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Catholic Funeral Checklist

1. First Steps

- ☐ **Choose a funeral director**
Contact a local funeral home as soon as possible — they will guide many of the logistics.
- ☐ **Decide between burial or cremation**
Both are permitted in the Catholic faith. Please speak with our pastor if you have questions.
- ☐ **Veterans Burial Benefits**
Discuss with the funeral director, or go to www.va.gov.
- ☐ **Select a burial location**
Discuss options with the funeral director and/or the parish office if you need help.

2. Funeral Location & Type of Service

- ☐ **Decide where the funeral will be held**
Options: church, cemetery, funeral home, or crematorium.
- ☐ **Catholic Funeral Mass or a Funeral Liturgy Outside of Mass**
A Funeral Mass includes the celebration of the Eucharist; Liturgy outside of Mass does not include the Eucharist. Both are beautiful and meaningful celebrations.

3. Liturgy & Worship Preparation

- ☐ **Select Scripture readings for the service**
Our parish staff can provide approved readings and help you choose those most meaningful to your loved one.
- ☐ **Choose music for the funeral**
Hymns and sacred music should be chosen in accordance with Catholic liturgical guidelines. A list is provided.
- ☐ **Knights of Columbus**
Inform the Knights of Columbus at the parish for additional liturgical participation.
- ☐ **Fourth Degree Knights only**
Additional options are available for your funeral (special chalice used at Mass, honor guard, rosary led by the Knights at the funeral home). Please coordinate with the Knights and the parish office.

4. Memorial & Tribute

- ☐ **Create a timeline of their life for the obituary.**

An obituary serves as more than just a death announcement — share their life's achievements and impact on their family and friends (see the Obituary guide at the back of this packet).

- ☐ **Make a list of those you would like to invite or notify**

5. Flowers & Charitable Gifts

- ☐ **If you desire, designate a charity for memorial donations in lieu of flowers**
If desired, share the charity name and contact details in the obituary and Order of Service.

The Obituary — Parts & Steps

1. Box — list this data in a text box

- Full name, age, and occupation
- Date and place of birth
- Memberships and military service
- Fraternal, religious, and civic organizations they belonged to
- Family, both deceased and surviving
- Any funeral and burial arrangements already made

2. Source Material — list these items elsewhere

- Their activities and achievements
- Favorite anecdotes and recollections about their life

3. Core — write a few rich paragraphs in the third person, answering: "What would you like people to remember about them?"

- Their activities and achievements

4. Lead

Write a short lead announcing the death and telling the reader who this obituary is about.

5. Secondary

Select your "source material" rigorously, and write a few paragraphs from whatever survives. Arrange these paragraphs around your core.

6. Resume (Sprinkle)

Copy selected items, such as survivors, from the box to the text.

7. Ending

By now an ending will occur to you, so type it.

8. Polish

Cut the text by 20 percent, repair the transitions, read aloud and revise. Write "DRAFT" and the date at the top, and give appropriate people a copy.

Write down all of the facts you want to include (name, date of birth, age, immediate family, service information, career info). Then write your core, add a lead, sprinkle in the necessary items, write an ending, and polish it up by trimming it down. Sometimes it helps, though, to write the lead first.

Catholic Cremation: A Guide for Families

The Catholic Church permits cremation and recognizes it as a legitimate choice for Christian burial. At the same time, the Church continues to prefer burial of the body because it more fully expresses our belief in the resurrection of the body and the dignity of the human person.

Key Points to Remember

- Cremation has been permitted by the Catholic Church since 1963.
- Whenever possible, the Church prefers that the Funeral Mass be celebrated with the body present before cremation.
- Cremated remains must be treated with the same dignity and respect given to the body.
- The remains should be placed in a worthy vessel and permanently buried or entombed.
- A cemetery, mausoleum, crypt, or columbarium provides a sacred place for prayer, remembrance, and visitation.

Why Does the Church Prefer the Body at the Funeral Mass?

The presence of the body at the Funeral Mass reflects our Christian belief in the resurrection and provides family and friends the opportunity to gather, pray, grieve, and commend their loved one to God.

What About Cremated Remains at Mass?

The Church allows cremated remains to be present at the Funeral Mass. When this option is chosen, the remains should be placed in a dignified urn and positioned respectfully within the church.

What Should Be Done With Cremated Remains?

The Church teaches that cremated remains should be buried or entombed in a sacred and permanent location. This practice honors the deceased and provides a place for loved ones to visit and pray.

Practices the Church Prohibits

The Church does not support scattering ashes, dividing remains among family members, or keeping cremated remains indefinitely at home. These practices do not reflect the reverence owed to the human body.

Catholic Funeral Options When Cremation Is Chosen

- Funeral Mass followed by cremation.

- Cremation followed by Funeral Mass and committal.
- Funeral Mass celebrated with cremated remains present.
