## JULY 2, 2023 THIRTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

#### OVERCOMING SPIRITUAL OBSTACLES PART 1

A few years ago in the Rose Bowl parade in Pasadena, one of the floats stalled. Suddenly all the floats behind were forced to stop. Frustrations mounted as this event was televised around the world. Mechanics quickly descended upon the stalled float, searching all over for the problem. Finally, someone had the presence of mind to check on the fuel level of the vehicle. It was empty, out of gas. This became even more embarrassing when the crowd realized that the float's sponsor was a major oil company.



Sometimes we can feel the same way in our spiritual life, stuck and feeling far from God. We look for solutions by pondering the deeper philosophical questions of life, when the answer is very simple. One of the common reasons why people feel stuck is that they have ignored sin in their life. At times, we all do this. In the past maybe we focused on it too much. Today we have gone to the other extreme where people act as if sin doesn't exist.

Sin is moving outside of the boundaries that God has set up for us as human beings. The Scriptures say that the "just person sins seven times a day" (Prov 24:16). From the beginning of time in the Garden of Eden, after God told Adam and Eve to not eat from the tree of Good and Evil, the devil tempted them by saying, "You certainly will not die. God knows well that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods, who know good and evil" (Gen 3:4-5). Sin is thinking and acting as if our lives belong to us, instead of seeing ourselves as stewards of our lives, where God is the owner to whom we will all have to give an accounting. The truth is that all sins, big and small, send a negative rippling effect throughout our lives and to all those around us, in ways that we cannot see in the moment. It is not God punishing us, as much as God seeing and grieving over the suffering and anxiety that we invite into our lives and our families.

When each of us sins, we choose to take a step away from God and we demonstrate to others that it is ok to do so. We rationalize that nothing has happened, or minimalize things that we are not as bad as others. We stretch the truth, "I am a good person overall." Like Adam and Eve, we are tempted to justify our actions. Yet every one of us feels the effects of sin in our own life: lone liness, depression, fear, anxiety, and unforgiveness. Jesus doesn't want us stuck here. Yet how many choose to remain there!

Jesus on the Cross is proof that sin is real and that we all contributed to it by our personal sins. The Good News is that Jesus came to reconcile us from our personal sins and their effects. Jesus shows us how we receive this healing. Jesus gave the ability to forgive sin to the Apostles (and bishops/priests throughout history). "...he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained" (John 20:22-23).

It is tempting to ignore the root cause of many of the difficulties in our lives and in our world, and rationalize that the cause is outside of us. Don't shortchange joy, hope and healing by avoiding one of the most common roadblocks in our spiritual journey. Jesus came that we might have life and have it to the full. We can all live as though sin doesn't exist, living on an empty tank if we choose. Or in a healthy way we can acknowledge our personal sins and allow Jesus to heal us on a regular basis. I invite you to get back to the practice of coming to Confession on a regular basis. There is much information on Google to help you. When we do things God's way, we receive the healing and joy that God wants in our lives. Don't be satisfied with what this world offers. Be not afraid!



## Reflection

"Truth or Consequences" was the name of an early TV game show. It ran from the 50's to the late 80's. Contestants had to answer a trivia question correctly within 2 seconds, or face the consequences of performing a zany or embarrassing stunt. Often enough, contestants would answer incorrectly so that they would have to perform the stunt.

We know that Our Lord never came here to play games. Being truth personified, a reality lost on narrow-minded people like the Pharisees and Pontius Pilate, Jesus spoke only words of truth. He did so that we might "have life and have it more abundantly." He speaks to us today of His demands to bring that about.

Note how, in our First Reading, the Christian regard for treating others with care and hospitality is prefigured by the influential Shunammite woman in her treatment of Elisha the prophet, even before she knew that's what he was. As a consequence, she was eventually rewarded with the gift of a son, ridding her of what was regarded in those ancient days as a curse: to be without child. (What a contrast with our world today!)

Our Lord promises us that we will find new life, with good consequences, if we but give a drink of water to "the little ones," namely the poor and needy. Only a generous God can command generosity.

It is up to us to remember that fact when Jesus asks us to take up our cross as a consequence of being His authentic followers. So easy to will that part of His message away. It strikes us in moments of weakness as a demand too much. We often imagine the consequences of cross-carrying as making us too different from everybody else. Our secular society demands that we Catholics conform to its opinions. That means, for example, that we approve of a trans-gender agenda which is in direct contradiction to the Bible and Church teaching about the human body as designed by God.

When a person decides to exercise his/her freedom to break God's laws, he/she is like a person who ascends to the top of a tall building and jumps off. For the first several stories he/she feels great. There are no restraints, no restrictions, no hang-ups. But suppose, ten stories from the ground, he/she realizes that a sudden stop awaits, and that he/she doesn't want to endure its consequences. Can they reverse the falling process? Can you or they stop the fall? Of course not. Thus, in the final ten stories, our tragic character will examine his/her definition of freedom and realize—too late—that it was wrong.

God love you; give you His gift of true freedom; and enjoy your holiday.

#### Say what you see

Upon winning the Nobel Peace Prize in 1986, Elie Wiesel was named a "messenger to mankind." The Los Angeles Times called him the "most important Jew in America." A Holocaust survivor, Wiesel didn't speak of his experiences for 10 years after his liberation from the camps. Eventually he understood the world needed his witness: "We must take sides. Neutrality helps the oppressor, never the victim. Silence encourages the tormentor, never the tormented.... Wherever men and women are persecuted because of their race, religion, or political views, that place must—at that moment—become the center of the universe." Tell the truth from where you stand.

#### A twin to us all

Three times in the Gospel of John, the apostle Thomas is also called Didymus. Both names mean "twin"—in Aramaic and Greek respectively. He is referred to in some non-biblical historical texts as "Judas Thomas"—a.k.a. "Judas the Twin." It's likely "the twin" was his nickname and he was known by it among Jews and Greeks. But there's no explanation of whose twin he was. Today, Christians mostly know him as "Doubting Thomas" because he didn't believe Jesus had risen until he saw for himself. While we don't know the identity of Thomas' biological twin, do we resemble him in our disbelief from time to time? Ask Jesus for the grace of faith and the same graciousness he showed to Thomas.

#### Born on the Fourth of July

Born on the Fourth of July is the best-selling memoir of Ron Kovic, Catholic Vietnam vet turned peace activist. On the fourth of July, in 1336, Saint Elizabeth of Portugal was born into eternal life. Like Kovic, Elizabeth threw herself into peacemaking—twice intervening to avert war. Like Kovic, the queen bucked authority: When her husband forbade her from giving royal wealth away to the poor, Elizabeth smuggled contributions out of the castle in her robes. As Americans celebrate our good fortune this day, may the rights enshrined in the Declaration of Independence—"life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness"—be tempered by Elizabeth's example: "God made me queen so that I may serve others."

#### Be an island of justice

On this day in 1868, Rafael Cordero was born in San Juan, Puerto Rico, one of three children in a free black family. Throughout his life he was a passionate advocate for equitable education on the island, opening a free school for children in his home—the pupils of which would later include some of the most influential figures in Puerto Rican history. A devout Catholic, Cordero was also known

for his charity to the poor. He also fought for the abolition of slavery in Puerto Rico, which was achieved in 1873. Following his death, his schoolhouse became a historic site, and the archbishop of San Juan opened his cause for canonization. He was declared venerable by Pope Francis in 2013. May his legacy of justice live on in our own works of mercy.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 21:5, 8-20a; Matthew 8:28-34 (379). "God was with the boy as he grew up."

#### **Thursday, Jul 06, 2023**

#### Girl power

Today's saint, Maria Goretti, died a difficult death at age 12 after being stabbed for resisting a rape. She is one of several patron saints of rape survivors. Traditional hagiography about Goretti focuses on her concern for chastity during her resistance, but women who have survived similar ordeals might see saintliness in Goretti's resistance itself. They might reclaim Goretti's story as one of female empowerment, a refusal to be degraded, and a rising above violence when Goretti—on her deathbed—forgave her tormentor. Her act of mercy lives on as a triumph over evil. Saint Maria Goretti, pray for all who have been hurt by sexual violence.

MEMORIAL OF MARIA GORETTI, YOUTH MARTYR TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 22:1b-19; Matthew 9:1-8 (380). "He then said to the paralytic, 'Rise, pick up your stretcher, and go home."

#### Friday, Jul 07, 2023

#### Make a wish come true

When asked what he wished for his birthday on July 7, 2008, the Beatle's drummer Ringo Starr replied, "Peace and love." That simple wish grew into International Peace and Love Day celebrated around the world and even in outer space when a message of peace and love was sent from the International Space Station in 2020. Of course, wishing doesn't make it so. Start small. A little show of mercy and forgiveness will go a long way toward creating a world of peace and love.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 23:1-4, 19; 24:1-8, 62-67; Matthew 9:9-13 (381). "Go and learn the meaning of the words, I desire mercy, not sacrifice."

#### **Saturday, Jul 08, 2023**

#### New wine for modern minds

Do you know anybody who sews patches on an old coat or drinks wine out of a wineskin? And that's exactly the point of the Lord's teaching. It is the work of preachers, teachers, and translators to rearticulate the ancient truths of Christianity in terms that 21st-century learners can understand. Otherwise, much of the language and images of the ancient texts just keeps getting recycled. Pray for the preachers and teachers who have positively influenced you.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 27:1-5, 15-29; Mathew 9:14-17 (382). "People do not put new wine into old wineskins."
