

Dear Friends in the Lord,

Today's first reading comes from the first chapter of the Book of Wisdom. The book was written about fifty years before the coming of Christ. The purpose of the unknown author, who sometimes speaks in the person of Solomon. is to build up those who have remained faithful, but have suffered at the hands of those who do not follow God. Therefore, as we hear in today's reading, the Wisdom of the Chosen People proclaims that "God did not make death." As the teaching continues, it will become evident that the author is not speaking of physical death, but of spiritual death. Which is, of course, to be separated from God for all eternity. It is clear, beginning with the very act of creation forward, that God's desire is to be in relationship with us. So that, through God, we can be in relationship with each other. The great promise of our faith is that God does not "make death" that God will not abandon us.

So, the pressure is on us then. God is not the problem, but we need to hold up our end of the relationship. As with those addressed by the Book of Wisdom (and, indeed, all the New Testament communities), this can be a significant challenge. Much has been made over the past years of the decline in religious affiliation and the active practice one's faith. I think this decline can be traced back to the Enlightenment. This reality makes it more of challenge to persevere in our relationship with God. To do so, then, we must rely more and more fully on God's grace. Trusting that where sin prevails, grace abounds all the more.

The long Gospel passage from Mark that we hear today has personal significance for me. In my First Theology class on the Synoptics, this was the passage the professor chose for my oral exam. That was more than forty years ago! The way that the Evangelists intertwines the two healing stories is interesting and instructive. Both remind us of the need for faith to issue forth in action – whether we are seeking our own healing or that of a loved one.

The woman afflicted with hemorrhages for twelve years had been to many doctors and "spent all that she had." So many people today can identify. Still, her faith assured her that all she had to do was "touch" Jesus to be cured. The Greek word used means "to cling to, to grasp." The key, then, is not merely to "touch," but to hold on tightly confident that in Jesus, God does not make death, but life.
