Scripture Corner

JESUS AND THOMAS

On the evening of Easter Sunday Jesus appeared in the midst of his disciples. He says to them, "Peace be with you." He showed them his hands and his side. Our Lord then breathed on them and said. "Receive the Holy Spirit Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." (John 20:23)

Thomas was not present and insisted, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nail-marks, I will not believe." (John 20:25) The following Sunday Thomas was present; the doors again were locked. Our Lord appears and encourages Thomas to check his side and hands and "do not be unbelieving, but believe. (John 20:27) Relatively few Christians will see the resurrected Christ, but all must believe in him to be saved,

The response of Thomas is truly amazing! 'MY Lord and my God." (John 20:28) It is the clearest expression of our Lord's divinity in the New Testament. These same two titles are applied to God in Psalm 35:23: "Awake, be vigilant in my defense, in my cause, my God and my Lord."

Twice Christ uses the greeting, "Peace be with you.' (John 20:21 and 26) "Peace is an important word in the early Church. It means the sum total of the messianic blessings, especially Jesus himself, our Messiah. Jesus also says, "Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." (John 20:29)

Jesus has this important greeting, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." (John20:22-23) The spiritual life of Christ's disciples will be his gift to them. They will be able to forgive sins in the sacrament of penance.

The Church celebrates the Sunday of Divine Mercy on this second Sunday of Easter. The loving treatment of Thomas by Christ is a great example of God's mercy.

The school should provide a moral climate where excellent education in a faith-based situation benefits each student. The lessons learned about faith and love in these institutions help graduates build a better world.

Similarly, those who agree to assist the Church in her mission and ministries represent the public face of the Church. Whether Catholic or non-Catholic, they should respect our Catholic identity and avoid behavior that contradicts the very mission of the Catholic institution.

In recent legislation in various parts of our nation, efforts are being made to force the Church to accept our teaching faculties, staff, and charitable services personnel those who live in a way that publicly repudiates the teaching of the Church. The Church does not require others to believe or live by her teaching. But we do ask for and insist on the freedom to present and demonstrate publically our faith in our Catholic schools and institutions.

Pope Francis writes eloquently of the act of assent that is required of those who want to belong to the Catholic Church or who wish seek to share in her mission and work. His words were addressed specifically to teachers but are applicable to all the areas of Church ministry. "We need to remember that all religious teaching ultimately has to be reflected in the teacher's way of life, which awakens the assent of the heart by its nearness, love and witness" (*Evangelii gaudium*, 45).

THE MUSINGS OF THE PASTOR

Several weeks ago now I began what will be a series of columns on *Being Catholic Today: Catholic Identity in an Age of Challenge*, a Pastoral Letter that Cardinal Wuerl issued on May 24, 2015. The Cardinal identified five key themes of being a Catholic today. I want to devote this column to the third theme: Participation in the Mission.

Within a Christianity that spans the globe and time, we know that there are many different expressions of a Christian way of life even among those who are not in full communion with the Church. People of good will, though not baptized, can still uphold a Catholic vision, and non-Catholics may participate in the mission of the Church. Still, being identified as authentically Christian or representing the public face of the Church requires essential elements to ensure that those we meet have an encounter with Jesus. Catholic identity is integral to how we live.

Christian belief is grounded in an authentic humanism of truth in love, which sees every human being as possessing inherent dignity and valuable worth. It is neither discriminatory nor an undue imposition on the freedom of others to promote Christian faith and live by it. There is a difference between one's identity, which we are called to respect, and one's actions, which we can very well find offensive, even immoral. There are some things that the Church simply will not do, and it is not discriminatory to say, "We do not do that." We cannot be expected to embrace error and give up our identity which inspired us to form ministries of teaching, healing, and charity in the first place. For those in the Church, as well as those who agree to assist in her ministries, everyone is held to the same standard. We are all at the service of the mission of the Church, and no one can claim a right simultaneously to work for the Church and work against her belief. Those who assist in the ministry of Catholic parishes and institutions also share in the obligation to help them achieve their goals and purpose.

For members of the Church it would be important that the truth and love of the Lord should shine in us and through us. Our faith must be an active and living faith. If one becomes a member of the Church, he or she is expected to believe what the Church believes and attempt to live it out as best he or she can, including participating in the Mass and other sacraments, providing a good example and witness to others, and helping others to know Christ.

When we come to the institutions of the Church—its parishes, schools, universities, charitable organizations—these too must reflect a Catholic identity with visible communion to the Church both universal and local, and fidelity to Catholic teaching. As Pope Francis has implored, each of these institutions and those involved in their operations must be oriented toward the Church (*Evangelii gaudium*, 27). The purpose of these entities—and the task of those who work for them—is to lead people to Jesus Christ.

In whatever area endeavor, the Catholic identity of the effort should be found, for example, in a mission statement. And the message it voices should exhibit a vision of life that is rooted in Christ, articulated in the Gospel and manifested in his church. Catholic institutions should be distinguishable from secular ones. When he visits Catholic schools of the Archdiocese of Washington, Cardinal Wuerl often reminds the students that they should expect their school, since it is Catholic, to be different.

CELEBRATING THE LORD'S RESURRECTION & PLANNING FOR YOUR OWN - Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid. (John 14:27).

These familiar words of Christ resonate with us at Easter. We understand that by the glorious Resurrection of Our Lord death and sin are conquered and our destiny of eternal life is possible. This year Easter Sunday fittingly coincided with National Health-care Decisions Day and begs this question, "Are we prepared to "go in peace"? Can we say to our loved ones," Let not your hearts be troubled?" Perhaps the answers lie in first asking these questions,

- When is the right time to think about the healthcare decisions (advance directives) you would make for yourself in times of serious illness or at the end of life?
- When is the right time to appoint someone (healthcare agent) to carry out your choices if you could not speak for yourself?

A: when you are in good health or B: when you are in a coma.

The answer is of course A. The problem? We are reluctant to even think or talk about the reality of our own mortality or the loss of loved ones, much less make decisions about it. For your peace of mind and spirit...and for your family's, the Catholic Bishops of Maryland address these concerns in their pastoral letter, Comfort and Consolation, Care of the Sick and Dying.

Relying on the underlying moral principles and wisdom of Church teaching, this letter outlines a process of discernment to guide our medical decision-making in times of illness and at the end of life. By providing a clear and concise understanding of church teaching it encourages families to have conversations and make choices in advance of critical illness or family crisis. The supplement publication, Healthcare Directives, A Catholic Perspective, includes both the Catholic Declaration for Health Care Decision Making and the Appointment of My Health Care Agent documents. Both documents have been designed to meet Maryland law and to give you an opportunity to express your wishes in a form that reflects Church teaching. Both publications, Comfort and Consolation, Care of the Sick and Dying and Healthcare Directives, A Catholic Perspective can be obtained from the SFA rectory office and are available at www.mdcathcon.org. Additionally, the SFA pastoral staff and Betty Baklarz, RN and faith community nurse are available for consultation

Whether death comes unexpectedly or at the end of a long and full life, it is important for us to consider not only the spiritual dimension of death, but to think in a very practical way about how we would want the circumstances of our death to reflect our deepest beliefs. We know that Jesus is coming for each of us at the hour of His choosing. Especially, during this Easter Season we are reminded that we wait and prepare for His arrival, not in fear, but full of expectant hope.
