Dear Parishioners and friends of St. Lawrence,

This Sunday we celebrate the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. It is a celebration that lies at the center of our lives as disciples of Jesus. It is not our goal just to keep the 10 Commandments but to grow in such unity with Christ that we will one day be able to say with St. Paul, "it is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me." To become one with Him in love of God and our neighbor, to be one with Him in doing the will of the Father, to be one with Him in laying down our life out of love, to be one with Him in glorifying the Father with our life, that ultimately, we will be one with Him for all eternity.

The old phrase "you become what you eat" is also true of the Eucharist. Christ becomes our very food. He is our nourishment, he is our food for the journey to sustain us through trials and difficulties. It is through this food that we become one with Him.

St. Paul, in 1 Corinthians 10:16-17 addresses the Early Christian Community about reception of the bread and wine that is blessed, "is not the bread we eat, a sharing in the body of Christ and is not the cup we drink, a sharing in the blood of Christ?" It is through the Eucharist that we share in the very life of Christ and grow into a oneness with Him.

But it isn't just a oneness with Him, it is also a oneness with the entire Body of Christ – a union with all those baptized into Him. Through our baptism, we became a member of the Body of Christ – often called the Mystical Body of Christ, for it includes all who are in communion with Christ and members of His body. What a great gift we have to be united with all the saints throughout history – the apostles, apostolic fathers, mothers of the church, all the martyrs who have laid down their life for Christ, all our ancestors who are in union with Him as part of the communion of saints, all our loved ones who have died in union with Him.

Just take some time to reflect on and ponder the union that is given to us through so many graced and blessed people. We are truly not alone but "are surrounded by a so great a cloud of witnesses." The communion with Christ in which the saints share, is also the communion shared with us. How blessed are we by a God that loves us beyond all comprehension – that all God shares in, is shared with each of us through communion with His Son.

Dear Friends,

This week I met with the Adult Faith Formation Team to discern where the Spirit was inviting us as a faith community. One member brought the book, "Racial Justice and the Catholic Church" by Bryan Massingale. We spent most of our time talking about what God is calling us to at this time of deepening awareness of racial inequality. Not surprisingly, along with doing the work of examining our own attitudes and actions, the other common theme was to learn from our brothers and sisters of color. Stay tuned as we invite others to teach us.

As a spiritual director, a common question for those in direction is how are you praying with this? Discernment is about noticing God's action in any and every area of our life—and that includes struggling through difficult situations. Our parish is situated among our black brothers and sisters. How can we welcome them, have them teach us, walk with them in their struggle? How do we pray with them? How do we form friendships across religious traditions so that the Gospel is alive?

We have so much to learn. And, as we turn to God in prayer, may we empty ourselves so that we can hear the deeper invitation, and respond to the lead given to us so that oppression ceases and all may flourish.

June 14, 2020 ~ Solemnity of The Body and Blood Of Christ

<u>DT 8:2-3,14B-16A; PS 147:12-15,19-20; 1 COR</u> 10:16-17; JN 6:51-58

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ. Our readings are focused on the gifts of the Word of God and the Eucharist. This feast has deep significance to those of us living the stewardship way of life.

Why? As stewards, we recognize that all that we are and all that we have been given are gifts from God. We are called to treasure these gifts and use them for God's glory. Our Solemnity today and the readings for this week invite us to a deeper gratitude and better stewardship of the two sublime



gifts of God's Word and the Eucharist.

In our first reading from Deuteronomy, Our Heavenly Father (such a good teacher) reminds us that just as we experience physical hunger from lack of food, we become spiritually malnourished through lack of feeding on the Word of God. It is that important.

And, just as the Word of God is vital to our spiritual nourishment, so, too is the nourishment of the Eucharist. Jesus could not make this any clearer to us: "Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you."

Without the Eucharist, we die spiritually. But through the Eucharist, we experience a taste of heaven right now — "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life."

As Christian stewards, we must recognize that in the gifts of the Word of God and the Eucharist, we have everything we need to sustain us in this world and guide us to heaven. Let us resolve to steward these precious gifts well with all our hearts, always.

Reflection on Today's Feast

Today, we celebrate the solemn feast of *Corpus* Christi. It is three feasts in one: the feast of the Eucharistic sacrifice, feast of the Sacrament of the Eucharist and the feast of the Real Presence of Jesus. It is a doctrinal feast established for three purposes: 1) to give God collective thanks for Christ's abiding presence with us in the Eucharist and to honor him there; 2) to instruct the people in the Mystery, Faith and devotion surrounding the Eucharist, and 3) to teach us to appreciate and make use of the great gift of the Holy Eucharist, both as a Sacrament and as a sacrifice. In the three-year cycle of the Sunday liturgy, there is a different theme each year for this Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ. In Cycle A the theme is the Eucharist as our food and drink; in Cycle B the emphasis is on the Eucharist as the sign of the covenant; and in Cycle C the focus is on the priesthood of Jesus. Although we celebrate the institution of the Holy Eucharist on Holy Thursday, the Church wants to emphasize its importance by a special feast, formerly called "Corpus Christi."

The historical development: Today's celebration of the Body and Blood of the Lord originated in the Diocese of Liege in 1246 as the feast of Corpus Christi. In the reforms of Vatican II, Corpus Christi was joined with the feast of the Precious Blood (July 1) to become the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of the Lord. We celebrate today Christ's gift of the Eucharist, the source and summit of our life together as the Church. The Council of Trent (1545 to 1563), declared that we must honor Our Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist publicly so that those who observed the Faith of Catholics in the Most Holy Eucharist might be attracted to the Eucharistic Lord and believe in the Divinity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, present in this great Sacrament. "The Catholic Church teaches that in the Eucharist, the Body and Blood of the God-man are really, truly, substantially, and abidingly present together with his soul and divinity by reason of the Transubstantiation of the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ.

The Scripture lessons: This year's readings for this feast emphasize the theme of Covenant blood because the ancient peoples sealed covenants with the blood of ritually sacrificed animals, and Jesus sealed this New Covenant with his own Blood, shed on Calvary. Today's first reading describes how Moses,

by sprinkling the blood of a sacrificed animal on the altar and on the people, accepted the covenant Yahweh proposed and made with His People. The Responsorial Psalm (Ps 116), presents our acceptance of the New Covenant of which Paul speaks in the second reading, affirming that Jesus sealed the New Covenant with his own Blood on Calvary, thereby putting an end to animal sacrifices. Today's Gospel details how Jesus converted this ancient ritual into a Sacrament and sacrifice. Instead of the lamb's blood, Jesus offered his own Divine/human Body and Blood and, instead of sprinkling us with blood, Jesus put it into our hands as food. Mark recounts the institution of the Eucharist -- how Jesus said to his disciples, gathered for the Seder: "Take, ... eat ... this is my Body" -- not "represents," or "memorializes", but "IS"! A little later, He said: "Take this ... drink from it, for This is ... my Blood ... which will be poured out for you and for many, for the forgiveness of sins. "-- again. "IS".

FOOD FROM HEAVEN

God sustained the people of Israel for forty years in the desert with manna sent down from heaven, and Moses doesn't want them to forget it. God brought forth water from stone for them to drink, and Moses doesn't want them to forget this, either. And Moses tells them—twice—that the food that God sent was a food that neither they nor their ancestors before them had ever experienced before.

Jesus too speaks of food come down from heaven, food that the Jewish people had never experienced before. Recalling the manna in the desert, Jesus doesn't want them to forget it either, explaining that he is the food and drink of eternal life. And Paul reiterates to the Corinthians and to all of us that in the bread and in the cup, we share in the body and blood of Christ.
