

10 February | Saint Scholastica, Virgin



Little is known about the life of Saint Scholastica, yet her influence upon the Church is undeniable. She was born into a wealthy family around the year 480 AD, in the town of Nursia, central Italy, shortly after the fall of the Western Roman emperor. As a child, Scholastica dedicated herself to the service of God, taking no interest in the

things of this world. She lived modestly, despite being raised in a wealthy home. Her twin brother, Saint Benedict, became the father of modern monasticism, and she its mother. Soon after Benedict's humble monastery on Monte Cassino began to bloom, Scholastica received permission to adopt his rule with a group of virgins, making them the first convent of Benedictine nuns. In the centuries to follow, their way of life spread far and wide across the Western world. In his book Dialogues, Pope Saint Gregory captures the holy love that Benedict and Scholastica shared. Though Scholastica's convent was only a few miles from Benedict's monastery, the two would only get together once a year, in keeping with their strict rule of life. Those meetings fanned into flames their shared love for God and the fruits of their prayer and mutual calling to this new way of life. The witness of these siblings should especially teach us the value of holy friendships that mutually build each other up and give glory to God. We are made not only for communion with God, but for communion with one another. These saintly siblings give witness to this

I went every day for a fortnight, and each day I asked her who she was, and this petition always made her smile. After the fortnight I asked her three times consecutively. She always smiled. At last I tried for the fourth time. She stopped smiling. With her arms down, she raised her eyes to Heaven and then, folding her hands

over her breast she said, "I am the Immaculate Conception." ~Testimony of Saint Bernadette Soubirousand. everal years after her visions, Bernadette entered religious life. Of the visions, she would later say, "The Virgin used me as a broom to remove the dust. When the work is done, the broom is put behind the door again." This "broom" was canonized in 1933. The grotto of Lourdes, however, was much bigger than Bernadette. It was Our Lady's gift to the people. It was her proclamation that she was the Immaculate Conception and her formal acceptance of the title here on earth.

Prayer: Dearest Mother, the Immaculate Conception, you chose the humblest of instruments in Bernadette to proclaim your universal message of repentance. You declared to the world that you are, indeed, the Immaculate Conception. Please pray for me, bring healing to my soul, and help me to be freed of all sin so that I may one day share in your glory in Heaven. Saint Bernadette, pray for me. Our Lady, the Immaculate Conception, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You.

The Knights Templar

The Knights Templar were a Catholic military order founded in 1119 to protect Christian pilgrims in the Holy Land during the Crusades, embodying the ideal of holy warriors dedicated to defending the Faith. Approved by Pope Honorius II in 1129, they

became a powerful and respected organization, combining monastic vows with martial prowess and developing an innovative financial network that made them crucial supporters of Christian military campaigns. Their wealth and influence grew dramatically, allowing them to construct impressive fortifications, support papal missions, and become a critical component of medieval Catholic military strategy across Europe and the Middle East. Despite their eventual suppression by King Philip IV of France and Pope Clement V in 1312, the Templars remain a symbol of Catholic chivalry, religious devotion, and the Church's militant spirit during the medieval period.

The Flag of the English Crusaders

English crusaders played a pivotal role in the medieval Holy Wars, launching significant military expeditions to reclaim the Holy Land from Muslim control between the 11th and 13th centuries. Led by notable nobles and kings like Richard the Lionheart, these devout

Catholic warriors saw their military campaigns as sacred missions to defend Christianity and secure Christian access to Jerusalem and other holy sites. Their crusading efforts were sanctioned and often directly encouraged by successive Popes, who viewed these military campaigns as a means of expanding Catholic influence and offering spiritual redemption for participants. Despite mixed military success, the English crusaders significantly impacted medieval geopolitics, contributing to cultural exchanges, military innovations, and the broader narrative of Catholic military expansion during the Middle Ages.
