
TOLLE, LEGE: This is a Latin admonition by St. Augustine, whose feast we celebrate this month, which means, "take and read." It refers to Sacred Scriptures. The following is the schema of Sunday readings for the month which we invite you to "take and read" as a prayerful preparation for the Sunday Eucharist:

- August 7: Wis. 18:6-9; Heb. 11:1-2, 8-19; Luke 3 12:32-48.
- ⊕ August 14: Jer. 38:4-6, 8-10; Heb. 12:1-4; Luke 12:49-53.
- August 21: Is. 66:8-21; Heb. 12:5-7, 11-13; Luke 13:22-30.
- → August 28: Sir. 3:17-18, 20, 28-29; Heb. 12:18-19, 22-24a; Luke 14:1, 7-14.

AUGUST SAINT: Giovanni Battista Montini was born in 1897 in Concesio near Brescia. The shy, bookish and frail young Giovanni attended a local seminary while living at home, and was ordained in 1920. He pursued graduate studies in Rome and was employed in the Vatican secretariat of state. Montini soon took up the role as assistant to the secretary of state, Cardinal Eugenio Pacelli. When the latter became Pope Pius XII, Montini continued to assist his mentor.

In 1954 Msgr. Montini was appointed Archbishop of Milan, having refused a cardinal's hat

two years earlier. The task was enormous for the shy bookish prelate. But Montini set out to restore the war-scarred see. He also immersed himself in ecumenical efforts. The new pope, John



XXIII, elevated Montini to the College of Cardinal in 1958. Cardinal Montini prophetically and fortuitously assisted Good Pope John in preparing for Vatican II and traveled extensively, including to

the US. In June 1963 following the beloved Pope's death, Montini was elected Pope, taking the name Paul, after the Apostle to the Gentiles.

As Pope, Paul VI reconvened Vatican II, which would have a sweeping and lasting effect on the church. In 1964 he even met in Jerusalem with Patriarch Athenagoras I, the first such gathering since the Schism of 1054. Vatican II ushered in greater roles for women, collegiality, ecumenism and liturgical reforms. As the waves of reform swept the church, Paul VI issued *Humanæ Vitæ*, which was not well received in many circles. After the encyclical was published a pall seemed to fall over the balance of Paul VI's pontificate. Nonetheless the Pope continued to travel the world and engage in ground-breaking ecumenical efforts. He also internationalized the church's College of Cardinals and Curia, with a nod to the Third World.

Paul VI also reduced the pomp and ceremony of the papacy. He was known as a man of great prayer and concern for social justice throughout his life, and a good friend of the Benedictine Confederation! He died at Castel Gandolfo, 6 August 1978, the feast of the Transfiguration, and was buried in a simple tomb in the Vatican Grotto. At the late Pope's beatification, 14 October 2014, Pope Francis said: In [his] humility the grandeur of Blessed Paul VI shines forth: before the advent of a secularized and hostile society, he could hold fast, with farsightedness and wisdom—and at times alone—to the helm of the barque of Peter, while never losing his joy and his trust in the Lord.
