From the Pastor...

Dear St. Joseph Parishioners,

As you may know, the **Governor of Ohio has said that social distancing restrictions are no longer required at religious services.** At a press conference yesterday, he said that all government health orders will be lifted, effective Wednesday, June 2nd.

The Archbishop of Cincinnati has approved a loosening of social distancing requirements in churches.

THEREFORE, EXCEPT FOR ONE SECTION OF THE CHURCH AND THE ENTIRE GATHERING SPACE, EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY, ST. JOSEPH CHURCH WILL OBSERVE NO SOCIAL DISTANCING RESTRICTIONS.

The section of the church where social distancing restrictions are still in force is (as you face the altar) the left main side section closest to the wall with the stations (not the whole left side, only the long section that runs along the Stations of the Cross). Again, the entire Gathering Space is still a social distancing section (we hope that there will be fewer people in the Gathering Space, now that there will be more room in church for those who do not feel that they have to be too cautious).

I am happy to report that, except for the strict social distancing section in church, all of the ugly, worn, year-old red and blue masking tape has been removed from the church seats. Feel free to watch the celebrational video on our website where live-streaming videos can be seen. (Of course, I can't wait to see the other half of your faces, in three weeks, when we get rid of those masks!)

Pentecost: The Church's Birthday

Each year the Church celebrates 50 days of Easter, culminating at the feast of Pentecost. Pentecost marks the occasion of God's sending the Holy Spirit upon Jesus' disciples after his resurrection. Before Pentecost, the disciples were unsure of what they were to do next, and spent most of their time in hiding. After Pentecost, and the gift of the Holy Spirit, they understood their mission to spread the Good News of Jesus, and they had the courage to stop hiding and speak openly about who Jesus was, and what he had accomplished by his dying and rising.

Because Pentecost brought the disciples this clarity of mission, it is regarded as the founding feast of the Christian Church. Before Pentecost, the disciples of Jesus are tentative and disorganized. After Pentecost, they are a people with a mission, who perceive themselves as spiritually and sacramentally connected to the risen Christ. You can read the story of the Church's first days in the Acts of the Apostles.

Today, celebrations of Pentecost still center on the gifts of the Holy Spirit, and the power of those gifts to both draw people together, to send them forth to spread the word. For those of you who are fond of making lists, those gifts of the Holy Spirit are: Wisdom, Knowledge, Understanding, Fortitude, Good Counsel, Piety, and Fear of the Lord.

Of course, one of the remarkable elements of the story of the first Pentecost was the miracle of understanding, in which everyone in the diverse crowd in Jerusalem hears the disciples speaking in the listeners' own language. This unique event is sometimes commemorated at masses for Pentecost Sunday by having people read sections of the story in a variety of different languages represented in the congregation. It's a reminder that although we've heard the story before, we have inherited the mission of those first disciples. USCCB.org


Summer Religious Education Program (June 7-18, Mon-Fri., 8:45-12:30pm)

THE LIFE OF SAINT JOSEPH PANEL 3: SAINT JOSEPH IN HEAVENLY GLORY

If we were numbering these panels chronologically, this would be the last one, because this one shows St. Joseph where he is now, enjoying eternal life in heaven, and praying for us who are still in the struggle of earthly life. So, we see St. Joseph, smiling, walking around in the glory of heaven, comfortable in his silk tunic and cloak, and casually holding the symbols that allow us to know who he is: his right angle, showing him to be the carpenter, and his stalk of lilies, a symbol of his purity and chastity, which were especially required because of the special kind of marriage he would agree to, in order to fulfill God's will for him. Joseph is traditionally shown holding a staff blooming with lilies. This is from a legend that his walking stick miraculously bloomed with lilies to show the Blessed Virgin Mary that he was the man (among competing offers) whom she should choose to be her husband.

Joseph is referred to in the Gospel of Matthew as a just man. All Christians are to seek to be just and righteous in our lives, but we can only be truly just through the justice Christ won for us through his cross and resurrection. The seven lilies are Easter lilies, still blooming in an abundance of life and beauty. They are a symbol of Jesus Christ in his resurrection, and Joseph holds them also as a sign of eternal life through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.

The just will flourish like the palm tree, and grow like a Lebenon cedar.

Planted in the house of the Lord, they will flourish in the courts of our God,

still bearing fruit when they are old, still full of sap, still green,

to proclaim that the Lord is just, in him, my Rock, there is no wrong. (from Psalm 92, Grail Psalter translation)

Joseph is often portrayed holding the baby Jesus, to show that he is Jesus' foster father who cared for him. I chose not to portray him this way, because this scene would be after Jesus had grown up and died for us; Jesus is now at the right hand of the Father. Instead, we look now at St. Joseph, and he looks at us with affection, praying for us and encouraging us to work through the battle of earthly life.

Below the wooden border, St. Joseph's patronal titles are given, to engage the viewer in asking him for his friendship and prayer. One of these is "Patron Saint of a happy death" (that is, one that is peaceful, prepared for, and leading to eternal salvation). I had considered portraying the traditional scene of Joseph dying, with Jesus and Mary comforting him. With so many patronal titles, I thought I should simply list the titles instead (there may be still other titles). I hope you find it a source of comfort and motivation to pray.
