

Dear Friends in the Lord,

Today's Gospel passage comes from the ninth chapter of the Gospel according to John. It is the story of the Man Born Blind. It is the second of three long stories that dominate the middle of the Lenten Season. Last week, you may recall, was the story of the Samaritan Woman at the Well. Next week, we will hear the story of the Raising of Lazarus. Fr Raymond Brown, S.S., who was considered by many as one of the most prominent American Biblical Scholars, especially in regard to the Johannine writings, opined that these three stories combine to reveal the fundamental and important teachings of the Christian faith. The stories are about forgiveness, suffering and resurrection. This is the reason behind the liturgy recommending the use of these Cycle A readings during the other two years when the catechumens are present.

Last week, we heard how the unorthodox, unexpected and intimate encounter between Jesus and the Samaritan woman at the well unfolded in such a way that she was able to see her need to be saved. The Lord's honest and loving presence also enabled her to experience the redemptive mercy of God. It changed her life.

Today, we hear of another unorthodox, unexpected and intimate encounter. This one is between Jesus and a man born blind. As the question of his disciples, which opens the story, indicates, at the time any and all suffering was considered to be the consequence of $\sin - Rab$ -bi, who sinned, this man or his parents? Jesus sees things differently – Neither he nor his parents sinned, it is so the works of God may be made visible through him.

The truth is that whatever form suffering takes when it comes into our lives, it blinds us. We are unable to see the goodness of God or our dignity and value as a child of God. But the Lord said to Samuel... 'Not as man sees does God see, because man sees the appearance but the Lord looks into the heart.' Only with God, who loves us unconditionally and sacrificially, can our eyes be opened to the divine light through the darkness of our suffering.

The annual Partners in Charity Appeal is underway. Our parish goal this year remains at \$76,600. To date we have gifts and pledges in the amount of \$20,385 – a great start. I thank those who have given and the many of you who will, as always, support this diocesan effort.
