THURSDAY, 1 NOVEMBER, IS A HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION!

Consult the bulletin when and where liturgies will be celebrated.

The Church celebrates holy men and women throughout the year on various saint days, but the **Solemnity of All Saints** is when the Church honors every saint: those officially known and honored on the Church calendar, and saints known only to God. This concept is similar to the American holidays of Veterans Day and Presidents Day, on which a group of people are honored. While we have information about many saints, and we honor them on specific days, there are many unknown or unsung saints, who may have been forgotten, or never been honored specifically. On All Saints Day, we celebrate these holy individuals, and ask for their prayers and intercessions.

Our celebrations of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day stems from a belief that there is a powerful spiritual bond between those in heaven (the "Church triumphant"), and the living (the "Church militant"). In Catholic theology, the day commemorates all those who have attained the beatific vision in Heaven.

In the Western Christian practice, the liturgical celebration begins at Vespers on the evening of 31 October, All Hallows' Eve (All Saints' Eve), and ends at the close of 1 November. It is thus the day before All Souls' Day, which commemorates

The **Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)** is a process developed by the Catholic Church for prospective converts to Catholicism who are above the age of infant baptism. Candidates are gradually introduced to aspects of Catholic beliefs and practices.

The ideal is for there to be an RCIA process available in every Roman Catholic parish. Those who want to join an RCIA group should aim to attend one in the parish where they live.



For those who join an RCIA process it is a period of reflection, prayer, instruction, discernment, and formation. There is no set timetable and those who join the process are encouraged to go at their own pace, taking as much time as they need.

The US bishops have said that the process "should extend for at least one year for formation, instruction, and probation" for those who have had no previous experience with living a Christian life. However, "nothing ... can be settled a priori. The time spent in the catechumenate should be long enough—several years if necessary—for the conversion and faith of the catechumens to become strong." For those who have some experience leading a Christian life, the process should be much shorter, "according to the individual case."

Those who enter the process are expected to begin attending Mass on a Sunday, participate in regular faith formation activities, and to become increasingly involved in the activities of their local parish.

Catholic HEART Workcamp (CHWC) is owned by Steve Walker and based in Orlando, FL. It is about SERVICE, CONNECTION and LOVING OTHERS. The first workcamp was in 1993 with 100 participants and has grown to over 14,000 campers each summer. CHWC provides youth groups, teens and adult leaders with service opportunities to restore homes and hearts, feed the hungry, lift the spirits of children, bring joy to the elderly and disabled and offer assistance while partnering with social agencies. Each Workcamp is equipped with nine summer staff members, a director, a manager, a musician, a nurse and at least one priest to celebrate mass/confession. It is a youth friendly Christ-centered week of caring for others. Catholic HEART Workcamp faithfully and enthusiastically serves the Roman Catholic Church and its teachings and is an excellent opportunity to “love the least of these”.

Any students who will be entering the 8th Grade in the fall of 2018, high school students, high school graduates and college students AND are serious about serving others. We require one adult (21 years and older) for every five young people. There are two types of Next Level camps; one is open to those entering the 8th grade in the fall and the other is open to those entering the 9th grade. Elevate camps are open to those entering the 9th grade in the fall and are designed to advance faith and service to a higher level. Original camps are open to students entering the 8th grade in the fall. International Trips are open to those entering the 10th grade in the fall through college. Please bring at least one adult male and one adult female if you are bringing both female and male young people.
