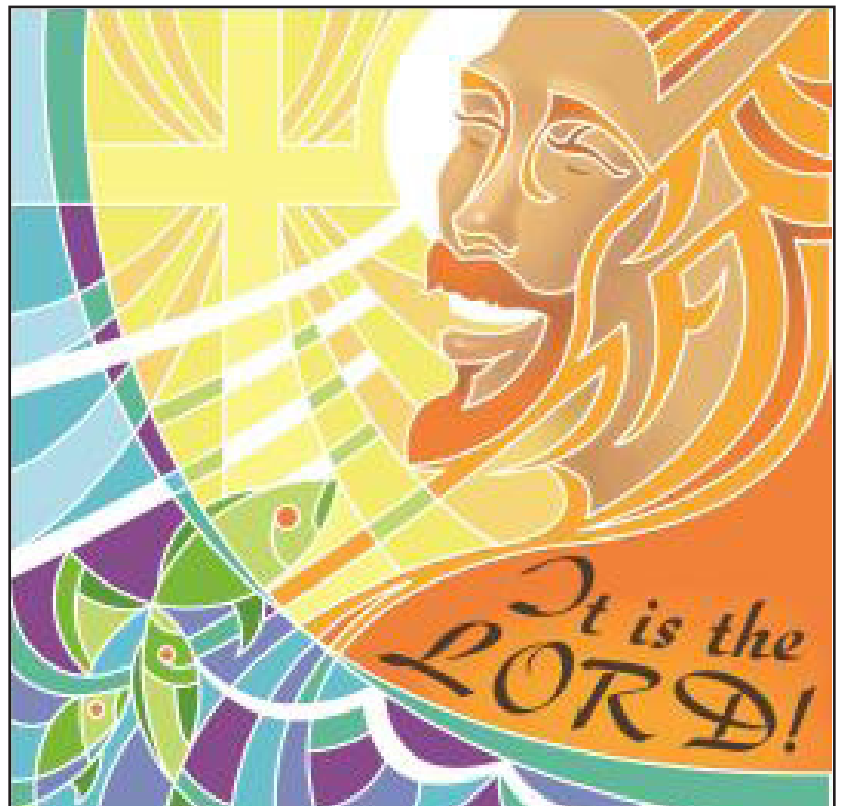

Some Words from the Pastor

Congratulations to our brothers and sisters who received the Sacrament of Confirmation last Sunday. It was a beautiful and solemn celebration which was presided by Bishop Alex Aclan, our regional bishop here at the San Fernando Pastoral Region. The bishop highlighted that they will not forget this, since their confirmation day was celebrated during the Divine Mercy Sunday. It was his hope that they will always remember that through the grace and mercy of God, they have received the gifts of the Holy Spirit. Receiving the Holy Spirit through the Sacrament of Confirmation empowers and inspires one to take part in the life and mission of the church. The celebration took place within the Eucharist, where our Lord nourishes us with his body and blood. And have been singled out through their anointing to become witnesses of the Risen Lord.

The gospel this Sunday presents the seashore appearance in which the Lord would ask Peter if he loves him. The question was asked three times which alludes to the denial of the Lord by Peter three times. And three times, Peter would answer, "Yes Lord I love you." Every time he answered yes, the Lord would give him the mission to feed his sheep and tend his flock. It would highlight the special role of Peter as head of the church. While Peter would express his love for Jesus, it is in a way saying that he would love and care for the whole flock. It is the role and mission that the Pope has been called to do. Obviously, we need to pray for our parish community and support our church by sharing our time, talent and treasure. If we love the church, then we have to come to our church, at least every Sunday. And with the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, we are called to have a more active participation through the different ministries and apostolates in the church. We are enjoined to use the gifts of the Holy Spirit which we received when we were confirmed. Let us reveal the fruits of the Spirit as we show our love, kindness and serve the Lord and his Church with joy and faithfulness.

Third Sunday of Easter

Today's Readings: Acts 5:27-32, 40b-41; Ps 30:2, 4, 5-6, 11-12a, 13b; Rev 5:11-14; Jn 21:1-19 [1-14]

The Easter season provides us an opportunity to reflect upon who we are as Church, in light of the first experiences of Jesus' followers. From today's Gospel, we realize that all we do is founded on our friendship with and trust in Jesus, as witnessed in Jesus' dialogue with Peter. From Revelation, in the image of Jesus as the sacrificial Lamb, we can anticipate suffering for the sake of love for God and for others. From the apostles' bold speech in Acts, we remember that when we stay true to the Gospel, even at great cost, we must always embody God's forgiveness toward those who resist God's invitation. The early Church struggled to understand how to live the way of Jesus, and we can expect no less struggle for ourselves. And like them, we may also know the joy of growing friendship with God along the way.

Obedying God

In the first chapters of Acts, the apostles venture out energetically, soon after Pentecost, to proclaim the risen Jesus. Today's reading shows the Sanhedrin, the formal religious body that had condemned Jesus shortly before, now threatening the apostles. The Sanhedrin likely feared that Jesus' followers would, in vengeance for the Crucifixion, stir up a riot or even a violent revolt. The apostles, consistent with Jesus' own dealings with the authorities, proclaim Jesus' message of God's forgiveness of everyone, and refuse to incite violence. It is a great challenge, as Peter said, to "obey God rather than man." Throughout history, when groups of God's people, inspired by God's dream for a just and free world, have spoken out non-violently against injustice and oppression, they have sought to obey God's summons. We the Church, while always mindful of the dangers of

self-deception, are similarly called to discern and obey God in our own time and place.

Repeated Questions

In today's Gospel, John sets the scene for Jesus' encounter with Peter, sitting by a "charcoal fire." There is just one other mention of a charcoal fire in John's Gospel: when Peter warms himself while awaiting Jesus' trial, and Peter goes on to deny knowing Jesus, three times. The evangelist directly links Jesus' three questions of Peter, "do you love me?", to Peter's three denials. Through his repeated questioning, Jesus helps Peter to face his actions fully, and to accept forgiveness fully as well. When God invites us into prayer, we may be invited to enter into deep conversation with God about our lives. God can pose the same questions to us, again and again over time, to face what we might prefer to avoid: Can you forgive someone who has hurt you? Can you be more generous? Can you let go of obstacles to becoming more loving? And even: Do you love me? Jesus' encounter with Peter suggests that we can face such questions with deep trust in God.

Tercer Domingo de Pascua

Lecturas de hoy: Hch 5:27-32, 40b-41; Sal 30 (29):2, 4, 5-6, 11-12a, 13b; Ap 5:11-14; Jn 21:1-19 [1-14]

El tiempo de Pascua nos ofrece la oportunidad de reflexionar sobre quiénes somos como Iglesia, a la luz de las primeras experiencias de los seguidores de Jesús. Desde el Evangelio de hoy, nos damos cuenta de que todo lo que hacemos se fundamenta en nuestra amistad y confianza en Jesús, como lo atestigua el diálogo de Jesús con Pedro. Desde el Apocalipsis, en la imagen de Jesús como Cordero sacrificado, podemos anticipar el sufrimiento por amor a Dios y a los demás. Del discurso audaz de los apóstoles en los Hechos, recordamos que cuando nos mantenemos fieles al Evangelio, incluso a un gran coste, debemos encarnar siempre el perdón de Dios hacia los que se resisten a la invitación de Dios. La Iglesia primitiva luchó por entender cómo vivir el camino de Jesús, y no podemos esperar menos lucha para nosotros. Y como ellos, también podemos conocer la alegría de una creciente amistad con Dios a lo largo del camino.

Obedecer a Dios

En los primeros capítulos de los Hechos, los apóstoles se aventuran con energía, poco después de Pentecostés, a anunciar a Jesús resucitado. La lectura de hoy muestra al Sanedrín, el cuerpo religioso formal que había condenado a Jesús poco antes, amenazando ahora a los apóstoles. Es probable que el Sanedrín temiera que los seguidores de Jesús, en venganza por la crucifixión, provocaran un motín o incluso una revuelta violenta. Los apóstoles, en consonancia con el trato de Jesús con las autoridades, proclaman el mensaje de Jesús de que Dios perdona a todos, y se niegan a incitar a la violencia. Es un gran desafío, como dijo Pedro, "obedecer a Dios antes que a los

hombres". A lo largo de la historia, cuando grupos del pueblo de Dios, inspirados por el sueño de Dios de un mundo justo y libre, se han manifestado de forma no violenta contra la injusticia y la opresión, han tratado de obedecer la llamada de Dios. Nosotros, la Iglesia, aunque siempre conscientes de los peligros del autoengaño, estamos igualmente llamados a discernir y obedecer a Dios en nuestro propio tiempo y lugar.

Preguntas Repetidas

En el Evangelio de hoy, Juan prepara la escena del encuentro de Jesús con Pedro, sentado junto a un "fuego de carbón". Sólo hay otra mención de un fuego de carbón en el Evangelio de Juan: cuando Pedro está calentándose mientras espera el juicio de Jesús, y éste niega tres veces conocer a Jesús. El evangelista vincula directamente las tres preguntas de Jesús a Pedro, "¿me amas?", con las tres negaciones de Pedro. A través de sus repetidas preguntas, Jesús ayuda a Pedro a enfrentarse plenamente a sus acciones, y a aceptar también plenamente el perdón. Cuando Dios nos invita a la oración, podemos ser invitados a entrar en una conversación profunda con Dios sobre nuestras vidas. Dios puede plantearnos las mismas preguntas, una y otra vez a lo largo del tiempo, para enfrentarnos a lo que quizá prefiramos evitar: ¿Puedes perdonar a alguien que te ha hecho daño? ¿Puedes ser más generoso? ¿Puedes dejar de lado los obstáculos para ser más cariñoso? E incluso: ¿Me amas? El encuentro de Jesús con Pedro sugiere que podemos enfrentarnos a esas preguntas con una profunda confianza en Dios.

En fiestas o reuniones llenas de gente, elija un vigilante del agua, un adulto de confianza a cargo de observar a los nadadores y rote las responsabilidades, según sea necesario.
