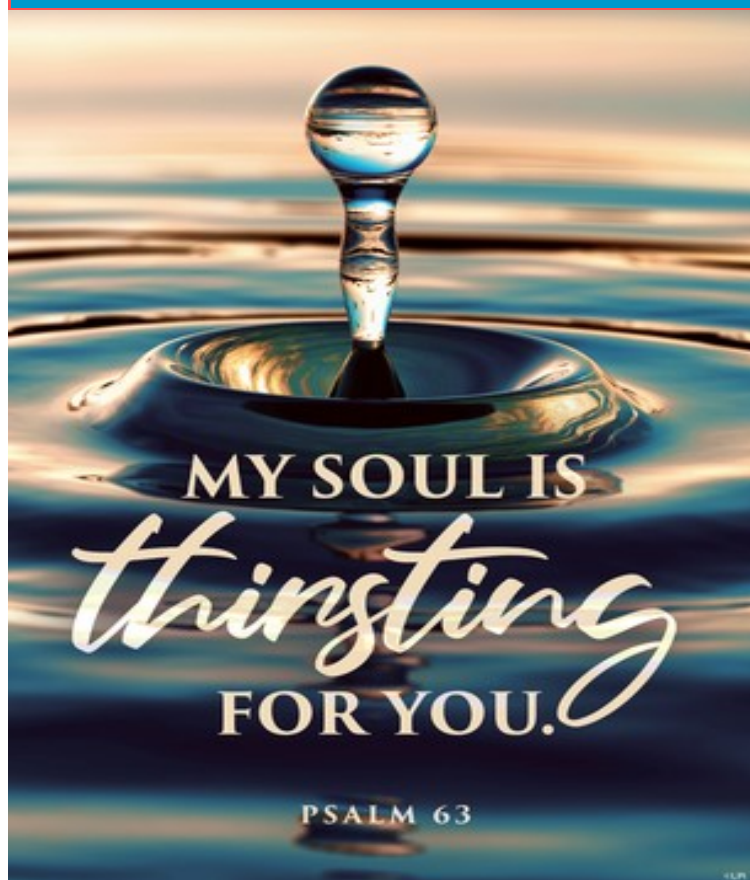
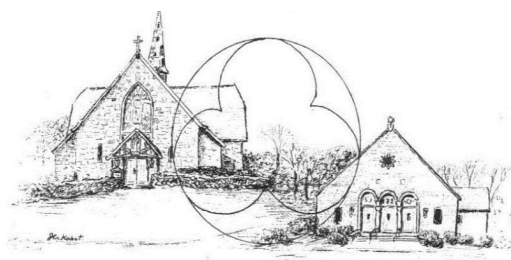

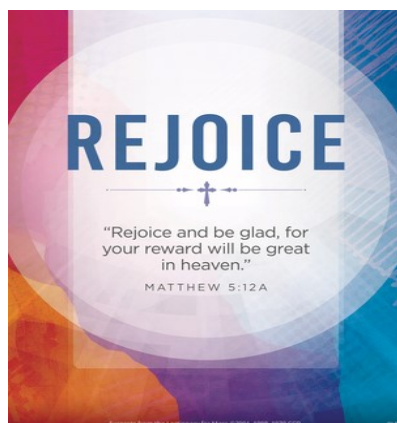

From the Pastor

So much confusion on so many levels. What can we do? Keep praying. God will see us through whatever storms come our way. We have the Blessed Mother on our side and in the end God will bring some good out of the chaos.

One of the challenges we face, a good challenge, is how we will work out the Christmas Masses with social distancing and greater numbers of worshipers expected. We may need to do what many parishes are already doing and that is have reservations so you know there is a mass that you can attend. Once the most popular times are filled, at least you can have a chance to come to a less popular time if you wish.

The goal is have as few people as possibly have to be turned away because of lack of space.

No doubt there will be some confusion and some hurt feelings. I don't think that can be avoided in these challenging times.

Another thing for people to consider is that Christmas may have people who are not use to best practices and the risk of covid spread may be greater than on a typical Sunday, therefore those most vulnerable may want to consider avoiding the Christmas crowds. Christmas is an Octave of Eight days, perhaps a different Christmas day might be prudent for some.

The new policy of taking names and numbers in order to trace contact people if there should be a problem has been going fairly well so far. We have no real choice but to do our best to comply with all the precautions we are asked to perform. Perhaps the most important is the social distancing at all times within the church and at the doors.

Above all we don't want anyone there to be any exposure of the virus that could have been prevented by best practices, such as no communal singing yet, no shaking hands and single file Communion lines keeping 6' apart, following traffic flows properly.

I am confident that the Lord will see us through the many challenges ahead if we remain faithful to Him. That little prayer: "Jesus I Trust in You," seems like a great prayer for our times.

A word of thanks to all who supported our Baby shower for the "Friends of the Unborn" and this weekend for the Franciscan Sisters of the Immaculate Conception, working with the poor in Nicaragua. Blessings to all— +

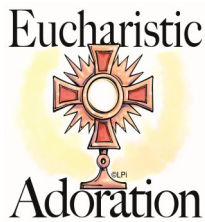

Extra precautions

The Archdiocese is asking us to take temperatures of those entering the church and asking those with a fever not to participate in the services. Names and numbers are also being recorded for the purpose of notifying people should we get a report of a positive covid19 case present at a particular Mass. As the number of cases is on the rise lately we are asked to be more diligent than ever to protect one another.

For Holy Communion we ask that you maintain the six feet spacing in a single line in the center of the aisle. Masks are to be worn while receiving Holy Communion and then lowered after stepping away so as to protect the ciboria as much as possible from air born pathogens.

We don't need to live in fear, but we do need to be prudent and protect one another. Prayers and prudence will help us through this situation. The good news is that deaths from the virus are way down and medications are more effective. Let us pray for a vaccine to protect those who are most vulnerable. Let's pray for a peaceful election and maintaining our liberties.

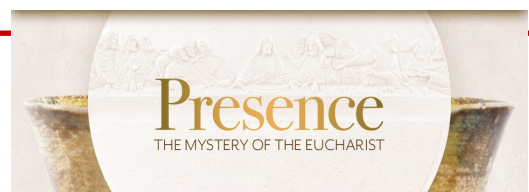
Please take advantage of this resource. There are many great movies and documentaries, as well as books to listen to.
