CHURCH TEACHING

Catechism 2414

The seventh commandment forbids acts or enterprises that for any reason - selfish or ideological, commercial, or totalitarian – lead to the enslavement of human beings, to their being bought, sold and exchanged like merchandise, in disregard for their personal dignity. It is a sin against the dignity of persons and their fundamental rights to reduce them by violence to their productive value or to a source of profit. St. Paul directed a Christian master to treat his Christian slave "no longer as a slave but more than a slave. as a beloved brother, . . . both in the flesh and in the Lord.



WHAT IS IT?

Human trafficking is the 2nd largest criminal industry worldwide, generating \$150 billion per year. It is the recruiting, harboring, transporting, providing or obtaining a person for compelled labor or commercial sex acts through the use of force, fraud or coercion.

IT HAPPENS HERE

25 million people are trafficked worldwide. Victims can be of any age or gender, but the vast majority of cases in the U.S. are sex-trafficked females. In 2023, Louisiana reported 1,615 victims (86% sex; 84% females; 83% minors).

HOW DOES IT HAPPEN?

Victims are usually trafficked by someone they know and trust – such as a family member or caregiver (33%), an intimate partner (28%), or an employer (22%). Fewer than 10% of cases involve kidnapping.

Anyone can be trafficked, but those with vulnerabilities are more easily exploited. This includes those with mental or physical health concerns, poverty, homelessness, sexual assault, family violence, and discrimination.

To help persons with lived experiences of trafficking, we can pray and we can support providers who assist them in rebuilding their lives. To eliminate trafficking, we need to work together as a society to increase services to reduce root causes of vulnerabilities, such as poverty, homelessness, substance abuse, and domestic violence.
