A PROFOUNDLY SAD TIME IN THE CHURCH

Last Tuesday, a major report with awful news was issued by a grand jury in Pennsylvania about a systemic failure in the protection of children. Since children read this bulletin, I'm not going to go into the offenses mentioned other than to say this: Children and the vulnerable were not respected by Church ministers and not protected by Church leaders. The report is over 1300 pages. As of today's writing, (Wednesday), I'm only halfway through it. By the weekend, I'll have digested it. It made me feel so angry, ashamed, and outraged at what was NOT done to protect children. What was done by priests and church leaders was simply wrong. Please pray for all the victims. Pray for their healing. This report was just devastating.

We want Corpus Christi to continue to be the safest possible place for children. Like other parishes, there are strong requirements and policies to protect children. We will continue to be vigilant with our training, background checks, and monitoring of our entire facility. Our policies are designed to not only protect children, but also to protect and safeguard all the hundreds of our parishioners who work with our children. It is of no comfort whatsoever to know that the vast majority of victims in the report were from many years ago. It was still wrong. Likewise, we see the lack of protection of children in so many sectors of our society. It is still wrong.

In dark times, think of your own faith. It keeps me going. You are so good. God bless you.



Five Ways to Keep the Faith in Summer

1. See God in All Things

Catholics have a rich history of seeing the ordinary and perceiving the extraordinary. The sacraments allow us to see ordinary things such as water, bread, wine and oil as doors to the sacred that reveal God. This summer, we can use our "sacramental imagination" to see God in new places as we travel, as we garden, as we spend time outside and even as we watch Little League games. St. Ignatius taught us to: "See God in all things." Summer is a time when we can slow down, find time for reflection so we can see God in the everyday occurrences of life.

2. Recharge the Family Batteries

The Gospels tell us that even Jesus needed time to recharge; He would withdraw from the crowds and go off alone to pray. Think of summer as your time to withdraw from crowds and spend time with God. Do you ever have quiet in your house?

3. Adjust Your Summer Schedule

How do we continue our faith journey in the summer without regular schedules and religion classes? Of course, God's revelation never ends. The Catholic Catechism says that God's revelation can be encountered in "the great book of creation, and that of history - the page on which the 'today' of God is written". As we spend time outside and admire the beauty of creation, how can that lead us to conversation (prayer) with God?

4. Go Outside and Pray

The Celts in Ireland are famous for having their church gatherings outside; you won't find many cathedrals in Ireland. They believed creation was holy, so they worshipped in the "Cathedral of Creation." Where is your family's "holy ground"?

5. Find God as a Family

God is always with us, but we can get too busy to notice. Have you ever lost your purse and found that it was on your shoulder? Or your sunglasses and found they were on your head? It's the same for God; he's always with us, but we may be too preoccupied to notice. Take time to notice God in your world this summer.



Catholic Health Initiatives Helps Lead Campaign to Create New ICD-10 Codes on Human Trafficking

by Sisters Against Trafficking ENGLEWOOD, Colo.--



Catholic Health initiatives helped spearhead an 18-monthlong effort to create a diagnostic code that will allow medical professionals to identify victims of human trafficking when they arrive at facilities seeking health care.

CHI, one of the nation's largest nonprofit health systems, collaborated with the

American Hospital Association's Hospitals Against Violence (HAV) initiative and clinicians at Massachusetts General Hospital's Human Trafficking Initiative and Freedom Clinic to develop and secure ICD-10 codes that will allow providers to document sex and labor exploitation for the first time.

The 29 human trafficking-related codes, published by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention on June 11, will help providers identify victims and respond appropriately to assist victims. Set to take effect in October, the codes will also provide much needed data to understand the scope of this problem.

"Like victims of child abuse or elder abuse, victims of human trafficking are coming into emergency rooms and health care facilities on a daily basis – and we have to be ready," said Colleen Scanlon, senior vice president and chief advocacy officer for Englewood, Colo.-based Catholic Health Initiatives. "This is a significant step forward. Having these codes will help clinicians adequately classify a diagnosis and plan appropriate treatment."

The new codes will be used to identify and document both confirmed and suspected cases of forced sexual and labor exploitation of children and adults who go to a hospital or medical facility for treatment of an injury, illness or condition. Like other ICD codes, they serve as an official diagnosis to describe diseases, causes of diseases and death.

Over the past several years, human trafficking has become a public health concern that is growing nationwide. Commune more often

Because he was the first pope to live in the modern age of technology, we know more about Pope Saint Pius X than many others. His life and ministry make a fascinating story, but today remember him as a leader who stressed simplicity and poverty. "I was born poor, I lived poor, and I shall die poor." He is likewise remembered as the pope who encouraged frequent Communion rather than once or twice a year as was common. His change in practice also encouraged frequent celebration of the sacrament of Penance in preparation for receiving the Eucharist. Participate in these sacraments together soon.

MEMORIAL OF THE QUEENSHIP OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY Our most gracious advocate

The mother that bore the child Jesus and reared him into adulthood was, in turn, borne up into heaven by the power of the child. There she was deemed Queen, so that she might share the inheritance of Christ with her people. We cry out to her in the antiphon, "Hail Holy Queen, mother of mercy, our life, our sweetness, and our hope." In doing so, we name her by her unique kingdoms, not of land but of virtues. For our share in these virtues we may ask her, who has always concerned herself in our salvation, to intercede on our behalf.

TODAY'S READINGS: Ezra 34:1-11; Matthew 20:1-16 (421). "I will give you what is just."

MEMORIAL OF ROSE OF LIMA, VIRGIN

Flower power

Given her beauty, Rose of Lima (1586-1617) could have had her pick of marriage partners, but she preferred to live a simple life of prayer and live in a small hut set in her family's garden. To help her parents financially, she sold the beautiful flowers she cultivated. Aware of the many poor people in Lima, she opened a room in her family's home to anyone who needed her care, asking nothing in return. Great crowds gathered at her death, and her coffin was carried through the city. Rose was the first saint from the Western Hemisphere, and her feast day is widely celebrated in South America with processions filled with flowers. What beautiful creation can you cultivate in the garden of your own life?

FEAST OF BARTHOLOMEW, APOSTLE

Just one of the gang

In every crowd there are leaders and there are followers. There are characters who stick out and those who simply blend in. Bartholomew was one of those invisible ones. He was so transparent in the gospel accounts that he is also identified as Nathanael. All that we know about his ministry and martyrdom is legend, some of it even based on non-Christian stories. We do know for sure that he was one of the 12 apostles chosen by Jesus. And that is enough. We don't have to be famous to get into heaven, just faithful like Bartholomew.

TODAY'S READINGS: Revelation 21:9b-14; John 1:45-51 (629). "Nathanael said, 'Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Philip replied, 'Come and see.'

MEMORIAL OF JOSEPH CALASANZ, PRIEST Just doing his Job

The work of a teacher can be hard. Take the example of Saint Joseph Calasanz (1556-1648), whose great mission in life was educating the urban poor for free, with special attention to the abandoned and homeless children of Rome. He even founded a religious order devoted to this task. By 1611 his school had 1,200 students. But then one of the members of his own community led a revolt against him that resulted in his false arrest and being forced from office. Joseph went through this experience without complaint. Picking up on this fact, Cardinal Prospero Lambertini, who would become Pope Benedict XIV, said Calasanz was a "perpetual miracle of fortitude and another Job." Next time you find yourself in a position to teach someone, remember the great dedication and patience of Joseph Calasanz.

EUCHARIST

WEEKEND LITURGIES:

Saturday—5:00 p.m. Sunday—7:30 a.m., 9:30 a.m., 11:30 a.m.

WEEKDAY LITURGIES: 7:30 a.m.—Mon. to Fri.

EUCHARIST FOR THE SICK AND

HOMEBOUND:

Every first Friday; other times upon request

FIRST EUCHARIST:

Usually celebrated in 2nd grade for children. Celebrated at the Easter Vigil for adults.

BAPTISM

Baptisms for registered parishioners are celebrated at 1:15 p.m. on Sundays: monthly during the summer, and twice a month during the rest of the year. A required orientation for first-time parents of babies being baptized is held one Sunday each month, 10:15—11:45 a.m. (July & August by appointment.) Please contact the parish office in advance to register for the orientation and to schedule the Baptism. No Baptisms are scheduled until after the baby has been born.

Adults: participate in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). Through this process, the sacraments of Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation are received. For further information, contact the parish office.

CONFIRMATION

Parishioners of high school age are confirmed following a two-year preparation program, usually culminating with Confirmation in the beginning of junior year. Adult parishioners are usually confirmed at the Easter Vigil. For further information, contact the parish office.

PENANCE

For all parishioners: celebrated on Saturday from 4:15-4:45 p.m. in the Atrium Conference Room;

outside of these times, upon request.

Communal Penance services are held in Advent and Lent.

First Penance: Usually celebrated in the 2nd grade.

MARRIAGE

Please contact the parish office one year prior to the wedding. Preparation for Marriage includes: Pre-Cana or Engaged Encounter, as well as meetings with the Pastoral Associate for Marriage and Family, the Music Minister, and the Priest who will witness the marriage. Weddings may be scheduled any day Monday through Saturday. No weddings will be scheduled on Sundays, eves of holidays, holidays, or holiday weekends.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK

This sacrament may be celebrated with any person who is seriously ill. A communal celebration of this sacrament is held periodically. You may request this sacrament at any time, especially in case of emergency. Any parishioner who is in the hospital and wishes to see a member of the parish staff should notify the parish office.
