Our humanity bleeds through today's Gospel passages in more ways than one. We see both elation and fall, hope in the midst of the darker sides of our natures. If we allow it, these Gospels hold a mirror to our own fickle hearts. The crowds cry "Hosanna" and the Apostles profess allegiance unto death. In a manner of days even hours - Jesus is betrayed, abandoned,

denied, condemned, tortured, and executed. As God, he could have stopped this horrific narrative from unfolding, but he doesn't. He allows free will to play itself out.

There are nearly two millennia between this spectacle and us. We can stand safely removed, if we choose. But Lent invites us to return to this story. Lent invites us to find ourselves in the people we encounter there. Are we the repentant woman at



Bethany? Are we naysayers of such lavish piety? Have we acted in a way that betrays those we love or denies what we know to be good and true? Have we fallen asleep in our faith? Have we unfairly accused others of a crime or immorality we imagine, though perhaps they didn't commit? Do we help others carry their burdens? Do we stand in solidarity with those who suffer? Do we care for the dying?

This week, take up today's Gospel again. Look carefully at the Passion narrative and sit with it in silence. Find yourself in the story and ponder its meaning for your own life. Journey with Jesus to the foot of the Cross so that you too may say, along with the faithful centurion, "truly this man was the Son of God!"

Celebration of the Sacraments

Anointing of the Sick • Celebrated twice a year at the weekend Masses. Anyone who is ill, infirmed or going to surgery may request the anointing by contacting Fr. Terry.

Baptism • Baptism takes place on Sundays during Mass or following Mass. Contact Fr. Terry to set a meeting to prepare for the sacrament and set a date. Baptism for older youths and adults occurs at the Easter Vigil or before marriage.

Reconciliation • Before Mass on Saturday at 4:30 pm, after any Mass, or by appointment with Fr. Terry. Communal services during Advent and Lent. First Reconciliation is celebrated during Advent.

Confirmation • Is celebrated in the seventh and eighth grades or at the Easter Vigil. The Bishop visits every two years and we alternate between the two parishes.

Eucharist • First Eucharist is celebrated during May each year with children in the second grade.

Holy Orders • Contact Fr. Terry if you are interested in the vocations of Priesthood or religious life.

Marriage • Contact Fr. Terry at least 6 months before setting a date for marriage. Couples are to attend Engaged Encounter or the Sponsor Couple Program.

Mass attendance is mandatory for those requesting Sacraments, Fr. Terry.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

I read a story recently about a teacher who donated to one of her former students a kidney. This tremendous act of selflessness came about because the young person had lost most of the function his kidneys due to an illness. Literally, that teacher gave the gift of life to someone who wasn't her own child or another family member. This is certainly radical stewardship.

How far would you go to give of yourself so that another might live? Would you have to love him or her like your own child or parent? No one can deny it would be a difficult decision, especially if your giving put your own health at risk.

Reflecting on these things helps to provide some perspective on the crucifixion of Jesus. Not only did he suffer tremendously at the hands of the Romans, he gave his life for us so we might live forever. What does true stewardship look like? The cross is a symbol to us of total surrender. When we are called to give of ourselves in ordinary ways in daily life we sometimes hesitate and think twice. Perhaps when we are unsure we should look to the cross and there we can find our strength. And then when the call comes to truly sacrifice and place our trust in God, we may have already developed a lifestyle that makes responding, "yes," that much easier. -Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS

The Most Holy Days of the Year Make plans to be a part of the most Holy Days of the Year!

Holy Thursday will be celebrated at Immaculate Conception at 6:00pm and is the Mass of the Last Supper. On this night, Jesus shared his last meal with the disciples instituting for us the sacrament of Eucharist and stressing how to be of service to others by his example of washing the feet of the disciples. It is also an opportunity to stay awake with Jesus in prayer and adoration where after communion we will take Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament to the garden prepared in the parish hall. Jesus said to Peter and his disciples. "So you could not keep watch with me for one hour?" It is in the garden where Jesus was betrayed and arrested. The church's altar will be stripped and the sanctuary made bare in preparation for Good Friday the day of crucifixion!

Good Friday will be celebrated at St. Columba at 6:00pm. This is a day of fasting not only from food but from Mass! There is no Mass and no celebration of the Eucharist on Good Friday. A liturgy is still performed and communion is taken from hosts consecrated on Holy Thursday. This communion service is a somber experience remembering Jesus' last day and death on the cross. Notice the bareness of the church and tabernacle doors open and empty! Jesus has been taken away and it was on this night that Jesus met death. This night we will venerate the cross and all will leave with no blessing and no dismissal in somber silence.

Holy Saturday will be celebrated at <u>St. Columba</u> at 7:00pm. Mass will begin outside by the Easter Fire with the lighting of the Paschal Candle. We enter the tomb of darkness with the light of Christ. It is at this Mass where we hear our salvation history in scripture, we initiate new members of our church and we proclaim and renew our baptismal promises. We celebrate Jesus is risen!

Easter Sunday is celebrated at St. Columba at 8:30am and Immaculate Conception at 10:30am. Easter Sunday marks the end of Holy Week and Lent. The Easter Mass is the joyful celebration of Jesus' resurrection and his victory of good over evil, sin and death. Easter is the fulfillment of God's promises to man and it is the most important holiday of the Liturgical Year!
