Saint of the Week: Our Lady of Fatima, 20th Century, (*Feast May 13*). Mary appeared to three peasant children near Fatima, Portugal, six times between May 13 and October 13, 1917, and asked for prayers for world peace and an end to World War I, for sinners, and for the conversion of Russia. She entrusted the children with three secrets, regarding devotion to her Immaculate Heart, a vision of hell, and a "bishop in white" shot by soldiers firing bullets and arrows. Many connect the third secret to the attempted assassination of Blessed Pope John Paul II on May 13, 1981, and the pope thanked Mary for guiding the bullet and saving him. At the Vatican last October 13, Pope Francis stood before the statue of Our Lady from the Fatima shrine and formally entrusted the world to Mary.

Pro-life activist Abby Johnson, former director and counselor at the Planned Parenthood facility in Bryan, Texas, whose story and 2011 book *Unplanned* inspired the film *Unplanned*, was asked in the fall of 2009 to assist in an ultrasound-guided abortion of a thirteen week-unborn child. Though this was not one of her duties, she agreed to help. That decision became a turning point in her life. When she saw on the ultrasound screen what was happening to the unborn child, she knew she had to leave Planned Parenthood. In a recent interview with the *Arlington Catholic Herald*, she recounted: "I left Planned Parenthood in 2009 after seeing a live ultrasound-guided abortion procedure and seeing that baby fight and struggle for his life against the abortion instrument, I knew then that there was life in the womb, there was humanity there and I was on the wrong side of the debate." Her conversion to the right "side of the debate" was astonishing. She had had two abortions herself, was involved indirectly in nearly 22,000 abortions and was once named "employee of the year" at her Planned Parenthood affiliate. Before her conversion, however, she had sincerely believed she was helping women, and had helped at times by detecting uterine cancer and counseling women with postpartum depression.

After her conversion she became actively involved in the pro-life movement and became the chief research strategist of the national pro-life organization, Live Action. Additionally, she founded And Then There Were None (ATTWN) in 2011, a nonprofit that helps other abortion workers leave their jobs. Its mission statement on her website abbyjohnson.org reads, in part, like a credo: "We're in the fight for life because we're pro-love. We see that every life, from the child in the womb, to the elderly - and in between, including the abortion clinic worker's life, have incredible value and worth. We believe that abortion strips women of their dignity. We believe that motherhood is empowering. We believe that not conforming and giving into societal pressures when it comes to femininity is empowering. We believe that justice applies to every single human being on this earth. We believe in redefining the pro-life movement to include everyone, every age, race, gender, religion and every job.

In 2012, Abby, like pro-life advocates Bernard Nathanson (M.D.), the former "abortion King of New York City and Norma McCorvey, the Jane Roe of Roe v. Wade before her, became a Catholic (*Arlington Catholic Herald*, March 28 to April 3, 2019, P.7; abortionworker.com; Richard Doerflinger, "A clear eye on the whitewashing of Planned Parenthood", *CNS*, April 26 2019).
