From Our Parish Evangelist,

As some of you may know, I have a particular fascination with what are referred to as the 'Prehistorical Narratives' of the Book of Genesis. These contain the familiar stories from Creation to the Tower of Babel in Chapters 1-11. The remaining chapters of the book shift to more focused and detailed profiles of the Biblical Patriarchs: Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and Joseph. As we embark on our annual Lenten pilgrimage this week, we are reminded of a famous sequence from the prehistoric record - the covenant with Noah and his sons.

It is useful to recall that these stories exist in an epoch prior to the formal establishment of what would become Judaism under the proliferation of Abraham and his descendants. The covenant with Noah is one bound to all nations a gentile covenant that remains in place until the universal proclamation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. In fact, you may notice that the covenant promise extends beyond merely a commitment to humanity, but to all of Creation. The flood story mirrors much of the language of the Creation stories of Genesis 1 and 2 - presenting a pseudo-creation story in itself. God promises Noah and his sons that he will never again flood the Earth, a reflection of His original work of bringing Creation out of the waters of the abyss described in the opening lines of the Bible.

The universality of the Noahic covenant is further demonstrated in the progeny of Noah's sons. The so-called 'Table of Nations' of Genesis Chapter 10 describes how Noah's family extended out from the ark to repopulate the Earth. Famously, the Jewish people attribute their lineage to Shem, from which we inherit the designations Semite and Semitic. While the actual genealogical lineage of various peoples and races to the three sons of Noah is difficult to affirm at best, it is not devoid of spiritual truth.

The truth lies in the nature of the covenant itself. From the very beginning God wills to enter into relationship with all of His creation, no matter their ethnic, religious, or racial identity. Of course we Catholics believe that we have received the fullness of Revelation in the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and each of us are under obligation to embrace the Truth. Not only are we called to embrace it, but like the family of Noah, we are called to 'populate the earth' with that very Truth - to proclaim the Good News to all peoples that salvation has been won for them through the Blood of the Cross. That being said, we are once again reminded of the Natural Law, which is truly the essence of the covenant with Noah. *All* peoples are obliged to recognize the call of our Creator - a call to seek goodness and truth in all things. To recognize God and His unique imprint on every individual is at the heart of what it means to be human. To respect and protect what God has created is truly the universal call of mankind, whether Jew, Christian, Muslim, - even the agnostic. The covenant with Noah remains valid for all of us, and is verified and perfected in the universal promise of the New Covenant of Jesus Christ.

What is a CRS Rice Bowl

This simple cardboard box is a tool for collecting Lenten alms. It also comes with a Lenten calendar filled with activities and stories that guides families through the 40 days of Lent. Let's prepare to put our faith into action through prayer, fasting and almsgiving. *Rice Bowls will be available in the gathering space. Please return by March 27th.*

Lenten Guidelines

Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast (two small meals and one regular meal, no eating in between) on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. In addition, all Catholics 14 years old and older must abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all the Fridays of Lent.

FASTING is to be observed by all, 18 years of age and older, who have not yet celebrated their 59th birthday. On a fast day, one full meal is allowed. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids, including milk and juices, are allowed.

ABSTINENCE is observed by all 14 years of age and older. On days of abstinence no meat is allowed. Note that when health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige. When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, the parish priest should be consulted (CCL, Nos. 1251-1252).

Fasting, almsgiving, and prayer are the three traditional disciplines of Lent. The faithful and catechumens should undertake these practices seriously in a spirit of penance and of preparation for baptism or of renewal of baptism at Easter.
