From the Desk of Fr. Dan Shaughnessy, Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I received an email recently from Natural Family Planning (NFP) and More. Their website link is as follows: https://www.nfpandmore.org/. They send email blasts occasionally and I found the one below really interesting. Many Catholics know what the Church teaches about artificial means of contraception but they don't necessarily know why. And if they do know why, they might ridicule what the Church teaches as being out of touch with reality. That said, in the times in which we live where personal health and wellness is lauded as the "the highest good" by many, I think the Church's teaching is the right one for many reasons, namely the ones listed below:

- 1. Contraceptive behaviors are morally wrong because they contradict God's plan for love, marriage and sexuality. God has a plan for love, marriage and sexuality. In that plan, the marriage act is meant to be exclusively a marriage act. That means that such an action outside of marriage is intrinsically dishonest, pretending to be what it cannot be. In God's plan, the marriage act within marriage is intended to be a renewal of the marriage covenant the couple freely entered. It ought to affirm and renew the self-giving love and the for-better-and-for-worse commitment of the marriage vows. But the body language of contraceptive behaviors says, "I take you for better but positively not for the imagined 'worse' of possible pregnancy." They (contraceptive behaviors) contradict the marriage covenant and are thus dishonest and violate the Natural Law.
- 2. Some forms of birth control contradict God's plan for taking care of our health. Good health is a great gift from God, and we are

- obliged to take reasonable efforts to take care of it. Some women use the birth control pill which significantly increases a woman's risks of suffering breast cancer. Compared to women who never use the Pill, a woman who uses the Pill increases her risk of breast cancer by 44% if she ever uses it, and she increases her risks by 52% if she uses it for four or more years before her first full-term pregnancy. (C. Kahlenborn, FM Modugno, and others, "Oral contraceptive use as a risk factor for premenopausal breast cancer: a meta-analysis," Mayo Clinic Proceedings, 2006:81(10):1290-1302.) The WHO has labeled the birth control chemicals as a Group 1 carcinogen—the most dangerous classification. Who is anti-woman the people who want to foist this carcinogen on unsuspecting teenagers or the Church which teaches its people not to contracept?
- 3. Contraception contradicts what Jesus teaches us about marriage. Jesus clearly teaches us in Scripture and in his Church that God has created the state of marriage. When questioned about divorce, Jesus put it very simply: "What God has put together, let no one take apart." That also applies to the marriage act. Who put together the procreative and the unitive aspects of the marriage act? Every believer has to say, "God Himself put together these two aspects in the marriage act." What is contraception except the effort to take apart what God Himself has joined in the marriage act? There's no getting around itthat's what contraception is all about.
- 4. What is the moral and healthy and effective alternative? Natural family planning. Systematic NFP refers to the regular observation of the physical signs of fertility and infertility, frequently called fertility awareness.

It can be used at the 99% level of effectiveness for postponing pregnancy. Among less-fertile couples it can be very helpful for achieving pregnancy.

The data listed above is really powerful. If we look at society and ask ourselves what is wrong, so to speak, we need to ask ourselves a few questions.

- a) When did fertility and pregnancy and children come to viewed as something other than a great gift? Our culture often treats fertility and pregnancy as something to be avoided, rather than celebrated. (Naturally, we understand sexuality and pregnancy as something to be celebrated within the covenant of marriage). We know that not all pregnancies happen within marriage and we welcome all those lives with joy as gifts from God; no doubt. That said, we understand that God's gift of children ideally comes through the marriage of a man and a woman joined in marriage.
- b) The family unit is foundational to society, the bedrock of society, if you will.
- c) Personally, I come from a family of seven children. Openness to life is a good thing. In all of my 52 years on this earth, I have never had anyone say to me, "I wish we had had fewer children." Without hesitation, I can say that people say to me all the time, "I wish we had had more children." Children are a gift from God. Like St. Mother Teresa, "There is no such thing as too many children. That's like saying there are too many flowers in a garden."

May we celebrate the gifts of marriage and children. Might we support all those in our families and communities who are open to the gift of life!

May God bless you all. May we all celebrate marriages and families.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

December 17, 2023 3rd Sunday of Advent

Why do we believe in Jesus and the Catholic Church? Why should we continue to do so? We've never seen him face-to-face (at least not most of us, I assume). Most of us have never had mystical visions of angels or saints. We live in the same world as our atheist and secularists friends. Why do we believe in Christ if we've never seen him?

The simple, symbolic answer the Gospel presents to us this week might surprise us: we believe because of John the Baptist. Early in John's Gospel we hear: "There was a man sent from God, his name was John. He came for testimony, to bear witness to the light, that all might believe through him." The Baptist powerfully announces Jesus. This is a historical fact, and it is also now a pattern at work in our lives.

John the Baptist stands for the entirety of the old covenant, everything entrusted to the Jewish people. And yet he prophetically opens the door to something entirely new in Jesus, to the revival and fulfillment of God's promises. In every generation, and in every human life, God continues to do this. He has done it through people named Augustine, Francis, Catherine, Theresa, and countless others. In my life, the Baptist's spirit has come through persons named Eric, Paul, Mary, and Ron. I challenge you to name at least three people through whom God has announced the coming of Jesus in your life. Consciously thank God for their testimony. And let's commit ourselves to listening to the spirit of John the Baptist testify again this week so that we might more strongly believe in the light.
