





Many great things continue at St. Anthony Catholic School, in its 102 year. The school is undergoing the annual summer scrub. The classrooms are being set up by the teachers. Faculty/ Staff In-Service begins Monday, August 5 and the first day of school is on Monday, August 12.

Our theme for 2019-2020 is "Walk in Faith so that you may grow in the knowledge that comes from God". We are excited to welcome two new teachers to our Faculty, Paula Simpson (6th) and Amy Yosten (5th). Fifth and Sixth grade students are team taught based on teacher specialties. Mrs. Yosten will teach English Language

Arts (5th & 6th) and 5th grade Social Studies, and Ms. Simpson will be teaching Math, Science, and Religion (5th & 6th) and 6th grade Social Studies. Mrs. Yosten has 12 years' experience in Hereford ISD and is a member of our Parish. Ms. Simpson has 28 years' experience in Catholic education and is a member of St. Hyacinth's Parish in Amarillo.

On September 13, the Amarillo Diocese All School's Mass will be celebrated by Bishop Zurek at St. Mary's Cathedral. After Mass the children will be served a lunch and allowed to mingle with their cohorts from the other schools.

A comprehensive school management system, everything from attendance, lunch count, grades, health records, transcripts, and parent conferences are organized and backed up on a remote secure server. Faculty, staff, and parents have access to their child's information online and using Android and iOS apps on their mobile devices. The faculty, staff, and parents are pleased with the ease of access to necessary information and the decreased amount of paperwork and streamlining for records and general school management.

Necessity of Retreat.

In military life as in the spiritual life to retreat is to withdraw. It means to pull away, to disenthat victory is not for today but and rest in the Father's possibly tomorrow so I must leave the battlefield if I have any hope of survival. Often the military officer that sounds the retreat is considered a coward, afraid, and overwhelmingly mortal His or her planning wasn't sufficient, the warriors at their command were not brave, or even worse we sent them to defend or to die not to retreat. The meat of the matter is that whether sometimes, oftentimes times He invites the twelve chosen apostles discretion is the better part of valor. Though no one I know prefers to lose, it is sometimes in the loss, the withdrawal, in the retreat that valuable lessons are learned, new skills acquired, and a fresh strength is recovered.

I have a feeling that the majority of those reading these words have at one time or another felt overwhelmed. Maybe you do today. I would bet that those reading these

words have felt as though their life of prayer is not as been. There may even be those who feel as though they don't know how to pray, or that Jesus is far from their daily living and aren't

quite sure what happens next. If any of these fit you today, then you are a prime candidate for a retreat.

Throughout the Gospels, Jesus is constantly going off into the desert to pray. Several to come away to a lonely place with Him. He teaches them that the work of the preaching of Good News requires a regular retreat from the demands, interactions, and accompaniment of those who do not yet know Him. As for Jesus Christ and the Apostles, so too for us, we need these regular moments of retreat, of withdrawal to the lonely place to sit in God's presence and rest in the Father's love.

We are very fortunate in the Diocese of Amarillo to have a well-staffed, well kept, and local retreat center as fine as the Bishop de Falco Retreat Center. We also have at our disposal smaller centers for days of reflection at Praytown with the Disciples of our Lord Jesus Christ, Sancta Maria Convent with the Panhandle Franciscans, a multitude of Christian retreat centers and campgrounds for larger groups, and places as near as the old convent at Holy Family in Nazareth. We have a very active ACTS community, yearly Contemplative Prayer retreats, and seasonal evenings and days of reflection. The people of God in Amarillo have access to trained spiritual directors.

Most parishes in the Diocese offer at least a yearly preached mission of some kind. Our Sacramental preparation programs require retreats for those preparing for reception of Sacraments. The opportunities are many, the styles as varied as possible, and all offered with ready availability.

Members of the Clergy and religious communities of men and women are required to make a 5-8 day canonical retreat every year. Those tasked with the responsibility of prayer for, the instruction of, and the care of souls are told to leave that very important work to reconnect yearly with our God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit for the strengthening and refreshment of their souls in order to care for those souls in their charge. Please take some time to check out the offerings of our Retreat Center. Or perhaps schedule a day or two of reflection with the Disciples in Prayertown or the Franciscans in Panhandle. Watch the parish bulletin for different retreat opportunities as we are made aware of them. Make dedicated space in your life for quiet and communion with Jesus Christ, who desires to show his deep and abiding love for you.

small gift to someone who works hard for your community (or for your family).



Talk to them about Saint Teresa of Calcutta (including when she lived and died), her work, and her writings as a way to show children that even modern day people can be saints. - 3. **Grandparents Day is the first Sunday after Labor Day.** Help your children do something special for their grandparents or plan to spend the day with them, if possible.
- 4. **Decorate wooden or paper letters spelling out MARY.** Be as colorful and creative as you want to celebrate the Most Holy Name of Mary (September 12th).
- 5. **Find your favorite cross craft** to create on September 14th for the Exaltation of the Holy Cross.
- 6. **September 22**nd **marks the beginning of Autumn!** Try one of these fall crafts to celebrate: http://thechaosandtheclutter.com/archives/easy-fall-crafts
- 7. **Donate to the less fortunate.** Look around your room, house, or pantry for items or food to donate in honor of the feast day of St. Vincent de Paul on September 27th.
- 8. **Be a peacemaker.** Do something nice for someone that you sometimes argue with in honor of the feast day of St. Wenceslaus, which is on September 28th.
- 9. **Learn a prayer or short phrase** (such as Ora Pro Nobis, which means "pray for us") **in Latin.** Saint Jerome translated the Bible from Hebrew to Latin, and his feast day is September 30th.
- 10. **Make bread.** Jesus is the Bread of Life. Pick out your favorite bread recipe and have your children help you make it.


