

Some Words from the Pastor

In speaking about the Holy Eucharist in a book entitled, *Sacred Liturgy: The Source and Summit of the Life and Mission of the Church*, Cardinal Walter Brandmuller says that, "Ever since Christ the Lord, on the evening before His passion, offered Himself, hidden under the appearances of bread and wine, to God the Father as a sacrifice to redeem the world and administered His Body and Blood to the Apostles, His words have reechoed through the millennia: 'Do this in memory of me.' Whenever we gather around the altar of the Lord, we reverently obey His command. It is good, he says further, to remind ourselves of this again and again, for experience unfortunately proves the saying, *Quotidiana vilescent*, "Routine things lose their splendor." (*Sacred Liturgy*, 2014, Ignatian Press). We might as well ask ourselves if we have lost the splendor of the Eucharist which we celebrate every Sunday and everyday during the week. Has it become a routine for us, at times losing its sense and its meaning? Hence, let us ask ourselves once again what happens when we approach the altar during the celebration of the Holy Eucharist. The apostle Paul can remind us through his letter to the community at Corinth (1Cor.11:23-29). And there is a term that expresses this, which is *traditio* or tradition. St. Paul says in his letter, "Brethren, I received from the Lord what I also delivered to you." He is emphasizing that the Eucharistic celebration is not his creation, not a ritual invented by human beings. What he experienced as the celebration of the Lord's Supper, after his conversion, had its origin in the upper room in Jerusalem, where Jesus had spoken these words: "Do this in memory of me." He is

the Lord who gave this command and determined the essential form of the celebration. Paul himself received what he then handed on to the Christians in Corinth and elsewhere. And it is the same Eucharist that we are celebrating in our church here at St. Genevieve. As we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, let us always remember the words of our Lord. We should always remember what he has done for us out of his great love for us. He offered his body and blood, being sacrificed on the cross so that we may gain eternal life. Let us not allow the celebration of the mass to become a routine for us, but a lively celebration of the saving, healing and loving presence of our Lord Jesus Christ. He wants us to live forever. He who eats of my flesh and drinks my blood will have life eternal. Thus, the Eucharist should be the source of our nourishment, sustaining the divine life that was given us in baptism, and that will lead us to a life of eternity with the Father. And so every time we receive Lord through Holy Communion, let us be grateful to Him who feeds us with His Body and Blood. As we say Amen when the priest says, "the Body of Christ", let it be an acclamation and affirmation of our faith in the Real and Substantial Presence of the Lord. Our memory will and should never fail as we celebrate the memorial of the Lord. After all He said, "Do this in memory of me." Have a Blessed Sunday!

*STEWARDSHIP OF TREASURE

The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Today's Readings: Ex 24:3–8; Ps 116:12–13, 15–18; Heb 9:11–15; Mk 14:12–16, 22–26

Today's solemnity celebrates Jesus' self-gift to us in the Eucharist, the Living Bread that nourishes us, the perpetual Sacrifice that redeems us, the Real Presence that comforts us on our pilgrimage and challenges us to self-sacrificing love. As in our own Liturgy of the Word, Moses in Exodus solemnly proclaims God's word to the assembled people, who solemnly affirm their acceptance of that word and pledge obedient fulfillment. Then, in a ritual reminiscent of our own liturgy, Moses seals the people's spoken assent by sprinkling the assembly with sacrificial blood. The Letter to the Hebrews portrays Christ as our High Priest, entering the Holy of Holies with his own Blood to seal the New Covenant that frees its participants from death. This Sacrifice Jesus instituted sacramentally at the Last Supper and offered on the altar of the cross, the Sacrifice and Supper of which we partake at every Eucharist.

Jesus' Sacrifice and Ours

In presenting the still-familiar four-fold "Shape of the Eucharist"—Jesus takes / blesses / breaks / gives (Mark 14:22)—Mark omits Matthew's specification of purpose "for the forgiveness of sins," and Luke's "for the remembrance of me." But Jesus does recall the covenant, Israel's liberation from Egypt's slavery. And could the disciples—or we—fail to recall that, in Mark's earliest verses, Jesus sits at table "with tax collectors and those known as sinners" (2:15)? Mark also emphasizes the Eucharist as our participation in Jesus' passion

and pledge of our share in his future glory. Jesus had earlier referred to his disciples' suffering as "drinking from the cup he would drink" (10:38–39). Soon he would beg his Abba to "take this cup away" (14:36). But while sharing the Eucharistic cup, Jesus promises a day when he would "drink it new" (14:25): the cup of suffering and sorrow is not the last cup he—or we—will drink, the cup of the Garden of Agony will be transformed into the cup of the Kingdom of God.

Worshipping and Serving

Through both scripture and tradition, Jesus' Eucharistic self-giving challenges us who partake so frequently of the Eucharist (or hope to do so again once the pandemic is past) to become a community of self-sacrificing love that both worships Christ's presence in the Blessed Sacrament and serves Christ's presence in others. In his Apostolic Exhortation, *The Joy of the Gospel* (*Evangelii Gaudium*), Pope Francis praises the presence, in so many communities, of groups devoted to prayer and intercession, prayerful reading of God's Word, and perpetual adoration of the Eucharist. But then Francis repeats Saint John Paul II's warning that such personal devotion must never become a privatized, individualistic spirituality that forgets the demands of charity or the implications of Jesus' incarnation (EG, 262). As we receive Jesus' body sacramentally in the Eucharist, so we should touch Jesus' flesh compassionately in the suffering flesh of others (EG 270).

Santísimo Cuerpo y Sangre de Cristo

Lecturas de hoy: Ex 24:3–8; Sal 116 (115):12–13, 15–18; Heb 9:11–15; Mc 14:12–16, 22–26

La solemnidad de hoy celebra la entrega de sí mismo de Jesús en la Eucaristía, el pan vivo que nos alimenta, el sacrificio perpetuo que nos redime, la presencia verdadera que nos conforta en nuestro peregrinaje, y nos desafía al amor abnegado. Como en nuestra propia liturgia de la Palabra, Moisés proclama solemnemente en el Éxodo la Palabra de Dios al pueblo reunido, que afirma solemnemente su aceptación de esa Palabra y promete cumplirla obedientemente. Luego, en un ritual que recuerda a nuestra propia liturgia, Moisés sella el consentimiento verbal del pueblo rociando a la asamblea con la sangre del sacrificio. La carta a los hebreos presenta a Cristo como nuestro Sumo Sacerdote, entrando al lugar Santo de los Santos con su propia sangre para sellar la Nueva Alianza que libera a sus participantes de la muerte. Este sacrificio lo instituyó Jesús sacramentalmente en la Última Cena y lo ofreció en el altar de la cruz, el Sacrificio y Cena de los que participamos en cada Eucaristía.

El sacrificio de Jesús y el nuestro

Jesús al presentar la todavía familiar formula de cuatro de la “forma de la Eucaristía”, —Jesús toma / parte / bendice / da (Marcos 14:22) —; Marcos omite las precisiones del propósito que mencionan tanto Mateo “para el perdón de los pecados” como Lucas “hagan esto en memoria mía”. Pero Jesús sí recuerda la alianza, la liberación de Israel de la esclavitud de Egipto. ¿Y podrían los discípulos o nosotros no recordar que, en los primeros versos de Marcos, Jesús se sienta a la mesa “con recaudadores de impuestos y pecadores reconocidos” (2:15)? Marcos también señala la Eucaristía como nuestra participación en

la pasión de Jesús y promesa de nuestra porción en su gloria futura. Previamente Jesús había referido el sufrimiento de sus discípulos como “beberán el cáliz que yo voy a beber” (10:38-39). Pronto suplicaría a su Abba “aparta de mí este cáliz” (14:36). Pero al compartir el cáliz eucarístico, Jesús promete un día “en que beba un vino nuevo” (14:25): el cáliz del sufrimiento y el dolor no es el último cáliz que él o nosotros beberemos, el cáliz del Huerto de la Agonía será transformado en el cáliz del Reino de Dios.

Practicar la religión y servir

A través de las Escrituras y la Tradición, la entrega eucarística de Jesús de sí mismo nos desafía a participar más frecuentemente en la Eucaristía (o esperar volver a hacerlo una vez que la pandemia pase) para convertirnos en una comunidad de amor abnegado que dé adoración a la presencia de Cristo en el Santísimo Sacramento y sirva a la presencia de Cristo en los demás. En la exhortación apostólica, La alegría del Evangelio (Evangelii Gaudium), el Papa Francisco exalta la presencia en muchas comunidades de grupos dedicados a la oración e intercesión a la lectura devota de la Palabra de Dios y a la adoración perpetua de la Eucaristía. Sin embargo, luego Francisco repite la advertencia de san Juan Pablo II de que esa devoción personal nunca debe convertirse en una espiritualidad privatizada e individualista que olvide las exigencias de la caridad o las consecuencias de la Encarnación de Jesús (EG 262), debemos tocar compasivamente la carne de Jesús en la carne sufriente de los demás (EG 270).
