

Dear Alumni and Friends of Elyria Catholic High School,

There is a lot of enthusiasm and excitement on the campus of Elyria Catholic High School much to the credit of so many who have embraced the *Moving EC Forward* strategic Plan 2016-2020 in the implementation and execution of the strategies in the three goal areas: *Inspired Students, Vibrant Community and Established Leader.*

Our principal, Suzanne Lester, will update the accomplishment of the first goal – *Inspired Students* in her letter. Updates to *Vibrant Community* goal include: the near completion of the Chemistry Lab due open in January 2018; new broadcasting equipment for our broadcasting class; new lunch provider in AVI Fresh with daily offerings that are made in our kitchen with fresh ingredients; state-of-the-art ViewSonic 75-inch interactive boards in 14 classrooms; new doors to the auditorium; complete landscape redesign of the plaza area in front of the auditorium. In addition all the floor boards and landing areas were replaced on our Knights of Columbus Field

home stand. With the help of the Knights of Columbus, Elyria Council, No. 774 members, the home stand is slated to be painted in spring 2018. Our refreshed branding and marketing program included new banners in the Coliseum and in the hallways and coming soon light-post banners on Poplar and Gulf.

Updates to *Established Leader* goal: Our focus is to connect and partner with alum and business leaders. Starting in January 2018 we are partnering with Ridge Tool and CEO/President Fred Pond to renovate a portion of the old woodworking lab for a Creator Space, as well as working with architect Gary Fischer on a master plan for classroom usage/updating and also for our campus facilities.

We are grateful for the generous community of alumni, parents and local business leaders who have helped us to make these improvements a reality. Many of you specified your donations to a wish list item and that has allowed us to continue this progress. Your investment in EC continues to enhance the Catholic education experience that is being offered to our young men and women.

PRINCIPAL'S LETTER

A message from the Principal Suzahhe Lester



In our ongoing commitment to ensure that we are providing the very best in academics for our students, Elyria Catholic has made a number of changes for the 2017-18 school year.

Recent graduates often share that they feel well-prepared for their college course work. This year, we have provided more opportunity for college credit through added course offerings. EC students can earn college credit through nine Advanced

Placement courses and thirteen College Credit Plus courses through Lorain County Community College.

Additionally, we have added a period to the day to accommodate extra elective courses that students and parents requested. Students have been using these new elective opportunities to "try out" areas they may be considering for future careers through courses such as Introduction to Engineering, Broadcasting, Public Speaking, Business and Entrepreneurship, and Music Production. Other students have been using this additional time to double up on math or science

courses. The science department laboratory-based courses now have seven periods a week to allow for extra lab time.

Also new this year, we initiated MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) assessments to measure growth and achievement. These are the same assessments that have been initiated in diocesan Catholic elementary schools. We have had great success first quarter with a supplemental math period added for freshmen who struggle with math. We have also implemented a peer tutoring program for students who are underperforming.

For the 2017-18 school year, Elyria Catholic became a provider for the State of Ohio's Jon Peterson and Autism Scholarships for students with special needs. With the addition of students on these scholarships, we have been able to provide more push-in support for students who may struggle in the classroom.

With these changes and others that faculty members deem beneficial for our students, Elyria Catholic commits to maintain its longstanding tradition of excellence in academics in Northeast Ohio.



EC Takes on Cincinnati- Spring Break 2017

Spring break is a time of relaxation for an entire week, without worrying about the challenges that school can bring. For several members of the Elyria Catholic community, it was much more than a "vacation." Joined by Miss Sara Lanzola and Mr. John Royski, eight Elyria Catholic students traveled to Cincinnati, Ohio on a mission trip to dedicate their time and talents to service work. Participating in a program run by the Franciscans for the Poor, these students learned about the hardships of homelessness and poverty first hand, and were able to explore the city in just a matter of six days. The students volunteered at numerous places, including Matthew 25 Ministries, Stepping Stones, Housing Opportunities of Northern Kentucky (HONK), and New Life Furniture. The students divided into small groups and traveled to these different facilities.

To start with, Matthew 25 is a facility in which volunteers work to provide aid to third world countries who have experienced great natural disasters—earthquakes, tornadoes, and even tsunamis. Here, the students sorted through hygiene products and paint as preparation to send them overseas. "Matthew 25 is a unique facility for the Cincinnati area and has a plethora of opportunities for volunteers," explains Morgan Chilton '17. Many items were collected throughout the day as an aid to these countries.

Next, the students traveled to Stepping Stones, a facility for those who have disabilities. The students were able to spend quality time and travel with them throughout their day. Some of the activities included robotic legos, arts and crafts, and health and fitness. EC students were also able to eat lunch and bond with them. Here, they learned the true values of friendship.

Then, the students were able to travel over the border into Northern Kentucky to volunteer at HONK. HONK is a volunteer organization that prepares and restores older, run-down homes for newer homeowners who are experiencing poverty. They performed yard

work, cut down trees, painted decks, trimmed bushes, and were able to try delicious pizza spaghetti in the process. The people who run HONK were so kind, and they were greatly impressed with the work that the students had done.

Finally, the students traveled to New Life Furniture, a place where slightly used furniture is donated and sent to those who are overcoming the struggles of poverty in their new homes. Here, some of the students helped move furniture from one warehouse to another, while the other students had the opportunity to travel to different homes and provide furniture to the new homeowners. The day was exhausting, but lives were changed just from a small piece of furniture.

While much service was performed, the week also had some more exciting events in store. The students were able to explore much of the city, visiting the Cincinnati Art Museum, Xavier University, and Cathedral Basilica of the Assumption in Northern Kentucky. They were also able to attend a Cincinnati Reds game.

The students had a unique experience with the Sisters of the Franciscans for the Poor. They were able to eat supper with them, ask them questions, and listen to their life stories. The nuns sent the students a note with a personal letter for each of them before their departure.

This Alternative Spring Break was a soothing experience, exposing these students to the true nature of poverty and homelessness. While some of these tasks and projects were extremely draining, it was also life changing. Homelessness and poverty are severe complications found everywhere. These students were able to serve these different communities with their God-given talents. Many hearts were touched and many lessons have been learned just from this short six-day trip.

Andrew Abrahamowicz 17 Named Co-Mr. Baseball in Lorain County



Elyria Catholic's Andrew Abrahamowicz '17 was named Co-Mr. Baseball in Lorain County on Saturday, May 27th. He split the award with Amherst Steele's Xavier Moore.

The award is presented annually to a graduating senior in Lorain County who demonstrates outstanding baseball ability and is capable of participating in baseball at the collegiate level.

The Panthers ace was 7-1 in his eight starts this past spring. He also made two appearances out of the bullpen and was credited with a save.

In 53 and two-thirds innings of work, Abrahamowicz punched out 83 batters and walked just 21. He finished with a 0.522 ERA (four earned runs) and a 0.969 WHIP.

Offensively, he drove in 16 runs and swiped 12 bases.

This was the latest in a long line of awards for the hard-throwing right hander. He was named first team All-Ohio and the Great Lakes Conference Pitcher of the Year after helping Elyria Catholic capture its second consecutive GLC crown.

Abrahamowicz was also named the Lorain County Player of the Year in Divisions III-IV.

Andrew is attending the University of Nebraska - home of the 2017 BIG Ten Champion Huskers.

Leighton Banjoff'19 Commits to Nebraska

Junior Leighton Banjoff announced on September 26th that he will further his academic and baseball career at the University of Nebraska. Following in the steps of former Panther pitcher turned Husker, Andrew Abrahamowicz '17,



Banjoff hit .461 last season with ten doubles, one home run, and nineteen stolen bases. Earning All Ohio Honors in Division III for the 2017 baseball season, the Sheffield Village native also stars in the backfield for the Panther football team.


Earns All-County Honors

the power of God working through you, within you and sometimes despite you." We are grateful for Bishop Perez' presence and words of wisdom. He is an inspiration for all of us.



"Are we going to have a scavenger hunt?

Mrs. Biddy St. Marie '59 laughed when she posed the question at a gathering of some Elyria Catholic legacy families — that is, those with multiple members who have attended the school. Truth be told, Mrs. St. Marie confessed, she had to ask someone how to get to the second-floor library where the meeting was held and wasn't sure she could find her away around the school that has been at the heart of her family since the 1950s.

The EC building has evolved a great deal since the completion of its initial structure in 1949. But while the school's physical characteristics have changed over the decades in which numerous St. Marie family members have matriculated here, its essential spirit hasn't wavered a bit. Regardless of bloodlines, Elyria Catholic is all about family.

"I think when we talk about family, we're all so close," said Morgan Mabry Taylor '01. "My cousins and I were all so close and the school family is like a bigger, extended family. I still consider the friends I made here to be family and that has never changed."

Like Mr. and Mrs. St. Marie, Morgan made her EC family ties official when she married Eric Gaines '02, in 2011. Friends in high school, the couple reconnected at what has become known as an "EC merger" — a marriage of graduates. Morgan and Eric now have two children.

"When we drive past Elyria Catholic our four-year-old will say: That's where Mommy went, that's where Daddy went, that's were Grandma went, that's where cousin Corey went," Morgan said. "She knows the whole list and she's proud that we all went here."

FAITH, FAMILY, FRIENDSHIP

The Taylors and St. Maries are prominent among Elyria Catholic's legacy families. Each family can claim alumni relatives into the double digits. But when we brought these families together to talk about their ties that bind, we discovered that DNA — while certainly adding intrigue — is just one

facet of the familial atmosphere that made their time at EC the life-changing experience it was.

For Bailey Griffin '12 the opportunities to connect with fellow students on a deeper, spiritual level were especially profound.

One such opportunity was Alternative Spring Break, when students choose to use their time off for service to others.

"I went on that for both my junior and senior years to clean up after tornadoes in a couple of close-by states," she said. "Just being able to do that, and ride on a bus for eight hours with your classmates and go through this whole experience together was really cool. Going in, you would know just the name and face of some of the people, but coming out you would have a bunch of stories you could share with each other. It brought us closer together and I really liked that. There always are opportunities to bring everyone closer together."

That said, the extended EC family is well aware that anyone with the Griffin surname was likely to be close with many students on Day One. There have been 23 Griffin family members who have attended EC, including current students David '19 and his brother Jack '20, their cousins Stephanie and her twin sister Kaylie '20 and their younger sister Sarah '21.

"I was happy they came here," said their dad, David. "It was comfortable and familiar, so that's a plus."

The feeling of comfort and familiarity extends to expressions of faith.

Eric Gaines, who had attended a public school for his freshman year, said the faithfilled atmosphere of Elyria Catholic proved to be one of the best parts of his transfer

here — that and finding his future wife here, of course.

"I'm probably as far along in my faith as I've ever been," he said. "And this school had a huge part in that. I was a peer minister in my senior year and it opened up so many things in my mind. The fact that you can talk about Jesus at school. That was incredible. He is such a huge part of our lives, obviously, and there's no reason to keep Him quiet, you know what I mean? That unlocked the opportunity to do that on a daily basis without being fearful of offending someone. That was huge for me."

We asked Eric, who is not Catholic, whether the spirituality of the school factors into the desire that he and his wife share to send their own children to EC when they reach high school age.

"A hundred percent," he said.

Although the Notre Dame Sisters who once comprised most of the faculty are no longer here, legacy family members agreed that the Catholicity of the school remains its essence.

"I'm really impressed with all the religious ceremonies they have here," said Mrs. St. Marie. "They always have Masses for the holy days and religious holidays. I think it's wonderful. A lot of the alumni come to those, and that's important."

She noted that the school chapel is relatively new, having been built in 2003. The size of the school's enrollment still necessitates that all-school Masses must be held in the gym just as they were when she attended. And if outside guests swell the crowd, as was the case with the All-County Catholic Schools Liturgy hosted at EC in January, the Mass celebration can now be held in the Coliseum completed in 1966.

The Coliseum is among countless additions that have enhanced the environment for today's students — changes enthusiastically applauded by its early graduates. "The chapel is beautiful," said Mrs. St. Marie. "The library is beautiful. Everything is beautiful."

THE BEAT GOES ON

Most beautiful of all, however, is the sense of belonging — the unmistakable feeling of being part of something larger than yourself

 that for generations has characterized life at Elyria Catholic.

Colleen Griffin Vincent '98 knows that feeling especially well. She was born in 1979, the year her brother Ed '90 began his senior year. With Ed being the oldest, Colleen was the youngest of the family and, as such, was imbued with the EC spirit long before she came here.

How did she feel about carrying on the family legacy?

"I looked forward to it," she said. "I was proud. I thought it was pretty cool to walk down the hallway and look at all the composite pictures and be able to point out my family members. People would say, 'Oh, are you a Griffin? You look just like your brother.'

"I don't know if that's good or bad," she laughs. "And there is such a huge age gap — my closest sibling is five-and-a-half years older than I am — so I didn't feel like there was any pressure. I can't say anyone set the bar too high for me!"

By the time Colleen arrived at EC, her brother Ed — a multi-sport EC athlete as a student — was coaching baseball here, giving him a second Panther life. Of the eight Griffin siblings in his generation, two married other EC students and thus added to the growing list of "EC mergers."

"My parents were an EC merger," said Vickie Griffin '84. "My husband and I were too." Now all eyes are on the next generation.

And the beat goes on.

"The family tradition for me started with my parents saying we're going to a Catholic high school," said Tom Taylor '79. "There were three of us who attended and then each sent our children. My mom had eight grandchildren graduate from EC."

"My parents and their faith sent us here," he said.

There it is again. That word: faith. It seems to be a constant traversing all the stories and all the generations of Elyria Catholic, extending even to those who may not be Catholic.

"My dad did not really practice religion at all," said Sue Mabry, "but he sent us all

to St. Jude's and Elyria Catholic. He was proud of that and really felt he made the best decision all the way through."

Anyone who gets touched by the Elyria Catholic spirit, it seems, becomes an adopted member of the family. "I love this school and I didn't even go here," said Debbie Griffin. "I'm the only one in my family who didn't go here. I went to St. Augustine, which is no longer around, so I'm the odd man out. But I tell everyone about the bond my husband and my children all have because they share this place.

"It's not about all the names on the wall," she added. "It's about what they take away from here. It's a family atmosphere. It's different. I hear my children talk about it. They still talk about their experience here. It continues."

The connection is visceral, emotional and deep. "To this day, you hear the fight song and you know every word," said Eric. "You know the alma mater. The two biggest things for me are family and tradition."

Corey Taylor '06 can identify. "I know the words," he said. "I hear the music and I can sing the words. It's loyalty that never dies."

Charles, also known as Speedy, Delgado, an Elyria Catholic graduate from the class of 1968, has done more than many in his years since leaving Elyria Catholic.

He attended Elyria Catholic all four of his years in high school. He remembers knowing everyone at least on a first name basis, despite being in the largest graduating class at the time. Mr. Delgado participated in activities in the community including track, basketball, and working as the football team's manager.

He says his teachers made great contributions to his experience and that most would offer him help and guidance, resources he believes to be incredibly important for teenagers in such a formative stage in their lives. He says he struggled in school, but his teachers, and four years of art classes allowed him to make the grades he needed to succeed.

After graduating high school, Mr. Delgado joined the workforce as a factory worker. He remained at the factory for 43 years working, for much of the time, in the security department. He met his wife while working in the factory and they have been together for 46 years and the two now have three children and seven grandchildren. He attributes his success in marriage to hard work and his Christian faith.

Mr. Delgado, who is also an artist, has participated in many artistic ventures outside of his career. He has participated for 30 years in an envelope exchange program and has traded envelopes with members all over the world. He says he began this hobby with an interest in postal stamps and it evolved from there. His envelopes have been displayed at the Smithsonian National Postal Museum in Washington, D.C. and in the Pearl Harbor Museum in Hawaii.

Through his passions and work, Mr. Delgado says that Elyria Catholic is something that always sticks to the back of his mind and he has made contributions to the school including his artwork and a filing cabinet for the art department. He has helped plan a few of his class reunions and is currently on the committee planning for his 50th reunion next year, which he looks forward to saying, "It should be very fun. People come to milestone events, and this will be a milestone event."

Paul Zemanek '73

For Paul Zemanek, the old proverb that "God writes straight with crooked lines" could not be more true. A successful director of sales for many years at Honeywell, he never envisioned himself as a deacon, but when his position at Honeywell was eliminated, that was exactly what happened when he had more time available.

Zemanek, the oldest of seven, grew up in a tight-knit Catholic family. His parents owned a greenhouse and his dad worked two jobs to send all seven children through Saint Peters in North Ridgeville and Elyria Catholic High School.

Part of the 1973 state championship basketball team at EC, Zemanek went on to play basketball at Dayton University and study Business Management.

He began his career in human resources in the banking industry, but moved into sales at Reliance Electric, intent on supporting his wife Cathy and sons Christopher and Kevin. He soon moved to Honeywell International, but in 2007 his life changed course.

"In my fifteen month of unemployment I had time to slow down, and gained a better appreciation for what was important," said Zemanek.

Although not a retreat person, while on a men's retreat he felt called to consider his faith more closely. Already a lector and eucharistic minister at St. Bridgid of Kildare Parish in Columbus, he decided to make the commitment to become a permanent deacon.

He attended the Pontifical College Josephina in Columbus for his formation, and took 18 classes over four years, dedicating every other Saturday to three hours of graduate work.

"We definitely studied the gospels," said Zemanek. "Deacons are expected to preach and we learned how to read and understand the gospels."

Zemanek was ordained on November 26, 2016 and has been busy as a deacon ever since. He has officiated at weddings, funerals and baptisms, as well as preaching once a month."

He readily admits that his wife is his biggest advocate. "She reviews my homilies and critiques them, and gives me perspective on whether they will resonate."

Besides the preaching and the sacraments, he helps behind the scenes too, preparing couples for their wedding, taking communion to the sick and homebound, and visiting people in hospice.



And he does it all in addition to his normal work week. "Being a deacon has taught me to be more disciplined, to know when to pick spots and get things done."

When he is not busy working, Zemanek enjoys golfing, but his new weekend commitments have lessened his time on the links. He also enjoys getting back to his greenhouse roots and doing yard work.

Zemanek is very glad that God has taken him down the path to the diaconate. "It is my honor and privilege. This has been a great vocation."
