From the Pastor

My dear friends,

Every year the Church leads us into the desert with Jesus. Not because God wants us to suffer, but because the desert is the place where distractions fall away and the truth of our hearts is revealed. Lent begins by inviting us to face the same question Jesus faced in today's Gospel: Who will I allow to shape my life—God or the enemy?

1. The Temptation Story Is Our Story

Matthew tells us that Jesus is led by the Spirit into the desert. That alone is striking. The Spirit doesn't lead Him to comfort, but to confrontation—because some battles must be fought before the mission can begin.

The devil's temptations are subtle, and they echo the temptations in the first reading from Genesis:

- “Turn these stones into bread.”
The temptation to let our appetites rule us.
- “Throw yourself down.”
The temptation to manipulate God, to demand proof.
- “Bow down and I will give you everything.”
The temptation to seize power, to take shortcuts, to avoid the cross.

These are not ancient problems. They are the daily struggles of every human heart. The devil never begins by asking us to do something obviously evil. He begins by offering something that looks good, easy, or harmless. That's why Adam and Eve fall—not because they wanted to rebel, but because the fruit looked “pleasing to the eyes.” Sin rarely starts with malice. It starts with compromise.

2. Jesus Shows Us How to Fight

Notice how Jesus responds. He doesn't argue. He doesn't negotiate. He doesn't try to outsmart the devil. He simply stands on the Word of God. Where Adam and Eve doubted God's goodness, Jesus trusts it completely. Where they grasped for something more, Jesus is content with the Father's will. Where they fell, He stands. This is why St. Paul tells us in the second reading that Jesus is the “new Adam.” He rewrites our story. He shows us that temptation is not a sign of weakness, it is a sign that we are loved enough to be worth fighting for.

3. Lent Is Not About Proving Ourselves

Sometimes we treat Lent like a spiritual fitness challenge: “Can I give up chocolate?” “Can I make it 40 days without complaining?” “Can I pray more?” Lent is not about proving our strength. It is about discovering our need for God.

The desert strips away illusions. It reveals what we cling to, what we fear, what we avoid, what we worship. And in that clarity, God meets us—not to condemn us, but to heal us. Psalm 51 today gives us the right posture: “A clean heart create for me, O God.”

4. What Is God Inviting You to Confront This Lent?

Every one of us has a “desert”—a place of struggle, temptation, or vulnerability. Lent invites us not to run from it, but to enter it with Jesus.

Maybe your desert is:

- a habit you can't break
- a resentment you've carried too long
- a fear that keeps you from trusting
- a comfort you rely on more than God
- a wound you've never allowed Him to touch

Whatever it is, Jesus does not meet you with shame. He meets you with strength. He has already faced the enemy and won. He walks with you not as a judge, but as a companion.

5. The Good News

The Gospel today ends simply: “The angels came and ministered to Him. “That is God's promise to you this Lent. If you enter the desert with Jesus, you will not walk out alone.

Grace will meet you. Mercy will restore you. And Easter will not just be a date on the calendar—it will be a resurrection in your life.

WHAT IS LENT?

Wednesday, February 18, 2026 - Thursday, April 2, 2026

Lent is a 40 day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. It's a period of preparation to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection at Easter. During Lent, we seek the Lord in prayer by reading Sacred Scripture; we serve by giving alms; and we practice self-control through fasting. We are called not only to abstain from luxuries during Lent, but to a true inner conversion of heart as we seek to follow Christ's will more faithfully. We recall the waters of baptism in which we were also baptized into Christ's death, died to sin and evil, and began new life in Christ.

Many know of the tradition of abstaining from meat on Fridays during Lent, but we are also called to practice self-discipline and fast in other ways throughout the season. In addition, the giving of alms is one way to share God's gifts—not only through the distribution of money, but through the sharing of our time and talents. As St. John Chrysostom reminds us: "Not to enable the poor to share in our goods is to steal from them and deprive them of life. The goods we possess are not ours, but theirs." (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 2446).

In Lent, the baptized are called to renew their baptismal commitment as others prepare to be baptized through the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults, a period of learning and discernment for individuals who have declared their desire to become Catholics. usccb.org

How difficult is it to keep unblemished a white shirt, blouse or dress? Whiteness invariably attracts all sorts of dirt & stains & discoloration the instant it is removed from its protective packaging. It is an inevitable law of physics that such disorder & chaos increase. Smudges inexorably aim to tarnish the vibrancy & brilliance of anything white.

Remember Charlie Brown's good bud, Pig-Pen, in the comic "Peanuts?" P-P best illustrates the human tendency to be unable to stay clean for more than the very briefest of moments. P-P was perpetually clad in filthy overalls & was

always enveloped in a personal cloud of dirty dust. Despite his best efforts & intentions, he apparently *cannot* stay clean. An intense storm once left him uncharacteristically clean. He disdainfully lamented "in 1 minute the rain washed away what took me all day to accomplish!" Seconds later his dirt reappeared.

Are we not all veritable Pig-Pens? So too is our human nature susceptible to defacement. No sooner than Adam & Eve were welcomed into the paradise of the Garden of Eden than they were *tested*—and succumbed—to the *temptations* of the evil one. Mankind had to await the coming of our savior, Jesus Christ, to be freed of such seductive enticements. The setting of today's Gospel for this 1st week of Lent illumines this point. Immediately after Jesus was baptized He departed alone for the solitude of the wilderness. There He was assaulted by the devil. As the Son of God, Jesus had no need of the spiritual cleansing that the waters of the Jordan provided. He was divine and untouched by sin. Yet He was confronted by the most terrible of adversaries to disfigure His divine goodness. Did Satan really expect to prevail? How can we and our human frailty resist such determined onslaughts?


Note the distinction between 'test' & 'temptation.' A *test* subjects something to trials & challenges to evaluate its mettle. To 'put something to the test' is to find out how good or strong something ultimately is. The purpose is to place it in a situation to find its breaking point. God often allows and even orchestrates such *tests* to strengthen our faith. The Old Testament is replete with such profiles in character. Examples are Abraham, Jonah, Job, the travails of the prophets, and even the Israelites wandering in the wilderness after their Exodus. A 'test' refines our faith, develops perseverance and reveals the true nature of our heart. JC in the wilderness was perfectly aware of His circumstances. In Luke's version (4:12) of this episode, JC quotes Deuteronomy 6: 16 to caution the devil "do not put the Lord, your God, to the test." As if Satan listens. Isn't the adversary's nature to unrepentantly persist in aiming to dislodge us from our relationship with God? Our Gospel today is Matt's account of Christ's T & T.

The reasonable question "is not all life the drudgery of a test?" is asked in the book of Job (7: 1-2). Job was an experiment in having the proof of his goodness 'put to the test' while subjected to the terrible experience of all sorts of afflictions. For him, the assault of his test was anything but an occasional intrusion of challenges on a normally serene existence. *Testing & temptation* constantly assail us almost every second of life.

The Cistercian monk Michael Casey brings this tension of *testing & temptation* into proper focus. He reminds us that such adversity is our wake-up call. "It is an invitation to stand up for our values.. it is useful because it forces us to choose between good & bad....Our response to this T & T reveals who we are... it is a potent reminder of the weakness of our will and the wobbliness of our virtue. Frequent temptation forces us to cry out frequently in pain to God for help & forgiveness. So maybe it is not so bad a thing."

We are fearful of the relentless constancy of tests likely because we are prone to failure. The version of the Lord's prayer in Luke 11: 1-4 asks that we are not 'put to the test.' Matt's more familiar version asks that "lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil." Not to worry. Paul (1 Cor 10:13) assures us that "no one can be tempted beyond what you can bear." The Letter of James (1: 2-7 & 1: 13-14) encourages us that "it is pure joy when you encounter various trials" AND "blessed is the one who perseveres in resisting temptation." It is no sin to be *tempted*. In fact it is a badge of honor that the devil regards you as so good to entice you with the luscious appeal of *temptation*. The test is your response. Never to worry.

It heals us from the sting of failing the test when we invariably yield to temptation.


