competent major superiors and the diocesan bishop to solicit funds; diocesan entities require approval of the diocesan bishop to solicit funds; other Catholic entities and organizations require the approval of the diocesan bishop to solicit funds.
- Approval for fundraising by the competent authority is to be given in writing with reference to the purpose for which the funds are being raised, the time frame, and the methods to be used in raising them.
- Oversight of fundraising programs is to be maintained by competent authority through periodic review and, where necessary, appropriate sanction.
- 8. Competent major superiors of institutes of consecrated life and societies of apostolic life are to submit to the diocesan bishop of the place where the fundraising originates periodic reports on the fundraising programs and the apostolic activities they support.

## Accountability

Fundraisers are to provide regular reports to competent authority on the extent to which promises expressed or implied in the solicitation of funds have been fulfilled.

Fundraising reports are to be prepared in scope and design to meet the particular concerns of those to whom the reports are due:

- c. the governing body and membership of the fundraising organization;
- d. the competent authorities who approved and monitor the fundraising effort;
- e. the donors to the organization;
- f. the beneficiaries of the funds raised.

Annual fundraising reports are to provide both financial information and a review of the apostolic work for which the funds were raised. They are to set forth, at the least, the amount of money collected, the cost of conducting the fundraising effort, and the amount and use of the funds disbursed.

#### Procedures

Funds beyond operating expenses are not to be accumulated or invested by a fundraising office, but are to be turned over to the appropriate office for allocation and investment.

Special care is to be taken to see that ethical business relationships are maintained by fundraisers with suppliers of goods and services.

Contracts between a religious fundraiser and commercial suppliers and consultants are to insure that control over materials, designs, money and general operations remain in the hands of the religious fundraiser.

Agreements are not to be made which directly or indirectly base payment either to the commercial firm or to the religious fundraiser on a percentage basis.

#### Oversight

Competent authority is to ensure that fundraising organizations:

g. make available fundraising reports to benefactors on a regular basis or upon reasonable request:

h. provide their governing bodies with an annual financial statement prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and, where size warrants, by a certified public accountant.

In response to formal complaints, competent authority is to promptly investigate charges, remedy abuses and, when necessary, terminate the fundraising program.

As President of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, I hereby decree that the effective date of this decree for all the dioceses of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops will be August 15, 2007. Given at the offices of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops in the city of Washington, the District of Columbia, on the 8th day of June, in the year of our Lord 2007.
