

Dear Friends in the Lord,

A few years ago, in those halcyon days when we could meet together, our Book Club chose Short Stories by *Jesus* as our monthly selection. The author is Amy-Jill Levine. The book's subtitle is descriptive of the work itself and offers an insight into the personality of its author – The Enigmatic Parables of a Controversial Rabbi. Dr. Levine is a Jewish New Testament scholar. She has held office in both the Catholic Biblical Association and the Association for Jewish Studies. As with our own in-house scholar. Mahri Leonard-Fleckman, this gives Dr. Levine an advantage over the rest of us! I enjoyed her book very much and remember thinking what a great resource it would be. Then, of course, I forgot about it. Until seeing it in the bookcase a few weeks ago and was reminded of its value. As soon as I saw that the Gospel passage for today is Matthew's account of the Parable of the Sower, I went immediately to *Short Stories by Jesus*.

Unfortunately, the short story about the sower is not one of the parables that Dr. Levine treats in her book. I will have to steal my homily from another source! Still, both the book's Introduction and Conclusion help us to unlock the enigmatic teaching of this controversial Rabbi. The Introduction is entitled, "How We Domesticate Jesus' Provocative Stories" and, as early as page 2, Dr. Levine throws down the gauntlet:

Too often we settle for easy interpretations: we should be nice like the Good Samaritan; we will be forgiven as was the prodigal son; we should pray and not lose heart like the importuning widow. When we seek universal morals from a genre that is designed to surprise, challenge, shake up, or indict and look for a single meaning in a form that opens to multiple interpretations, we are necessarily limiting the parables and, so, ourselves.

The Conclusion is entitled, "The Power of Disturbing Stories" and sends us forth with a challenge:

The parables, if we take them seriously not as historical portraits of real people but as challenges to our stereotypes, help us to both locate our eccentric traits and our excellent talents; they can inspire and humble, challenge and comfort.
