DAILY MEDITATION: MATTHEW 22:1-14

Many are invited, but few are chosen. (Matthew 22:14)

This is a sobering parable. None of us want to end up like those villagers who became victims of the violence they had visited upon the king's servants (Matthew 22:7).

And we certainly don't want to be like that poorly dressed wedding guest (22:13)! So how should we respond?

Jesus told this parable to those chief priests and Pharisees in Jerusalem who had been seeking to destroy him (Matthew 21:45). Despite the malice he encountered from them, Jesus loved them deeply. So he told them a jarring story to warn them about the stark consequences they risked if they continued down the path of unbelief and hatred they had started on. He wanted them instead to find their way into his kingdom, just as so many "tax collectors and sinners" had done (9:11). Jesus wants everyone to enter his kingdom. His invitation is open to his enemies as well as his disciples, "bad and good alike" (Matthew 22:10). He welcomes all who come to him in humility, faith, and repentance—including you. And when you come, he showers you with mercy. He offers you his Bread of Life. He heals your wounds and gives you peace. Whether you are more like the chief priests or the tax collectors, he removes all of your sins and gives you a seat of honor at his banquet table. Choosing the kingdom is not just once and done. It's an ongoing vocation. Today and every day, you will encounter many invitations from the Lord. They will come through the people you interact with: will you love them as Christ does? They will come as you scan the headlines: will you intercede for all the suffering in the world? They will come as you spot opportunities to share your faith: will you witness to the Lord, whether through your words or actions?

You are among the "many" who are invited (Matthew 22:14). Choose Jesus!

Isaac Jogues and his companions were the first martyrs of the North American

continent officially recognized by the Church. The first of the Jesuit missionaries to be martyred was René Goupil who with Lalande, had offered his services as an oblate. He was tortured along with Isaac Jogues in 1642, and was tomahawked for having made the sign of the cross on the brow of some children. Father Anthony Daniel, working among Hurons who were gradually becoming Christian, was killed by Iroquois on July 4, 1648. His body was thrown into his chapel, which was set on fire. Jean de Brébeuf was a French Jesuit who came to Canada at the age of 32 and labored



there for 24 years. Having been captured by the Iroquois at Sainte Marie, Canada, Father Brébeuf died after four hours of extreme torture.



Why We Sing Salve Regina After Communion

In the rich history of Catholic music, Salve Regina stands as one of the greatest of all hymns. This beautiful piece, also known as Hail Holy Queen, has a history that spans centuries and is deeply woven into the fabric of Catholic tradition. In recent times, many parishes have introduced the singing of Salve Regina after the distribution of Communion, including our own. In this article, we will explore the history of Salve Regina, its place in the Catholic liturgy, and why our parish has chosen to incorporate it into the Communion rite.

The Origins of Salve Regina

Salve Regina, which translates to "Hail, Holy Queen" in English, is a Marian hymn of praise and supplication. Its origins can be traced back to the Middle Ages, with various legends surrounding its composition. One tradition attributes the hymn to St. Bernard of Clairvaux. However, the more widely accepted version attributes it to Hermann of Reichenau, a monk and scholar who lived in the 11th century. The hymn goes on to invoke Mary as "our life, our sweetness, and our hope" and pleads for her intercession, asking her to "turn, then, most gracious advocate, your eyes of mercy toward us."

The Role of Salve Regina in Catholic Liturgy

Salve Regina holds a special place in the Catholic liturgy. It is often used in the Liturgy of the Hours, particularly in evening prayer, or Vespers. Additionally, it is a common hymn for Marian devotions and processions, and it is sometimes sung at the end of a funeral Mass, invoking Mary's intercession for the deceased's soul.

Salve Regina After Communion

In our parish, the decision to sing Salve Regina after the distribution of Communion was driven by a desire to deepen the sense of devotion and reverence during the Mass. The moments following the reception of the Eucharist are particularly sacred, as we have just received the body and blood of Christ. Singing Salve Regina at this point allows us to turn our hearts and minds to Mary, the Mother of Jesus, in a spirit of gratitude and humility.

The inclusion of Salve Regina also encourages a sense of unity and community within the parish. It provides a common prayer and reflection point for the congregation, fostering a sense of shared devotion. The hymn serves as a bridge between the intimate encounter with Christ in the Eucharist and the communal aspect of the Mass. Moreover, Salve Regina, with its flowing melody, helps to create a peaceful and reflective atmosphere. It allows the congregation to engage in personal prayer and contemplation while honoring the Blessed Virgin Mary, who exemplifies the virtues of faith, humility, and obedience. Salve Regina, a hymn that has graced Catholic liturgy for centuries, continues to inspire devotion, reflection, and unity in the Church. By singing this beautiful hymn after the distribution of Communion, our parish has sought to enhance the sacred reality of this moment, bringing our collective attention to Mary, the Mother of Jesus.

All Souls Novena

We will begin the traditional All Souls' Novena on November 2 and will pray on nine consecutive days for our beloved dead.

If you want to honor your loved ones, please enter their names on the envelopes found in the back of the church. The suggested donation for enrollment in the Novena is: \$5 per person or \$35 for 7 or more (unlimited).

Out of the Depths Prayer (De Profundis)

Out of the depths I cry to You, O Lord; Lord, hear my voice! Let Your ears be attentive to my voice in supplication:

If you, O Lord, mark iniquities,
Lord, who can stand?
But with You is forgiveness,
that You may be revered.

I trust in the Lord; my soul trusts in His word.
My soul waits for the Lord,
more than sentinels wait for the dawn.
More than sentinels wait for the dawn,
let Israel wait for the Lord;
For with the Lord is kindness
and with Him is plenteous redemption;
And He will redeem Israel
from all their iniquities.

Why shall we pray for the dead?

November is, and has traditionally been, the month where the Church calls upon us to remember those who have died and to do so through our prayers.

We begin the month of November with two holy days that help us to focus our attention on our beloved dead: the Solemnity of All Saints and the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed (All Souls). The first recognizes and asks for the



prayers of all who now wear, in the words that St. Paul wrote to St. Timothy, "the crown of righteousness." The second centers our prayer on those who have completed their earthly journey, yet are presently undergoing "the final purification of the elect."

The Catechism reminds us that: "From the beginning the Church has honored the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God. This reminder is especially important in an age where funeral Masses can easily fall prey to our desire to assure the grieving family and friends that their loved one is "no longer suffering" and "in a better place." Our kindness toward those left behind can unwittingly mask an unintended lack of charity for the deceased who is most probably still in need of our prayers.

As the renowned Father of the Church St. John Chrysostom tells us, "Let us not hesitate to help those who have died and to offer our prayers for them."
