Political Elections and Voting as a Catholic: The first response to anyone who asks me about voting is that is it very important that you exercise your right to vote and I feel a moral obligation. We are very blessed to live in a country that allows us this freedom and we ought to respect the efforts of those before us who have fought long and hard to make this right available to us. That having been said: as believers in God we easily separate using our informed conscience as a Roman Catholic from many important decisions we make in our life. A well-lived Catholic life learns, by suffering over a lifetime, that such opportunities, such as voting in elections, are wonderful occasions to promote our Catholic values and the truths that are represented by them, upon the decisions we make.. As your pastor, many have asked me about voting in the upcoming election. It is not my place to tell anyone how to vote, but it is my place to remind you that as you do

vote God expects us to vote in ways that promote the values and the teachings of our Catholic faith. Whichever way we vote, we become a participant in the decisions which are made and this connects us individually to the making of such collective decisions. God forbid we be part of decisions that would displease God. I know, I know...many times making a decision about how one casts their vote isn't just about one issue. You are correct, voting on a political ballot may not simply be about one issue, but I can't help but think that the one issue we can't ignore is that we are God's children first and citizens of a country, while at the same time, secondarily so. I would advise you pray about your vote carefully, be sure you are informed with facts not falsehoods, and ask yourself if when you one day meet God you will be comfortable in the part you played in voting. "In the end" pleasing God is far more important and in the present we Catholics must believe that what our faith teaches us is best not only for ourselves, but best for all simply because what our faith teaches us is best for all of us.
