

### From Our Pastor

#### TIME FOR ANOTHER "THIS & THAT"

Every so often these days, with face-to-face communication so limited, I know that I should keep you "in the loop" as much as possible with regard to what's going on in the life of the parish and the archdiocese. But I'm not always kept in the loop either...


One place where that is frustratingly true is with regard to *Renew My Church*. As I told you a few weeks ago, our "grouping" of five parishes is now down to four with the shifting of St. Lawrence O'Toole to another group. But the news that our "activation" has been moved up to sometime next year instead of January, 2022 has yet to be clarified, despite several attempts by me to get more information from the powers that be. Some of our friends from IJP have wisely suggested that the four parishes get together for a prayer service so that the bonds we began to establish last year can be refreshed; but as much as I agree with that suggestion, I'd prefer to wait until we do get some clarity with regard to this new proposed timeline. Fingers crossed....

Another frustration is connected to the delayed installation of our new sound system. That was all set to begin in March when....well you know what happened then. But there really wouldn't have been a problem with having workers in the church even at that time, except for the fact that the Archdiocese froze all parish savings accounts for fear that the pandemic would prevent parishes from having sufficient funds to pay their bills. That meant that we couldn't access the funds in our To Teach Who Christ Is account which were earmarked for the sound system, and we've been given no sense of when that freeze might be lifted. While we're not exactly rolling in dollars these days, the payroll protection money from the government as well as your continued generosity have allowed us to remain more financially stable than might otherwise have been the case, and I only wish we could move ahead with a project whose need we can all recognize every time our old sound system makes those horrible screeching sounds.

Another thing put indefinitely on hold is our Adult Formation/ Scripture Study sessions. This was to have been the summer for eight weeks of *Celtic Spirituality*, but social distancing makes this particular topic impossible because table sharing is an integral part of this unique presentation. Even a study of the *Gospel of Matthew*, perhaps presented in church as some have suggested, and which would have been my final topic for next winter, wouldn't have been as enriching without the give and take we can enjoy in the Tolton Room. We'll just have to wait and see what winter brings.

### 25 Years of the Gospel of Life

This year the Church celebrates the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the papal encyclical Evangelium vitae (The Gospel of Life). This prophetic document was written by Pope John Paul II to reaffirm the value and inviolability of every human life and to appeal to all people to respect, protect, love, and serve every human life. The following is a brief overview of this important document.



The Gospel of Life is at the *heart* of Jesus' saving message to the world. Through the Incarnation and birth of Christ, God reveals to us the dignity of all human life. Human life, as a gift of God, is sacred and inviolable. The Son of God has united himself with every human being and desires for us to share eternal life with him. For this reason, direct attacks on human life, such as abortion and euthanasia, are always unacceptable. Yet, sadly we see new and expanding threats to human life emerging on an alarming scale. These new threats to life are often justified, protected, and even promoted by our laws and culture.

Not only must human life not be taken, but it must be protected with loving concern. Each of us is made in the image and likeness of God, and we reflect his glory in the world. God made the human person with the capacity to love and reason and share in a relationship with himself, the Creator. The human person bears an indelible imprint of God and is the pinnacle of all creation. The source of our dignity is not only linked to our creation by God, but to our final end and destiny to spend eternity with the Father. By accepting Christ as our Savior through the ministry of the Church, despite our sinfulness, we can begin to share in eternal life even now.

Despite the grave threats to human life in the modern world, we, as the People of God, are called to place our faith in Jesus, the "Word of life" (1 Jn 1:1). As Christians, we have received the full truth about human life as proclaimed by the very person of Jesus. In sharing in the lowliest and most vulnerable conditions of human life—even death on a cross—Jesus shows us that life is *always good*. The true meaning of our lives is found in giving and receiving love. It is only through this understanding of a sincere gift of self that human sexuality and procreation reach their true and full significance. God holds the lives of all people in his gentle and loving care, giving meaning and value to any sufferings that we bear. Even within the mystery which surrounds suffering and death, these experiences can become saving events as we unite them with Christ's own sacrifice. By making human life the instrument of our salvation, the Son of God shows us the priceless value of human life.

Although the roots of violence against life are not new—going all the way back to Genesis, when Cain took the life of his brother Abel—our modern world is now suffering under a culture of death. Scientific and technological advances and an increasingly secularized world have led to an eclipse of the value of human life. However, respect for life requires that science and technology should always be at the service of the human person and his integral development. We must reject systems of structuralized sin which value efficiency and productivity over human persons.

Governments and international institutions promote abortion and euthanasia as marks of progress and freedom. But this is a false and perverse understanding in which freedom is equated with absolute individualism. True freedom is inherently relational, recognizing that God has entrusted us to one another. As cultures and societies fail to recognize these objective truths, everything becomes relative, and all principles are called into question—even the fundamental right to life. However, the blood of Christ's sacrifice remains our constant hope. Christ's gift of himself on the Cross reveals how precious life truly is and gives us the strength to commit ourselves to building a *culture of life*. Christ's blood, shed for us, promises that in God's plan death will be no more, and life will be victorious.

Society as a whole must respect, defend and promote the dignity of every human person, at every moment and in every condition of that person's life. Each life is a gift from God and ultimately belongs to him. He has sole authority over life and death. We are therefore called to reverence and love every human person, loving our neighbors as ourselves. It is our responsibility to care for and protect human life, especially the lives of the most vulnerable among us.





#### **BACKGROUND ON THE GOSPEL READING**

Today's Gospel continues the story that began in last week's Gospel. Simon Peter was called the "rock" upon which Jesus would build his Church, and yet Peter continues to show the limitations of his understanding of Jesus' identity. Now that the disciples have acknowledged



that Jesus is the Messiah, Jesus confides in them the outcome of his ministry: he must suffer and die in Jerusalem to be raised on the third day. Peter rejects this prediction, and Jesus rebukes him severely, calling him "Satan." In opposing this aspect of Jesus' mission, Peter shows that he is no longer speaking based on the revelation from God but as a human being. Jesus then teaches all of the disciples about the difficult path of discipleship: to be Christ's disciple is to follow in his way of the cross.


Peter could not yet understand what it meant to call Jesus the Messiah. It is unlikely that the other disciples understood any better. Messianic expectations were a common aspect of first-century Judaism. Under Roman occupation, many in Israel hoped and prayed that God would send a Messiah to free the Jews from Roman oppression. The common view was that the Messiah would be a political figure, a king that would free Israel from Roman rule. This is perhaps what Peter envisioned when he was led to recognize Jesus as the Messiah. In this passage, however, Jesus is beginning to teach his disciples that he would be the Messiah in a different way.

Jesus would be more like the suffering servant described by the prophet Isaiah than the political liberator. Those who would be Jesus' disciples would be called to a similar life of service. Perhaps this is what Peter feared most in Jesus' prediction of his Passion. He whom Jesus had called "rock" would also be called upon to offer himself in sacrifice and service to others. Christian leaders today are still called to sacrifice and serve others as Jesus did.

### ST. JOSEPH'S RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The archdiocese has advised religious education programs to develop the capacity to offer classes in both virtual and in-person formats. To do this we need catechists who can teach both virtual classes or 'at-home formation' and in-person classes. For in-person classes to be executed safely we need a new cadre of volunteers to monitor safety measures such as social distancing upon entry/exit and in the hallways, and that all persons in the school building are wearing masks. Catechists and other volunteers associated with the religious education program must complete archdiocese compliance requirements including Virtus training, mandated reporter training, and a background check. 

### 22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time • Matthew 16:21-27 •

Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and suffer greatly from the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed and on the third day be raised. 
