Dear Parishioners and friends of St. Lawrence,

This is a very challenging time – for all of us. The danger of opening up society or loosening restrictions, people cooped up for too long and just wanting this whole thing over. Many people unemployed or laid off and bills, mortgages, car payments still come due. College students, high school students, grade school, even day care centers no longer in routine and sometimes all quarantined together creating tense living conditions. Our future so uncertain – with some forecasting two or three years before "normal" returns. After 14, 16, 18 months are spoken as matter of fact for the worst of this virus event to last and necessitate coping with this pandemic.

With all this stress, I want to encourage people to take the opportunity to request a Stephen Minister — objective, non-judgmental person to walk with you during this time. If you are experiencing being overwhelmed by the stress of this unprecedented time and reality, don't hesitate to contact the office for lining up a Stephen Minister. Better for you to have a relief valve than your family to pay a price. If someone in your family would recommend this to you, it's a good sign you would benefit from it. Don't let pride get in the way.

My thought on all this is that the whole cosmos is held in a balance of all the parts. Whenever the balance is being jeopardized, nature does what is necessary to restore or maintain the balance. The more out of kilter things are, the more severe the measure necessary to restore the balance. Maybe we are not in charge as much as we think we are and nature/creation does have the power to protect itself. Not caused by God, but created, designed and sustained by God. During this time, we should not just pray that God fix this, but what might we need to change to restore the balance and show respect for all creation. Just my non-scientific thoughts on the matter.

I believe that everyone has heard that Bishop Doherty has delayed the transfer of all the priests until August 19. That has been a relief for me – hopefully we will be able to celebrate liturgies together before that and have opportunity to see and visit again. I have missed seeing all of you. Sometimes when I wait outside the Church on Sunday morning, people think I'm just trying to catch those who are late. Really I just want to greet and welcome all those coming – whether on time or late. It is a joy to welcome each one – all I know is that you came. I have no idea what effort it might have taken you to make it that morning (or evening). I'm just glad to see you.

So now, I just really miss seeing you.

Today's readings on this fourth Sunday of Easter offer us a glimpse into the heart of our loving Savior. He is the Good Shepherd and we can confidently place our trust in Him as we live the stewardship way of life.

This endearing image of Jesus as shepherd, and His personal love for each one of us, is described in our Gospel passage from John, through the words of Jesus Himself. Here we read Jesus' description of Himself as the "Good Shepherd." He says of Himself, "The sheep hear his voice, as the shepherd calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has driven out all his own, he walks ahead of them and the sheep follow him, because they recognize his voice."

This aspect of our Lord's tender and personal love for each one of us is a compelling reason to embrace the stewardship way of life — in the offering of our time, talent and treasure to Him, we can express our gratitude to Him for the incomprehensible love He has for us.

Embracing this way of life certainly requires trust on our part. But Christ has proven Himself worthy of our trust. He "bore our sins in His body." He calls Himself our shepherd and He offers Himself as the guardian of our souls. He has withheld nothing of Himself and His goodness from us. He would never ask anything of us that would bring us harm. He tells us "I came so that [you] might have life and have it more abundantly."

This Easter season, let us resolve to entrust ourselves and our lives gratefully to Him.
