Consideration of Our Christian Commitment: Ordinary Time Transition



My dear brothers and sister in Christ,

Overall, my first week and weekend at Immaculate Conception went very well. As I mentioned in my homily, most of this week focused on getting to know the staff with one-on-one meetings. With all

of the meetings, I haven't unpacked anything in my office and just started at the rectory. I know each day will bring me a new opportunity to learn more about what happens in the parish office and daily parish life. It has also been a blessing to meet some of you when coming to the office.

A surprise for me this past week was to have my image appear on the cutout near the reception window at the office. I noticed the cutout a few weeks ago which had Fr. Frank's image on it when I came to visit Fr. Frank and staff after my appointment had been announced. It might have been here 8 years ago, but I had forgotten about it. Last week I noticed that it disappeared, and suddenly one with my image appeared on Friday. It definitely brought me a good laugh and appears that the artist got my good side! When you have a chance, come by the office and take a close up look yourself. Let me know what you think as well.

I would like to use the remainder of this article to focus on the challenges that I offered to everyone this past weekend. First, please pray for me as well as the staff as we continue to work through the transition. Also, please pray for Fr. Tomi Thomas, who replaced me at St. Elizabeth and St. Jules, their staff and parishioners. Anytime there is a change, it can bring up uncertainty, fears, or concerns to name a few things. Along with those negative emotions, prayers are needed for guidance and clarity because change can bring about exciting new opportunities and paths never considered before. As I begin my journey with you, I know I will benefit from the prayers to be more observant, to be more open, and to seek clarity on where the Lord is asking me to grow and to stretch myself.

The other challenge I mentioned to everyone is to start bringing your bibles to Mass. I know this seems like an odd request, however, I know that we, as Catholics, need to be more open to engaging the Word of God. The idea for this came to me during my previous assignment when Pope Francis declared the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time as "Sunday of the Word of God." I encouraged all the parishioners to bring their bibles to Mass. Many of them did bring it. I had one person come up to me that showed me when he opened

his bible, he found a note from the 1960's when he was at Loyola University! He didn't say whether this was the first time he had opened it since. After that Sunday, I would make sure to have a bible around to assist with my preaching. It helped me to realize where the passages were in the bible as well as the verses and sections that were skipped over in the lectionary that could help to provide more context. I could go on and on about this, but my encouragement for now is to start bringing your bible with you to Mass. You will see me using mine!

I pray that all of you have a blessed week! Please know that you are in my daily prayers.

Stump the Deacon!

Last Saturday, the Church celebrated The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Is this in the Bible? If not, how can we be sure that Mary was assumed into heaven?

The Assumption of Mary is a celebration commemorating the fact that Mary's body and soul were assumed into heaven after her earthly life ended. Mary was the mother of Jesus; her body was a tabernacle that held the infant Jesus before His birth. Her body was assumed into heaven so that it would not decay; this vessel was to remain holy and incorrupt for all time. The assumption of Mary is not specifically stated in the Bible, but that does not indicate that it did not happen. The Church has never believed that everything that we need to believe has to be in the Bible. The Church believes that there are two sources of revelation: Scripture and Tradition. Tradition is the deposit of faith that is not included in Scripture, but we must still believe in it. St. Paul says "stand firm and hold fast to the traditions that you were taught, either by oral statement or by a letter of ours" (2 Thess 2:15). Even though it is not in the Bible, the Church has always taught that Mary was assumed into heaven. Some facts supporting her assumption are: Pope Pius XII wrote: "The scholastic Doctors have recognized the Assumption of the Virgin Mother of God as something signified, not only in various figures of the Old Testament, but also in that woman clothed with the sun whom John the Apostle contemplated on the Island of Patmos (Rev. 12:1ff). Similarly they have given special attention to these words of the New Testament: 'Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with you, blessed are you among women' (Luke 1:28) since they saw, in the mystery of the Assumption, the fulfillment of that most perfect grace granted to the Blessed Virgin and the special blessing that countered the curse of Eve" [Munificentissimus Deus 27]. From the earliest days of Christianity, Christians have sought the bones and relics of our saints, but there are no bones of Mary. When early Christians asked for some relics of Mary, the pope declared that there are none because Mary's body was assumed into heaven. Steven Ray, a Catholic convert, speaker, author, pilgrimage guide, and frequent guest on EWTN, says that this is a 'screaming silence." Any church or city would love to say that they have Mary's bones, but they can't because they are in heaven. On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII defined the Assumption of Mary to be a dogma of faith: "we pronounce, declare, and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma: that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory." The pope proclaimed this dogma only after a broad consultation of bishops, theologians and laity. There were few dissenting voices. This is only one of two times that the pope has declared an infallible teaching of the Church. The other time was regarding the Immaculate Conception of Mary.

Covid 19 and Immaculate Conception

By now we should either feel like an expert on the Corona virus or we just stopped trying to keep up. Either way, we are still navigating through each day of a pandemic.

I have learned a lot about the virus and how to stay safe during this time. I want to share a few things with you. As time goes on we tend to get a little lax about safety precautions so here is a little review. *** Keep in mind this is a fluid subject, and what I write today may change next week. Washing your hands continues to be the best way to keep well from any illness. Warm water and soap for 20 seconds will do the trick. When running water is unavailable, hand sanitizer is very effective. Make sure the alcohol content is 60% or higher. Yes, it must have alcohol to kill the Corona Virus. Also we have been made aware the hand sanitizer will harm our pews. If you are attending Mass please make sure your hands are dry prior to touching the wood. Wearing a mask and staying 6 feet away from others is the next line of defense for our health. While there is still a chance of catching the virus, the percentages are very low. The mask needs to be over your nose and mouth to be effective. Wash a cloth mask regularly. When attending Mass, please leave your mask on until reaching your car. Visiting with friends outside after Mass without a mask could put you at risk.

Staying safe includes monitoring our own health and being a responsible person toward others. Here is a review of the symptoms of the Corona Virus.

- Fever or chills over 100.4
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Muscle or body aches
- Headache
- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea

What do you do if you have been in contact with someone who has the Corona virus? An exposure is defined by the CDC as being within 6 feet of someone without a mask for more than 15 minutes. If you have been around someone diagnosed with the virus in the above conditions, you must stay at home for 14 days after contact and monitor yourself for symptoms.
