#### God Alone!



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We begin a new year and although the world continues to press on through much suffering, the Christian heart is always renewed by hope in the presence of its Lord and Savior, the infant Jesus. We continue to celebrate the beautiful season of Christmas, the season that proclaims Christ is born for us! As the angel proclaimed to the shepherds, "Do not be afraid; for behold, I proclaim to you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For today in the city of David a savior has been born for you who is Messiah and Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find an infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger" (Luke 2: 10-12). The birth of Jesus announces hope to the Christian heart that God is with us in the midst of every time and circumstance. What is most powerful about the angel's announcement is the reminder that God has been born for us: a savior has been born for you who is Messiah and Lord. God has become man to reassure us that He is with us in a very personal and real way. God is not some far removed deity who has no association with our lives. Rather, He has taken upon Himself our humanity, our suffering, our longings and yearnings, our sin, and even death itself, all to relieve the burden of our miseries and to grant us new life, both temporally and eternally. May we take this lesson to heart, especially when life is challenging. God always sends us holy reminders of this truth of our faith as well. Most recently the Holy Father approved the canonization of Blessed Mother Anne-Marie Rivier, the foundress of the Sisters of the Presentation of Mary, with whom our parish has had a long history of friendship and association. Thus, her news of canonization is a moment of great joy for the sisters and for us as a parish family. May the promotion of Blessed Mother Rivier to the altars as a saint unite us ever more closely.

Mother Rivier's life itself reflects the words of the angel that a Savior has been for you, and thus to not be afraid. The third of four children, she fell from her bed at sixteen months of age, which led to a broken hip and great suffering. She had to use her hands to drag herself around. After seeing her mother pray for an extended period of time, she was able to walk, a miracle she received on the feast of our Lady's birth, September 8, 1774. She, however, had another fall several years later. However, she made a full recovery in 1777. The effects of her physical traumas resulted in her being denied entry into the Sisters of Notre Dame de Pradelle. This, however, coupled with the closure of religious orders due to the French Revolution, did not stop Anne-Marie Rivier. Rather she placed her confidence and determination in God. It would be this unbreakable spirit of hope that led her to found and receive early approval for the Congregation of the Presentation of Mary. When religion was permitted to be practiced again in France in 1801, her new community experienced great growth. Mother Rivier and her fellow sisters were vested in their religious habit for the first time on November 21, 1807. As Mother Rivier was fond of saying, "We were nothing, we had nothing, we could do nothing. And after that, could you doubt that it was God, who led things to the point where you see them today, who founded, increased and strengthened this community?" She also used to say, "I expect everything from prayer!" Indeed, Marie Rivier's life was a concrete sign of the angel's words to the shepherds; she knew within her heart that indeed a Savior had been born for her! Therefore, she could say with all earnestness, "Speaking of God is happiness for me!"

As we unite ourselves to the joy of her spiritual daughters, the Sisters of the Presentation of Mary, may we see her life as a great witness to the joy and hope of Christmas that God has been born for us!

# BLESSING OF THE HOME FOR THE EPIPHANY

The blessing of the home and inscription of the initials of the three Magi above each door can be done by the head of the family. The feast of the manifestation, or Epiphany, is traditionally celebrated the 12th day after Christmas, January 6th. In the dioceses of the United States, this feast has been moved to the Sunday between January 2 nd and January 8th.

**Prayer** on entering the home, **Leader**: Peace to this house. **All**: And to all who dwell herein.

**All**: From the east came the Magi to Bethlehem to adore the Lord; and opening their treasures they offered precious gifts: gold for the great King, incense for the true God, and myrrh, a symbol of His burial.

During the recitation of the Magnificat, the room is sprinkled with holy water.

**All**: My soul + proclaims the greatness of the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God my Savior for he has looked with favor on his lowly servant.

From this day all generations will call me blessed:

the Almighty has done great things for me, and holy is his Name.

He has mercy on those who fear him in every generation.

He has shown the strength of his arm, he has scattered the proud in their conceit.

He has cast down the mighty from their thrones, and has lifted up the lowly.

He has filled the hungry with good things, and the rich he has sent away empty.

He has come to the help of his servant Israel for he has remembered his promise of mercy,

the promise he made to our fathers, to Abraham and his children forever.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

**All**: From the east came the Magi to Bethlehem to adore the Lord; and opening their treasures they offered precious gifts: gold for the great King, incense for the true God, and myrrh, a symbol of His burial.

**Leader**: Our Father,.... And lead us not into temptation **All**: But deliver us from evil.

**Leader**: And they shall come from Sheba **All**: Bringing gold and frankincense.

**Leader**: O Lord, hear my prayer. **All**: And let my cry come to You.

**Leader**: Be enlightened, be enlightened, O Jerusalem, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord is risen upon you—Jesus Christ, born of the Virgin Mary.

**All**: And the Gentiles shall walk in your light and kings in the splendor of your rising, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you.

**Leader**: Let us pray. Bless, O Lord God almighty, this home, that in it there may be health, purity, the strength of victory, humility, goodness and mercy, the fulfillment of Your law, the thanksgiving to God the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. And may this blessing remain upon this home and upon all who dwell herein. Through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

After the prayers of the blessing are recited, each room of the home is sprinkled with Epiphany water and the initials of the Magi are inscribed upon the doors with the blessed chalk. The initials, C,M,B, can also be interpreted as the Latin phrase "Christus mansionem benedicat" which means, "Christ, bless this house."

Parish calendars have arrived! They are on the windowsills in the back of the church. Please take one to enjoy throughout the year.




# UPDATED ONLINE GIVING SYSTEM



### **GOSPEL MEDITATION**

## **Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture**

In his Apostolic Exhortation, The Joy of the Gospel, Pope Francis references a thought from Pope Benedict XVI: "Being a Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction." Today we celebrate an encounter with the Person of Jesus Christ! This simple but holy event in time dramatically changes human life, pointing it toward a new horizon and giving it a decisive direction. This is a message and truth that is not meant to be shared with only a select few who qualify but with the entire world. Pope Francis continues saying, "Thanks solely to this encounter or renewed encounter with God's love, which blossoms into an enriching friendship, we are liberated from our narrowness and self-absorption. We become fully human when we become more than human, when we let God bring us beyond ourselves in order to attain the fullest truth of our being."

Look around at people. Where is life heading for them? What gives them direction? Even we who are people of faith can get distracted and lose our focus. God, in all of His fullness, is revealed in Jesus Christ and we can encounter Him! God is tangible, real, vulnerable, poor, and full of wonders, surprises, and opportunities. For those who are struggling and lost, today is a day of great joy. All they have to do is reach out and touch the truth of Christ. This presence is revealed in the poor, exploited, and vulnerable ones who cry out for compassion and love. But it is also found in the faithful ones who see in the Epiphany of God a liberation from structures and systems that hurt us, a narrowness of mind and heart that constricts us, and an absorption in our self-agenda that prevents us from seeing anything other than ourselves as important.

We have been given the charge of preaching this Good News. If only we could find a way to be more effective, it might stand a chance of doing what God intended it to do. There is always tomorrow and our memory of that bright new light that shone so brilliantly that Bethlehem night pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.
