SALT AND LIGHT

Those of us, who

have had the privilege of eating at a military chow hall or galley, know what bland food tastes like. When I first entered the military, I wondered what all the wonderful condiments were for that adorned each table. Once I tasted the food I knew why the food lacked taste. 
