

Fourth Sunday of Easter (A) Acts 2:14a, 36-41 1 Pt 2:20b-25 In 10:1-10



### Matters of Life and Death

Sheep are a lot smarter than some people think. They recognize the voice of their particular shepherd and follow that voice alone. However, that is not the point of Jesus' teaching today. Because most of us don't raise sheep or know much about them, we don't realize that the situation described in the Gospel passage is a matter of life and death.

It's similar to the relationship between a military squad leader and the troops he leads, another lifeand-death matter. In both, unquestioning obedience is required, and absolute trust in the other is presumed.

That's what Jesus is describing. He's suggesting: "Listen to me. Follow my lead. Trust in me. I want only what is good for you, so I will be your sure protection."

It sounds so easy, as parables and metaphors usually do. What does it mean to follow this Shepherd? In the first reading, Peter announces the answer in one word: "Repent!" There is that challenging word—the word

we might associate with Lent, not with Easter. If we do so, we miss the point of following the Shepherd, for to follow him means to be like him. It means: "Repent! Stop taking advantage of other people. Open your minds and hearts to newcomers. Respect those who observe different religious traditions. Help those less fortunate than you." All of this is captured in the final words of the Gospel reading: do what you can so that all "might have life and have it more abundantly" (John 10:10). Clearly, that's smart.

Dear Parishioners,

As I begin my 7<sup>th</sup> letter to you since our public Masses were suspended, I am profoundly aware of how each one of you must long to receive the Holy Eucharist and to enjoy the weekly gathering of our Faith family. Once our public Masses do resume, we will exercise great care in providing for the protection of the common good and to minimize the continued spread of the coronavirus. I know Bishop LaValley, in consultation with healthcare professionals and others, is working on guidelines to assist us once Masses with a congregation resume.

Parishioners have inquired how the finances are going for our parishes. So many have continued to keep up their financial support of our parishes. I am gratified by the faithful commitment of so many folks to our three parishes. Thank you!

In the Gospel reading for this coming Sunday, John 10: 1-10, Jesus twice identifies himself as 'the gate;' what is he meaning by this? What comes to mind when we think of gates? We might think of the gate in a walled city like the old city of Quebec, or in the forts that were built here in our own country. A gate's purpose was to allow for entry, but also to provide protection from danger. What about the gates we come upon when we travel by airplane or train—gates for departures and arrivals.

In calling himself, 'the gate,' Jesus is telling each one of us—He is our protection and our way.

Christ recognizes, far better than we do, the dangers lurking around us that could rob us of the eternal life that he died to give us. As *the gate*, Jesus gives us the *Protection* of the Holy Spirit and the power of grace to guard us from evil.

Because of his life, death and resurrection, the Lord Jesus has become *the Way* through which we enter into a relationship with God his Father, and with our brothers and sisters in faith. We have access to an abundant life through Jesus, *the Gate*. And this is one among the many reasons the Church gathers each Sunday to pray our gratitude and praise.

# Dear Padre,

# How will it happen that Jesus will come again and lead us "through the gates"?

We have it from the best of authorities that the date of the world's end is hidden. Jesus said, "But of that day and hour no one knows... but the Father alone" (Matthew 24:36). In spite of Christ's admonition that the day of his Second Coming is known but to God, there have been countless false prophets who have confidently but incorrectly predicted a date for the end of the world. Most of these foolish forecasters based their claims on misinterpretations of the Book of Revelation.

The main purpose of the Book of Revelation is to assure us that God's power will prevail. In the ongoing struggle between good and evil, there are times when evil seems to have the upper hand. No matter. Evil will be conquered and God's rule will extend over all creation.

The world might end tomorrow, or next year, or in five billion years. Jesus tells us we can't know for sure. We are sure, however, that this world will pass away. And for each one of us the world will end at the moment of death. What matters is that we should always be ready to meet Christ.
