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When I go out and visit our schools, whether during Catholic Schools' Week or not, I always request of the children that when they go home, they say "thank you."

Catholic schools are a choice, and although they are a tremendous value, come at a cost for families. It is a sacrifice, to be sure. The money spent on tuition could buy a great summer vacation, a new car, or address some other family need.
