


# **Tradition and our Catholic Faith**

#### **NOTES FROM FATHER TOM**

There has been a movement in the Church for some years now that can be called a "return to Tradition." In many ways, it is a reaction to the numerous excesses and failures following the Second Vatican Council, especially when it came to the liturgy and lack of teaching the faith in the 70's, 80's and 90's. This movement, is a desire for a return to the "sacred" in liturgy, to be faithful to the Church's teachings on marriage and family, especially when it comes to contraception and openness to life, and the other difficult Church teachings for our age, and to live the faith on a serious level. On the whole, the movement toward Tradition, is a beautiful and renewing force in the Church, and something that is bigger than any parish or person. We can see this in the kind of priests that are being ordained nowadays: young priests who love the sacred, and often learn how to celebrate the Tridentine Mass. The priests ordained over the last 10 years (of whom I am one), overwhelmingly support and desire a return to the "sacral" elements of the Faith.



Nowadays there are many stories of churches being beautifully restored to their former glory, with sacred art, often an altar rail, statues etc... This is happening in parishes where a more recently ordained priest has become a pastor and decided to focus on bringing the beauty back! The homeschool movement has been another great contributor to the return to Tradition: Catholic parents choosing to teach their children Latin, philosophy, the great Western literary heritage rather than risking sending them to parochial or worse public schools. Homeschooling has taken off in popularity, and now is on its second or third generation of faithful families. We have been blessed with St. Augustine's at our parish, a strong academic program supporting homeschoolers. In the Ann Arbor area we also have independent Catholic schools, like Spiritus Sanctus associated with the Sisters of Mary Mother of the Eucharist, which are faithful to Tradition and teach the Faith. There is a lot to be thankful for in the direction in which the Church is going, and it is mostly happening from the ground up!

As a pastor of our traditional parish, I have been delighted with the opportunity to celebrate the Mass as devoutly as possible: ad orientem, with Latin chants of the ordinary, and utilizing the altar rail for Holy Communion. In addition, I have made many of the shorter rites available in the Extraordinary Form: such as Baptism, blessing of woman after giving birth ("Churching"), blessing of holy water with salt, Epiphany blessing of homes etc.. It has been a joy to use the Church's time honored texts for these blessings, which often entail minor exorcism prayers and strong words against evil not found in the newer texts. One of the more beautiful moments of my discernment, was when I found myself at a more traditional parish and saw Catholic women wearing veils at Mass for the first time. The beauty of that experience helped move me a step closer toward God and discernment.

Having been pastor for several years now, at our parish, I've had the chance to observe the movement toward Tradition, from the inside. One of the things that I have found, is that the desire for Catholic Tradition, often leads our faithful to educate and form themselves through strong Traditional teaching from various sources. This in itself is a very commendable thing: the desire to know God, the Church and its teachings, the Traditions of the Church on an ever deeper level. It happens through the homeschool curriculum, through book study groups, through many sources outside the parish: religious orders such as Miles Christi, and through listening to traditional Catholic voices in the Church. Many families and lay faithful havebenefited greatly (myself included) from such teaching. However, in the last several years,

I have also observed voices in the Church, which have become increasingly critical and harsh and hurtful to the Church and those who listen to them. What kind of voices are these? They are both priests and lay "ministries" including Catholic media, which declare themselves "Traditional" and "defenders of the True Church" but do so in a way that is violent and hostile in tone, and sometimes at odds with the Church. You could call them "extreme" voices, and you would recognize them by constant negativity of their teaching or news coverage. These voices love to bash the Holy Father, to constantly search out what is "wrong" with the Church, to call out bishops in a disrespectful voice, and loudly proclaim themselves the keepers of the true faith. Unfortunately, some of them started out as good, solid, traditional priests and laymen who helped the Church move toward Tradition and the sacred. But now they have degenerated into speculation, insinuation, and at times outright defiance of the Church.

You may say: but father, we need voices like this. Yes, sometimes we do. But historically all authentic renewal of the Church has occurred through voices and people who have done so from within the Church. Even if this meant doing something they didn't want to, they were obedient and maintained their union with the Holy Father and Mother Church. St. Teresa of Avila and John of the Cross, St. Catherine of Sienna, St. Dominic, St. Francis, all brought tremendous renewal to the Church just when it was needed most. They did not break faith with the Holy Father or with their bishop, even when they were being persecuted. And they lived at a time when the Church was often in much greater trouble and more corrupt than it is today. This is why we call them saints! Our modern heroes trod a similar path: St. John Paul II and his stance against Communism, St. Padre Pio, Bl. Pier Frassati, all brought renewal and were faithful sons of the Church.

# How do we know when a traditional voice is in trouble and may lead us astray? Several ways:

- 1) Is the voice we're listening to consistently bashing and negating the Holy Father (it's one thing to disagree from time to time, but completely another to break faith with, or to dishonor
- 2) Is the voice we're listening to consistently and overwhelmingly negative about the Church and its leaders (focused on scandals, corruption, sins of hierarchy)
- 3) Is the voice we're listening to becoming more and more political, speculative, looking for conspiracies within and without the Church...(does it equate being Catholic with supporting a particular political candidate at all cost...)
- 4) Finally, is the voice we're listening to been rebuked or censured by the rightful authority of the Church: the Holy See or its bishop

Some of you have asked me: Father, then who should we listen to? These are troubling times, and it is not always easy to find voices of reason and orthodoxy. We have to use discernment, but I believe the criteria above is very helpful. I can tell you that voices such as retired Abp Vigano (in hiding) and Michael Voris (from Detroit's "Vortex") fall under all 4 of the criteria above. They have been either censured by the Church, or asked to return to fraternal communion with the Church and refused to do so. On the other hand, there are plenty of faithful priests, bishops, lay educated faithful, who advocate for Tradition and the Sacred while living in communion with the Church. Many of them quietly go about fulfilling their duties, serving the Church and their families, or their ministries, and bringing about a renewal of faith from the inside. Some of them, like retired Arbp Chaput for example, speak out publicly and respectfully against the evils of our age, while maintaining absolute communion with the Church and the Holy See. Let us follow their lead, stay steady in Faith, smart about who we allow to inform our minds and consciences, and never forget who it is who is really present in His Church.

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

# Year End Tax Considerations

As we rapidly approach the end of the calendar year, we thought it would be a good time for a quick refresher on IRS tax rules with regards to recording charitable contributions.

Contributions must be mailed prior to year end. This means,

that the donor needs to mail checks by December 31st and that the envelope with the postmark is a very important piece of information. If a check is received in early January that is dated in December but the postmark is January 3rd, the donation would be recorded in 2021. Conversely, if the check is dated December 31, the envelope is postmarked December 31, and its still not received until January 3rd, the contribution would be recorded in 2020.




