

REFLECTIONS

FROM DEACON DON

When I was little, each year we would travel to the upper peninsula where my dad grew up. My aunt would always know when we were coming and she would make bread in her wood fired stove. My dad and I looked forward to her homemade bread. When we would get home my mom would try to make bread for us but somehow she would fail. For the holidays she would buy frozen bread and the joke was the bread was done when the smoke detector went off.

In our first reading from 1 Kings the angel of the Lord gives Elijah a hearth cake and a jug of water so he would be strong enough to walk for 40 days and 40 nights to the mountain of the Lord. This food was to sustain earthly life.

In our gospel from John, Jesus tells the Jews that their ancestors ate manna in the desert. This was also to sustain earthly life. But Jesus now tells them about the bread from heaven, a bread that is for eternal life. He says that He is the bread of life and those who believe in Him will have life eternal. The bread He gives is His flesh for the life of the world. This bread He is talking about is the Eucharist. This bread helps to sustain our earthly life but also is for eternal life.

I find many people who leave the Catholic church for a non-denominational church are being fed by the preaching, but also the entertainment that they find there, but not the bread from heaven. They don't believe in the transubstantiation of the Eucharist.

Like my mom that failed to make bread, how did we fail to teach them that the Eucharist is the true presence of God, Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity? Did the world sway them away from believing in the mystery of our faith? Or is it their intellect that tells them it is impossible that the bread and wine becomes the Body and Blood. Just like I looked forward to my aunt's homemade bread, I look forward to receiving the Eucharist. The Eucharist is the spiritual food that sustains me from one week to the next. After all, it is the pinnacle of our faith.



Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

In today's passage from the First Book of Kings, God sustains His tired and distressed prophet Elijah with food and drink to fortify him for his journey to God's mountain, Mt. Horeb. In St. John's Gospel, Jesus professes He is the "Bread of Life" and those who partake of this Bread will live forever. When we consume the Lord's consecrated Body and Blood in Holy Communion, we unify as one spirit in discipleship with Christ. St. Paul instructs the Ephesian Christian community, and us, to follow the way of love through Christ. Through our Lord's love and our participation in the Eucharist, Jesus directs us to proclaim His Word to all in a spirit of evangelization, and to welcome our brothers and sisters to a personal relationship with Him.

EVANGELIZATION

Unity in the Celebration of Holy Mass

I've been blessed by participating in Mass in many languages: English (of course), Spanish, French, and Slovakian. I've been at Orthodox Sacred Liturgies sung in Russian at a monastery outside Moscow and in Greek in Troy. There were bilingual Masses in Spanish and English, and Spanish and Basque in Spain. One Pentecost Vigil in our Cathedral concluded with hundreds of Charismatic people praying fervently in Tongues, in felt response to the Spirit. And the Latin Mass I grew up with, still offered in some parishes. In all these, understand we participate in one sacrifice united with our High Priest Jesus Christ, the faithful throughout the world, and the Communion of Saints.

There is also worldwide diversity in how Mass is celebrated. The Church embraces various culturally expressive liturgical settings, architecture, music, and vestments. There is an approved Zairean Rite, the "Congolese Mass," that includes drums and dance from African traditions. Pope Francis recently advocated for a rite specific to the languages and culture of the Amazon region of South America.

So I am confused when Pope Francis acts to severely limit the Traditional Latin Mass (TLM). In a document titled ironically in Latin, *Traditionis Custodes* ("Guardians of the Tradition"), Francis reverses permission for the TLM granted by Pope St. John Paul II and Pope Benedict who each hoped to encourage unity in the Church. Pope Francis also aims for unity under the post-Vatican II *Novus Ordo* Mass. He is motivated by attitudes of some people who feel strongly for or against the TLM. He is concerned that a few desiring the TLM reject Vatican II, and that some people on both "sides" feel "holier than thou." It seems to me those attitudes need to be addressed, not the TLM. I think *Traditionis Custodes* lacks coherence so I look forward to clarification from the bishops who have a role in implementing it.

While I appreciate the beauty of the TLM, and find it warmly nostalgic, I do not prefer it. But I recognize the faithfulness and piety of those who do. I appreciate the reverence with which the Eucharist is celebrated in the TLM. The question we might ask ourselves is how reverently we engage in any Mass. As Jesus intended, let us be united with Him and the whole Church in this one prayer, whether English or Latin or Congolese Lingala.
