



EMBRACING HUMILITY IN PRAYER

Greetings, brothers and sisters in Christ! My name is Chad Koppes; I am the church accountant (and a former Protestant pastor) and I have been asked to write a message on this weekend's Gospel reading.

One of the struggles of being a new practicing Catholic is the prolific and bewildering array of prayers, devotions and practices in the Catholic tradition. It is beautiful in its depth but can also be intimidating because you can't do it all and different Catholics have different practices and offer differing advice about what things are necessary versus optional. For me, Jesus' teaching came at exactly the moment I needed to hear it and to be asked to write on this weekend's Gospel is deliciously ironic.

In the scripture passage, two men pray at the temple: the Pharisee in his pride and the Tax Collector in his humility. The Pharisee, confident in his holiness, gave thanks to God that he was not like other people. He fasted twice a week, which was not a requirement of the Jewish Law of the time but was part of the traditions and practices of the Pharisees. In other words, he went above and beyond the requirements of the Law. He also gave a tenth of all he received – a practice that was as rare then as it is now! He practiced an outstanding level of commitment to God and stood there before the temple praying in his pride.

The Tax Collector, on the other hand, stood at a distance. Tax collectors were universally reviled in the Jewish culture of the day. They would make their money by overcharging people what they owed to the state and keeping the excess. In other words, they would use the power of the Roman state to enrich themselves on the backs of their fellow Jews. This is why the inclusion of Matthew, a tax collector, as one of the disciples came as such a shock to everyone. The image here of the tax collector being the hero of this parable is equally shocking. The Tax Collector stood at a distance. He didn't feel worthy to approach and come near the temple. He didn't even feel worthy to look up. He beat his breast and cried to God, "Lord, have mercy on me, a sinner."

What a powerful image. A hero of the faith, who has utterly committed his life to God, is brought low by his pride while a hated, unworthy traitor stands justified in his humility. Are we approaching our devotional practices with the humility and charity which God clearly desires in us or are we checking off our 'holiness' boxes to feel good about ourselves? With the vast array of traditions that we can draw upon to pray and honor God it is easy, especially for newer Catholics like myself, to forget the former and slip into the latter. I am grateful for the perspective offered by this Gospel!






VIANNEY VISIT | Nov. 13-15
